SPORTS AT SUMMERSIDE.—The Summerside Amateur Athletic Association intend having a big meet on their track at that place on Dominion Day. The programme will consist of bicycle races, running races, jumping and other contests.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.—We learn that the building firm of Schurman, Lefurgey, Clark & Co., have secured the contract from the local government for building the new Prince of Wales College, their tender being the lowest. Their tender was in the neighborhood of \$19,000, and is only \$50 below the next. The new college will be a brick structure. —Pioneer.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Bonavista arrived from Montreal this morning about two o'clock, bringing a large general cargo. She will leave this afternoon for St. John, Nfld via North Sydney. Her outward cargo will consist of 70 head cattle, 100 sheep and 4 horses on deck, and a large consignment of potatoes and other produce under deck. Mrs. Stavart and Mrs. Foote go as passengers.

SHIPPED FROM SUMMERSIDE.—On Wednesday Mr. Chas. A. McNutt took away 18 sheep for Halifax and three horses also formed part of the cargo. On Friday Mr. J. A. Collett shipped a fine driver to Mr. J. D. Weldon, of Shediac, and on Saturday Mr. C. Kane shipped 24 fat cattle and a horse to Mr. P. Macdonald, of St. John. On the latter day 500 bags of potatoes also formed part of the cargo. —Pioneer.

BITTEN BY A HORSE.—The Summerside Pioneer says: Mr. James Pyram, belonging to Cape Breton, and cook on board the schooner Samuel Drake, at present unloading coal at Holman's wharf, was badly bitten on the right shoulder by a horse on Saturday forenoon. The horse was attached to a cart getting filled with coal and the cook was at the guy. He had on an oil coat and that was torn to pieces. Dr. McLellan dressed the wound but Mr. Pyram is suffering considerably with pain.

CANADA PLEASED HIM.

What a Unitarian Minister Has to Say About Canada.

An Albany, N. Y., despatch says: Dr. Wm. M. Brundage, the Unitarian minister, gave a very interesting lecture on some changes of public sentiment in Canada, before the Albany institute last evening. He passed a week there lately preaching in Ottawa and elsewhere and instead of a region of ice and snow, he found, in passing from Toronto to Quebec, a rich agricultural country, equal in fertility and cultivation to anything in the United States. The Catawba grape so flourishes there that the wine made from it is said to excel any made in this country. Toronto, Hamilton and Ottawa showed signs of industry, thrift and prosperity. Laws seemed to be made to be obeyed and not evaded. No policemen levied blackmail, and no side doors were open on Sundays when Sunday laws were enacted. The franchises of street railways were paid for both in a bonus to the city and in the giving of eight per cent. of the gross earnings to the city through which they ran.

The civil service is a profession, and founded on the system in England. The Ministry, or Privy Council, governs, and the Governor General is a figure head. All contested elections are settled in the courts. The Manitoba school question in its settlement showed that a revolution in public opinion on some state questions had taken place. In the Province of Quebec at the dissolution of the last Parliament, the Liberals stood 23 to 46 Conservatives. At the subsequent election 53 Liberals were elected and 19 Conservatives. The proclamation of President Cleveland at the time of the Venezuelan disturbance wrought a revolution almost in a day in the Dominion of Canada in regard to a union with the United States, so that from a general growing sentiment toward a union there came a universal feeling of separation; if not repulsion, toward this country. Dr. Brundage went there with his eyes open, and observed with the experience of a man of travel and keen observation.
