

# Company Of Danes Reaches Egypt For UN Police Force

ABUR SUWEIR, Egypt (AP)—A company of Danes of the UN police force moved into Port Said Wednesday. The force commander Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns, crossed the man's land to inspect front-line positions which his men are expected to occupy today.

Gen. Burns checked foxholes and front-line emplacements on both the British-French and Egyptian sides of the cease-fire line. The neutral troops are to take up positions on both sides of the line.

At UN headquarters in New York Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld said he expects to have 400 troops in Egypt in two weeks. More than 200 Danes went by train and car from this UN assembly base to Port Said to join

the 200 Norwegians who moved in a week ago.

**EXPLOSION GREETED MEN**  
The noise of explosion greeted the arrivals. An Egyptian tossed a grenade within earshot of the Danes and Sir Charles Keightley, commander-in-chief of the British-French forces. The grenade, authorities said, was thrown at a British patrol clearing the area at curfew hour. No one was injured.

UN officials said the movement to Port Said would continue until the UN force there had been built up to battalion strength—three rifle companies and a headquarters company or a total of about 700 men.

The British and French have indicated they would begin a staged withdrawal of their forces, matching the arrival of UN forces. But Lt.-Gen. Sir Hugh Stockwell, British commander, said he had no immediate plans for such a withdrawal now. He said he was still making the area "secure."

The Yugoslav contingent at Balah is expected to be strengthened today by the arrival of 700 more soldiers by sea at Port Said.

The UN buildup in the canal zone continued with the arrival of five RCAF C-119 Flying Boxcars at Abu Suweir with 152 soldiers from four countries. They included 28 Danes, 70 Norwegians, 37 Canadians and 17 Indians.

This was a very strong class, and was won by the reserve grand champion of the show. To compare the calibre of the exhibits, the grand champion female of the '56 Amherst Winter Fair placed 13th in this class. Mr. Boswell regrets he was too busy to make Amherst this year. The Charlotte-town champion stood 10th in another class.

The Lealands cow (for which they turned down a good offer), with her three-year-old sister also won a fourth placing in progeny of dam in very strong competition. The bull calf which placed third was a maternal brother of these two. There were 26 in his class, which was headed by the junior champion, owned by Richard Bros. of Red Deer, Alberta, who showed also the grand champion bull. The Scotch calf was sold later for \$1,200 in the Ayrshire Sale of Stars.

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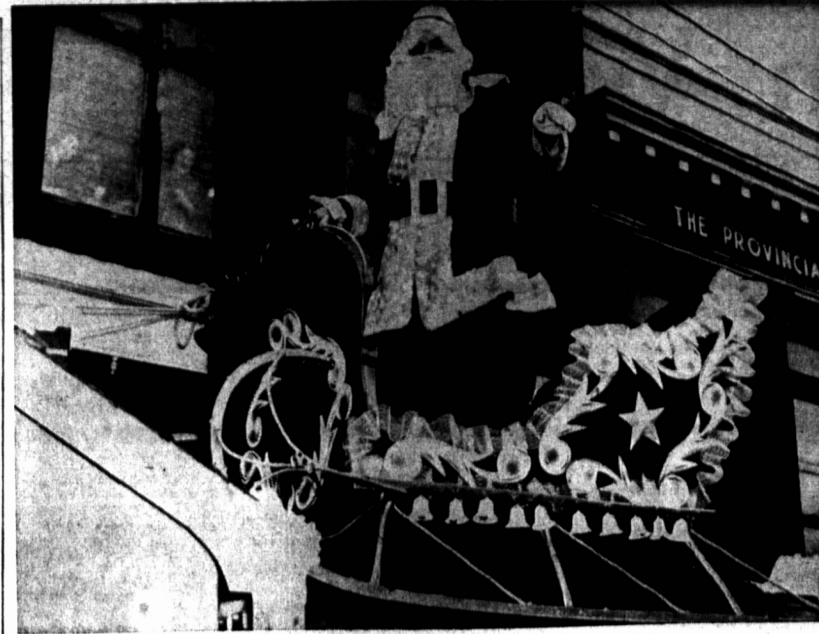
