**MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT—BOAT UPSET AND ONE LIFE LOST.**

On Thursday last, during the heavy gale that was blowing at the time, the Ferry Boat, running between Canso Point and Charlottetown, was upset when about half way across, and sunk immediately. There were on board at the time three men and a boy, viz. John Jonstone, the Ferryman, his boy Francis Murphy, Hugh Curry, of the West River, and Neil Curry of Nine Mile Creek. The three first named persons were picked up by a boat from Warren Farm, after being about an hour in the water, in which they supported themselves by two oars from the lost boat, and the latter named person, Neil Curry, sunk from exhaustion while attempting to swim ashore, and was drowned. This unfortunate man bore the character of an upright and industrious farmer, and has left a wife and seven children in a destitute condition.

A Coroner's inquest was held this day on view of the body of the deceased, when a verdict of Accidental Death was returned.
