Hon James Warburton.

One who for many years occupied a prominent position in this Province has passed away.

Mr. Warburton was born of an old and excellent family, at Garryhinch, Port-arlington, Ireland, in the month of November, 1810.

A strong Liberal of the British School, he was not long here ere he began to take an active part in politics.

Mr. Warburton retired from active politics in the year 1868. In 1873 he removed from Lot 11 to Charlottetown, and he resided here until the end.

East Hastings and South Ontario.

These constituencies have both returned supporters of the Government to replace supporters of the Opposition.

The vacancy in East Hastings was occasioned by the death of Mr. Burdette, who has represented the constituency since 1887.

In South Ontario the Opposition candidate fell as one of the results of the Opposition's campaign of election petitions.

It is needless to point out that these results show that public opinion in Ontario is running strongly in favor of the Government.

Commercial Union Again.

COMMENTING upon the report that "Hon. Edward Blake is willing to re-enter public life, and place himself again at the head of the Liberal party on condition that a policy of commercial union is substituted for unrestricted reciprocity."

"It will be decidedly rough on the Liberal party for its old chief to steer straight upon the rocks the present leaders have endeavored so assiduously to hide from public view.

We agree with the Gazette that if Mr. Blake is willing to try conclusions on the commercial union platform he will find the Conservative party ready to meet him.

Our Foreign Trade.

(Montreal Gazette.)

In party political discussions the foreign trade of the country always occupies a prominent place. Supporters of the Government are wont to lay stress upon the decline in the value of our foreign commerce during the period of Liberal rule.

The foreign trade of a country, however, is neither so large nor so important, as a rule, as its domestic commerce, and if the Liberal party could establish that a continuous and considerable expansion of home commerce had occurred during their term of office, an argument to support the fiscal policy then prevailing would be adduced.

We turn now to the statistics of Canada's foreign commerce under the National Policy. In the fiscal year ending June 30th last, the aggregate value of imports and exports reached \$218,384,900, an increase of sixty-five millions, or 42 per cent., as compared with the figures for 1879.

Finally, there is the question of domestic trade since the adoption of the National Policy, and in this respect an enormous expansion has taken place. Taking again as a test the bank circulation, there is found to have been an increase from \$18,490,800 in 1879 to \$35,634,000 at the close of last December, a gain of nearly 100 per cent., and this in spite of a decline of 13 per cent. in prices during the period.

SUCCESSOR TOO LATE.

London, Feb. 22.

A large vessel, name unknown, supposed to be a Spanish steamer, is wrecked off Penzance, Cornwall. It is feared that all hands are lost. A boat containing six men set out from the vessel for the shore but capsized almost immediately in the furious gale.

Plymouth, Feb. 22.

The barquentine Harriet is stranded at Arklow Rock, three men were drowned. The mail boat just arrived from the Scilly Islands reports several large vessels lying in a distressed condition.

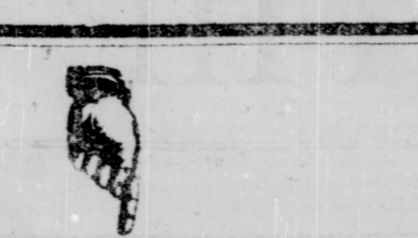
