Local and Other Items

MARRIAGE BELLS.—The marriage of Mr Wesley J Murray, formerly of Bradalbane but for the past twelve years a resident of Portland, Me, and Miss Minnie E Meyer, is to be solemnised at Yarmouthville, Me, this (Wednesday) evening. Mr Nelson S J Murray, of Bradalbane, a brother of the groom, left on Monday to be present at the interesting ceremony.

CURE FOR TRUNCY.—In the days of old the truant had his anatomy well dusted, to induce him not to stay away from school. Now he is coaxed to his lessons by engaging him in the school teams for football, baseball and lacrosse. That, at least, is the cure for truncy which Hon. G. W. Ross advised yesterday at Chatham, where he was presenting diplomas. He strongly advised the study of music in the schools.—Toronto Star.

There is some comment in London over the fact that Colonel McDonald, who some people claim, saved the battle of Omdurman by his promptness and skill in repulsing a Dervish onslaught which General Kitchener overlooked, was not included among those who have received Sudan decorations, although he has been promoted to be an aide-de-camp of the Queen. Col. MacDonald came from the ranks and was one of the officers who survived the Majala Hill disaster.

COMMITTED SUICIDE.—Mrs Lemuel Hayden, of Elmsdale, ended her life Tuesday by throwing herself in a well. THE BRAM CASE.—A Boston despatch says: The former crew of the barkentine Herbert Fuller are still being boarded by the Government. The authorities are not satisfied that the famous Bram murder case will not be re-opened, and are determined to be prepared for emergencies. There is a possibility that the sailors will be wanted again, to give testimony, but there has been no movement as yet to have the life sentence of Bram set aside.
