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MARKETS and FINANCE

N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—Stocks resumed their bull market drive ahead last week after a brief sell-off and pushed up to new levels. There were no fireworks in trading, but the average gain was the greatest in four months. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced \$3.70, widest since the second week of last November. It closed at \$162.60, highest level in its history. The previous week the average lost \$1. Leadership was in major divisions such as steels, railroads, motors and oils.

Business news was considered highly favorable for a rise in the market. The National Association of Purchasing Agents reported order backlogs high. The steel industry cited a rush of business. Automobile industry leaders forecast production and sales records this year.

The five most active issues last week on the American stock exchange were Webb and Knapp up 1/4 at 3, General Stores unchanged at 1/4, Nonferrous Metal Products up 1/16 at 9 3/4, Brazilian Traction up 1/4 at 9 3/4, and Fargo Oils up 7/16 at 2 1/2.

The five most active on the New York exchange were Graham Paige up 1/4 at 3 1/2, Pennsylvania Railroad up 1/4 at 28 1/2, General Motors up 1/4 at 98, Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton up 1/4 at 16 1/2, and Texton up 3/4 at 16 1/2.

Canadian issues on the New York exchange were mixed. Dome Mines gained 1/4 while McIntyre International Nickel lost 1/4. Hillman Walker dropped 1/4 and Distillers Seagrams fell 1/4.

On the American exchange Lake

Shore dropped 1/4, Royalty lost 1/4 and Giant Yellowknife was unchanged.

U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—The strong steel demand will become even more vigorous during the next few weeks, Steel Magazine said today. "Not only will consumers be trying to get enough steel for their high rate of usage, but they'll be strengthening their inventories," said the metalworking weekly.

It said increased consumption requires a larger working inventory; steel is becoming harder to get and consumers want extra tonnage on hand; and the possibility of a wage increase in the industry is spurring inventory building now.

Encouraging, said the magazine, is the outlook for the construction and pipeline fields and for agricultural equipment, while "even new life is coming into the listless steel-rail market."

Steel production, showing an increase every week this year, went up another half point last week to 90.8 per cent of rated capacity.

2 Counterfeiting Plants in Prison

WASHINGTON (AP)—A prison is one of the last places you'd expect to find a counterfeiting plant, but the United States secret service has turned up two of them.

U. E. Baughman, secret service chief, cited the cases to the congressional appropriations committee as indicative of "the diabolical character of counterfeiters."

In a New Jersey state prison, the secret service chief said, six counterfeit \$1 plates were found in the electric shop. A convict serving a long sentence for breaking and entering admitted having made them.

In Mexico City, a notorious counterfeiter was caught printing money on a portable press concealed in his cell. His market for the phony money was among fellow prisoners about to be released.

Rocking Chair Rodeo Begins in Quebec Town

ROBERVAL, Que. (CP)—While a radio blared messages from the rodeo and hundreds of spectators gawked through a big display window, 11 rocking chair sitters Thursday went steadily about the business of establishing the championship of something or other.

The rodeo got rocking Wednesday with 12 forward-and-backward starters. Thursday afternoon Magella Boivin was disqualified for letting his chair stop.

The judges said there was no motion of Boivin's chair, just a fraction of a second. But they threw the book at him and Boivin was through after 23 hours, 28 minutes and four seconds.

The rocking fad in this area of Quebec—called the kingdom of the Saguenay by the natives—started last week and has led habitants a bit goggle-eyed. Jonquiere, a rival town 30 miles away, put on a rockertown with eight entrants. Daniel Lessard outrocked the others and quit, a little groggy, after 27 hours, 43 minutes and three seconds.

DRAW CROWDS

The Roberval rockers are doing their stuff in a large office located at the busiest intersection in town. More than 2,500 spectators, including visitors from nearby communities, had a gander at the contestants Wednesday night.

Ages of the competitors vary from 18 to 30. Each rocker is sponsored by a local merchant. The winner will get a trophy plus whatever the spectators toss into a collection box.

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Quemoy And Matsus Will Not Go On Trading Block

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—State Secretary Dulles told President Chiang Kai-shek Thursday Quemoy and the Matsus would not be used in any cease-fire negotiations without Nationalist consent. "Public Law Four enacted with virtual unanimity, gives the President of the United States authority to use the armed forces of the United States for securing and protecting Taiwan and the Pescadores and protection of such related positions now in friendly hands and taking such other measures as the President judges appropriate to assure the defence of Taiwan and the Pescadores," he said.

