Important to Stock Dealers.

DURING his recent visit to Ottawa, Hon. Mr. Ferguson, Provincial Secretary, had an interview with Mr. Schreiber, Chief Engineer and General Manager of Government Railways, upon whom he urged the great necessity there is for some more speedy means of transporting live stock from the Island to New Brunswick and the United States than now exists.

We are happy to be in a position to-day to state that in consequence of Mr. Ferguson's representations, the General Manager has issued instructions for the placing on the Intercolonial Railway of a freight express train on Mondays only from Point du Chene to connect with the Island boats and with the freight express on the New Brunswick Railway.

By this new arrangement, shippers can combine to send their stock from Charlottetown, by steamer on Sunday night and from Summerside on Monday morning, reach Point du Chene without re-shipment, and transfer to special freight train which will reach St. John Monday night and proceed direct by the New Brunswick Railway, arriving in Bangor early on Tuesday.

In a day or two the Department will doubtless issue official notice to the public of this latest departure. Our stock buyers will observe that it remains entirely in their own hands whether this arrangement, which is experimental at first, will be made permanent. Besides the twelve or fifteen hundred horses which are annually sent from the Island, it is estimated that before this season closes, between twenty-five or thirty thousand sheep and lambs will have been shipped, which serves to show the value this new arrangement will be, both to stock raisers and buyers.

Canadian Fruit in London.

The consignment of fruit sent from Ontario to the Colonial and Indian Exhibition has arrived. It consists of ninety-four cases. On being opened up it was found that most of the apples were in good condition. Some of the harder classes of pear were also found to be in fair condition, though the Flemish Beauty were much damaged, and the Clapp's Favorite and Bartlett varieties quite gone.

Canadian Butter in England.

The London Daily News of a recent date contains an interesting letter on the merits of Canadian butter, from the pen of Mr. James W. Robertson, a recognized authority on the subject. The purpose of the letter is "to speak to Canada of England's unsupplied need of fine pure butter, and to England of Canada's power and resources to supply it."

The returns of the Ottawa Assessment Commissioners show an increase in assessed value of property of about \$700,000 since last year.

During the present season five thousand head of Montana cattle have passed over the Canadian Pacific Railway to Winnipeg.

Spring Park Stream.

At the meeting of the Board of Health last evening the report of Dr. Johnson and Messrs. Haszard and Curtis, the committee appointed to inspect Spring Park stream, was read and discussed. On the 30th and 31st September the committee made a thorough inspection of the stream as well as of the district through which it passes in its course from the Malpeque Road, near Henry's lime kiln, to the lower end of the pond at Kent Street.

The drainage from a large area of low, swampy land flows, or is conducted by drains, into the Spring Park stream, which itself is a continuation of a muddy stream descending from a muddy stream far back in the Royalty. The committee also report that "a wooden conduit, about a foot square, extends from the Woolen Factory to the Bridge on the Spring Park Road, under which it empties its contents. This conduit carries off the dye and other waste waters from the Woolen Factory, as well as the refuse from the Wool Washing Establishment and the Tannery a little below the factory."

In their report the committee also deal with the Government Pond nuisance. They make special mention of the "unsanitary state of things along the water-course from below the bridge on Spring Park Road to the bridge on Kent Street. By the damming of the water at the latter point the stream is backed up as far as the former, causing a swamp between Boyle's and McKinnon's tanneries, and the collection of large pools of stagnant, putrid water."

The committee also advise the Board to construct "a straight channel of sufficient width, with a breastwork of brush or other suitable material to extend from Brighton to the Kent Street Bridge, and to fill up the remainder of the pond to a proper level. The sewer from Government House should then be extended so as to empty itself into the channel."

On the right we find the graves of his two little daughters, who preceded him, and on his left that of his only son. Here lie father, son and daughters waiting the sound of the trumpet, when they shall rise to meet Christ. We notice that the graves are kept green and neat, and if we wait we may see the childless widow, all true love and devotion, come and tenderly place some fresh flowers on the graves. She pays her daily visit to the graves where sleep what was once her hope and joy.
