A STRANGE CASE.—Charles Baxter, son of John Baxter, of Digby, N. S., returned home a day or two since from a Boston hospital, where for the last four years he has been under the best medical treatment that the city afforded. Baxter is suffering from cancer and has some home to die, having been pronounced incurable. The peculiar origin of his trouble has attracted some attention. Several years ago, when a child, Baxter was scratched by a companion near the right eye. The place soon healed, leaving no mark; but years later on the scratch revived, terminating as above mentioned.

ATHLETIC.—At the amateur championship meeting on the Manhattan Club grounds, New York, on Saturday, Oct. 2, of Toronto, won the mile run (time 4:27 4/5), Hjortberg, of New Jersey A. C.; 2nd, Walsen, of Xavier A. C.; 3rd, Turner, of the Manhattan A. C.; won the half mile (1:58 2/5), Eldron, of Montreal, 2nd. The five-mile race won by W. D. D. for a terrific struggle by about 30 yards (time 25:59 2/5), E. C. Carter, second. In the 120 yards hurdle Puffer smashed the world's record, doing it in 15 2/5. Jewett won the 100 and 120 in 10 and 21 4/5 seconds respectively.

A Cool Reception.

DUBLIN, Oct. 4. The reception accorded to Lord Houghton, the new Lord Lieutenant, was hearty only at certain points passed by the procession. The Jesuit College did not display a single flag. No addresses were presented. There was no reception by the municipal authorities, and no sign of public interest.

Blair's St. John Ticket.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 4. Attorney-General Blair has formed his ticket for the St. John constituencies without a convention. It is composed of Dr. George Hetherington, A. T. Trueman and John L. Carleton, barristers, and R. Allan, druggist; with A. J. Dunn and John McLeod for the parishes. It is remarked that the four city candidates are provincial office holders.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4. The election for Hochelaga will be held on the 21st inst. Deputy Minister Sedgewick authorizes an emphatic denial to the rumor that he has been appointed to the Supreme Court bench.

The Insurance Case.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 4. The preliminary hearing of the insurance case occupied all day yesterday and will be resumed on Wednesday. Evidence corroborative of the charges was given, but no new facts were brought out.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—Yates Thompson has sold the Pall Mall Gazette to Mr. Kneighley, member of the National Liberal Club. It is rumored the paper will become liberal unionist in politics.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 2.—Sunday afternoon, in the case of high treason against the Home-Stevedoers' board, Justice Pax in decided that the accused should give bail in \$10,000 each. Up to a late hour Mr. Bird was the only one of the defendants who had secured necessary bonds. The others are in jail. Three of the rifles taken from the Pinkertons were found in the house of a Hungarian.

PARIS, Oct. 2.—Joseph Ernest Renan, the distinguished philologist and author, died this morning. On Tuesday last he went driving, and caught a severe cold, which speedily developed into congestion of the lungs. Saturday evening his condition necessitated a painful operation, after which Mr. Renan fell into a state of heavy somnolence and never recovered.

MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—The Halifax sugar refinery has been lately shipping round lots of sugar both to Boston and Chicago. As the rate by boat from Halifax to Boston is only 10 cents a barrel, that forms only a trifling obstacle and a correspondingly low rate has been obtained to Chicago. Both refineries in Montreal have been lately exporting sugar to the United States ports. The sugar trust of the United States has been unable to obtain all the beet necessary to fill its orders, and this is the reason the Canadian refineries have been able to sell on the other side of the line.

TO LOAD WITH OATS.—The bark Chasibel, Capt. W. Ish, and the barkentine Route, Capt. L. Leck, have gone to Sumnerdale to load with oats for the United Kingdom. Both were towed out by Capt. Paul's steam tug May Queen—the former on Sunday afternoon and the latter yesterday.

A NEW YORK EVICTION.—In New York, a few days ago, while a deputy sheriff was moving the effects of Mrs. Halpin, an aged invalid, into the street for non-payment of rent, the woman, who was heart-broken, expired kneeling in prayer.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—At Halifax on Saturday evening, Joseph S. Belcher, insurance agent and commission merchant, was thrown from his carriage by his horse running away, and sustained a fracture of the skull. He was picked up unconscious with blood pouring from his ears, and died the following night, consciousness not returning. Mr. Belcher was about 60 years of age, a prominent Methodist and a very well known citizen. His daughter, who was also thrown out, escaped without injury.

ELOPED WITH HIS GRANDMOTHER.—Albert Wirtman, a twenty-five-year-old barber of Buffalo, N. Y., has eloped with his grandmother, a wealthy woman of seventy years of age. Wirtman leaves a wife and child in direly straitened circumstances. He had been in the habit of spending much time at the old lady's house, and last Monday they took a west-bound train together.