MUST BE STRONGER

In a speech shortly after Dulles left for Washington, Chiang told the closing session of the central committee of the Kuomintang—his Nationalist party—that the government must strengthen itself "to realize our mission of counter-attack and national survival."

Dulles reiterated mobile U. S. air and sea forces in the Far East would be used as a deterrent to aggression. But in a statement at the airport before his departure, he put the accent on peace.

"It is the ardent hope of the United States," he said, "that the Chinese Communists will not insist on war as an instrument of their policy."

Dulles earlier signed the mutual defence treaty under which the United States guarantees to defend Formosa and the nearby Pescadores from Red attack.

Edinburgh

EDINBURGH (Reuters)—The Scots Ancestry Research Society said Friday it has totalled up the surnames of the highlanders and lowlanders—and found that Smiths lead all the rest.

Of the total 14,666 different surnames, the Smiths top the list with 80,000 persons bearing that name.

MacDonald and Brown are the next most common names. The Campbells and the Stewarts are seventh and eighth. The MacTavishes are way down the list.

The research society said that 80 years ago there were only 6,823 different surnames, which shows the large influx of foreigners into the country. The latest arrivals are Poles and Lithuanians who have settled in the coal mining centres.

Toronto Pilot Jet Victim

OTTAWA (CP)—FO. John Louis Gordon Liggett, 37, of Toronto was the pilot killed Thursday in the collision of two Sab jets near Zweibrucken, Germany, the air force said Friday.

Flt. Lt. John Richard Farnham, 27, of St. Stephen, N. B., parachuted to safety. He was taken to the RCAF's Grostenquin air base in France by a United States Air Force parachute team.

Both pilots were members of 430 fighter squadron of No. 2 fighter wing at Grostenquin.

Air force headquarters said the two pilots were practicing battle formation flying at 40,000 feet when their Sab jets collided.

Flt. Lt. Farnham whose wife is in France with him escaped uninjured. He joined the RCAF in 1948 and following posting at Claresholm, Alta., Trenton, Ont., and Chatham, N. B., went overseas early this year.

Town On Ice

GLENWOOD, MINN. (AP)—For three months of the year a frozen city of shacks sits in dummy elegance in the bay here, looking like something dreamed up by an ice-bound ancient mariner.

Crapptown is wide open to anyone dedicated to the idea that fishing can be fun and comfortable in weather 15 below.

Crapptown is a plywood conglomeration of fishing houses that rove, at the whims of their owners and the fish, over the two-foot-thick ice cover of eight-mile-long Lake Minnetonka, northwestern Minnesota. It gets its name from the unlovely panfish which is its main industry.

The townspeople are largely week-end and night-time immigrants from Glenwood, a cozy community of 2,500 on the lake shore. The unique thing about Crapptown is the notion that no home is worth fishing from unless it's comfortable. The more meticulous wouldn't be caught on the lake without one of those easy chairs, cooking utensils and card table. Some have radios and many keep a cot.

EASY LUXURY

Each house has flooring built about six inches off the ice. Through holes in the corners are converted into storage sheds and the rest are set aside for another season.

Few kinds of fishing offer the easy luxury existing here. Many fishermen attach strips of paper to lines suspended from makeshift fish-catching crosses. Thus when the bobber on the line goes down the paper comes up, signalling to reposing or card-playing tenants that a fish is nibbling.

Chairwoman Loses Seat

LONDON (Reuters)—Dr. Edith Summerskill, chairman of the Labour party, Friday found herself without a constituency for the next general election.

A decision Thursday night by a local London Labour party rejected the former Labor cabinet minister in favor of Michael Stewart, a small wheel in the Labor register.

The choice created a stir in political circles, but the 53-year-old physician herself was not worried. "Sometimes before the elections, which will be in 1956 or before, Dr. Summerskill must find a local Labor party to let her run for Parliament. But she is certain to find a seat."

Parliamentary circles said the party chairman's rejection might have been caused because Laborites of the district concerned, Fulham in London, felt she was too far to the "right" in party politics.
