NEWS FROM OTTAWA.

Parliament Meets Again To-Day.

False Reports of the Opposition Press.

OTTAWA, June 16. Parliament will resume its sittings this afternoon, when Michael Connolly will be brought before the bar of the House to answer for his refusal to surrender the custody of the books of his firm.

The Cabinet announcements will also be made. Mr. Abbott becomes President of the Council. The portfolio of Railways and Canals will be placed temporarily in charge of an Ontario Minister.

The House will probably adjourn early and a Conservative caucus be held to-morrow.

The reports that Hon. Mr. Chapleau is kicking are false, as also are the alleged interviews with him published by the Montreal Herald and several American journals.

The Grit press is busily engaged in manufacturing all sorts of yarns. Hon. Mr. Chapleau sprained his ankle in Montreal on Saturday night and was unable to leave his home yesterday, which accounts for his absence from the Cabinet meeting.

The Prince of Wales

EATS HUMBLE PIE.

Judicious Action of the Government.

LONDON, June 16

In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Stanhope, alluding to the baccarat scandal, said the regulations had never been special brought to the notice of the Prince of Wales, but when they were brought to his notice, and looking back at all the circumstances of the case, the Prince saw the error of judgment he had committed in not requiring Sir Wm. G. Cumming to immediately report the matter to the commanding officer. Mr. Stanhope added, "in this view of the case I concur; but I should not like to express my own personal opinion that had any one else suddenly heard that one of his friends who had greatly distinguished himself in the service had been accused as Sir William Gordon Cumming was accused he certainly would have hesitated before at once adopting a course which would immediately inevitably blight his whole future."

Henry Peyton Cable, who had intended to question the Secretary of War as to what action he meant to take in regard to the Prince of Wales, General Williams and Lieut. Levitt for signing the document which allowed Cumming to remain an officer in the army, did not, in view of Mr. Stanhope's statement, put the question he had prepared. Interest in the baccarat question attracted to the House of Commons yesterday the largest afternoon attendance of the season. The speakers, ladies and strangers galleries were packed, the House hushed and intensely expectant listened eagerly to Stanhope's statement, which had evidently been carefully prepared. The utter absence of an official attempt at defence rendered the reply acceptable to every side and has taken the pith of the Radical intention to continue their agitation. Several extremists at a subsequent conference tried to arrange for a motion declaring that the Prince of Wales ought to be censured for indiscretion. The bulk of the opposition are, however, averse to any further action and want the matter to be settled where Mr. Stanhope left it.

Village Destroyed by Fire.

OTTAWA, June 16. The village of Casselman, thirty miles from Ottawa, was almost wiped out by fire last night, causing great destruction of mills and lumber. Loss estimated at \$150,000. Two hundred men are thrown out of work. Assistance was sent from Ottawa, which helped materially to extinguish the flames.

Sir Charles Tupper's Movements.

LONDON, June 16. Sir Charles Tupper left Vienna last Saturday, having concluded his business at the Postal Congress. He will not arrive in London until next Saturday.

Swiss Railway Accident.

LONDON, June 16. Details of the Swiss railway disaster reveal a shocking sacrifice of human life. The number of killed is not known, but is much larger than was at first supposed.

Arrival of Immigrants.

MONTREAL, June 16. Seven hundred immigrants arrived at Montreal by the S. S. Parisian on Saturday night.
