## Terry Downes Stops Moyer

LONDON (AP)—Terry Downes, British middleweight champion, defeated Phil Moyer of Portland, Ore., on a technical knockout in the ninth round Tuesday night.

British referee Jack Hart stopped the fight after 30 seconds of the sixth round when blood flowed from a cut over Moyer's right eye. Moyer had suffered in the 16th round. Downes weighed 164 pounds, Moyer 175.

A sellout crowd of 14,000 at London's Wembley stadium paid \$10 to watch the fight. Downes was reported to receive \$30,000 and Moyer \$12,000.

Downes, a 29-year-old Cockney, who once served with the

U.S. Marines, now has a 31-1 record. Moyer is 30-7-1.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Harold Satterfield, the new Los Angeles Rams coach, announced a drastic lineup change Tuesday as an effort to shake his squad out of its worst season since moving here from Cleveland in 1946.

There will be six new starters when the Rams take the field here against San Francisco Friday. A team spokesman called it the most drastic shakeup of the team in memory.

"We're going to get some people in there who we think will give us a better chance of winning the championship," Satterfield said.

"I don't see how I can lose," he said with a grin. "I see face. No amateur alive can beat me."

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## Stengel's Mets Open 1963 Campaign Tuesday

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Mets, with nowhere to go but up, opened their 1963 baseball campaign Tuesday by announcing through general manager George Weiss that the roster would be pared sufficiently to draft at least eight men from the minor league meetings, Nov. 26 in Rochester, N.Y.

Revealing that trade talks have been active although "it looks like nothing will be consummated before Rochester," Mets president Tom Campisi said in 1962 was greater than expected, so was outgo.

Revealing that for the first time, contrary to long established tradition set by New York Yankees and the old New York Giants, both the Yankees and the Mets this season claimed other players on whom managers had been asked. No general managers and no names were made public.

Weiss said he hoped to open 1963 in the new Flushing Meadows Park municipal stadium, which seats 55,000. Steel work has been completed, and the stadium most of which is prefabricated, is being put in place. If the work is not done in time for the 1963 season, it will be used again.

Weiss admitted that although baseball men generally say it is essential for the National League to have a strong club in New York "there hasn't been any great tendency" to help the Mets in trades.

Looking back on the 1962 season, during which the Mets finished last with 40 victories, 120 defeats, and a 250 percent loss, Weiss observed:

"Of course it had to be a disappointment. We gambled on young pitchers and either they were not as far advanced as we hoped, or the club was not able to give them the support they needed."

"The proposal is subject to ratification by the organizations involved. All these organizations will proceed with their programs, which will be coordinated under the proposed coalition."

"Details are to be worked out later."

## Athletic Ass'n's Settle Long Feud

NEW YORK (CP)—The feud between the Amateur Athletic Union and the National Collegiate Athletic Association settled at least temporarily their 24-year war for control of track and field in the United States Tuesday by forming a coalition group.

The warring groups reached agreement after three hours of negotiations following a marathon 13-hour session Monday at which the NCAA and the AAU's General Robert F. Kennedy settled their differences for the first time.

The NCAA, sponsored U.S. Track and Field Federation, however, claimed it too could sanction open meets.

Asked if the new NCAA executive director Walter Byers snapped, "That's all I can tell you."

Presumably, however, the AAU will sanction federation meets and the federation, in turn, will withdraw its threat to keep all collegians from participating in AAU-sponsored events.
