THE LATE FIRE.--The venerable pile at the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets, was smoking all day yesterday. We learn that Mr. Fraser intends erecting a store (we hope of brick) in its stead. THE FIRE BELL.--We learn that the fire bell was badly broken, after being violently rung for about three-quarters of an hour during the fire, on Monday night. The break extends about two feet and a half, and completely destroys the sound of the bell. If this be true, the big bell is a big "sell."

MARKETS.--In the market yesterday, butter (fresh) sold from 23 to 26 cents per pound; do (tub), from 21 to 23 cents per pound. Eggs, from 17 to 20 cents per dozen. Beef (small pieces), from 8 to 14 cents per pound; do (per quarter) from 7 to 10 cents per pound. Hay, from \$17 to \$19 per ton, and oats from 40 to 50 cents per bushel.

HONKAWAY.--A horse attached to a sulky took flight and ran away on Pownall street last evening. He turned into Grafton street and in his attempt to enter the alleyway between Hall's Fish Market and the Engine House the sulky upset. A woman who was standing at the entrance was struck in the head by the wheel and a portion of her ear taken off. The horse was uninjured.

CANADIAN AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE FOR EUROPE.--While New Brunswick is shipping potatoes, P. E. Island potatoes and oats, to Europe, the Upper Provinces are not behind in moving in the same direction. From the Montreal Gazette we learn that "considerable quantities of potatoes and onions are being bought for shipment to Great Britain. Cabbages are exceedingly abundant and cheap, although large quantities are being shipped to towns and cities on the banks of the St. Lawrence, from Kingstown to Quebec. The steamer "Alexandra," on her last trip to Kingstown, took over 5 000 heads of cabbages as part of her load." The Toronto Globe says the first direct shipment of wheat from Manitoba to Europe took place last week, one car load having been consigned from Winnipeg to Glasgow. About the same time 40,000 bushels of Ontario barley were being shipped from New York to England.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 29.

Turkey prohibits the exportation of grain.

The Porte denies the Russian victory at Dubinok.

The British ambassador at St. Petersburg has been ordered to confer with Gortschakoff on the question of mediation.

The Czar has instructed Gortschakoff to prepare for a revision of the Russian constitution.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 29.

Brelowski, a Pole, known in the Turkish army as Gen. Nihad, is appointed Suleiman Pasha's chief of staff, and Gen. Mena, a Belgian, for the command of the cavalry division at Rasgrad.

A despatch from Alexandrianople, 27th, gives no later information about Kara than that his place is completely invested. The despatch says Gen. Terguksoff occupied Barjez.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 29.

Yesterday a body of Russians carried a Turkish position at Felische, west of Plevna. One Pasha, several officers, and seven companies of Turkish troops were taken prisoners. Three cannon were also captured.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 29.

A detachment of Russians are at Stajiza, south of the Balkans, in the rear of Orchauc.

Mukhtar Pasha, telegraphing on Saturday, announced that the Russians were encamped within three hours' march of his headquarters.

MONTREAL, Oct. 29.

Ten thousand cigars, valued at thirty-six dollars per thousand, have been stolen from a bonded warehouse.

The South Eastern Railway sees the Conn. and Pasumpsic Railway in \$200,000. P. M. G. Huntington was married in New York on Saturday, to Mrs. Marsh.

It is rumored that Laurier will try Quebec Centre.

Two actresses of the Academy of Music have been robbed of jewelry and silk dresses.

PARIS, Oct. 29.

The results of the second ballots, yesterday, for deputies, where no choice occurred on the 14th, show nine Government and two Republicans elected. In three arrondissements the Republican candidates claiming that they were elected on the 14th inst. did not stand yesterday, it being their intention to submit their claims to the Deputies.

The Republicans, however, did not attach much importance to these supplemental elections, because, excluding the three uncontested arrondissements above mentioned, ten second ballots were rendered necessary simply by a division of the Conservative vote between opposing Royalist and Bonapartist candidates, one of whom has now withdrawn, rendering the result certain.

Later intelligence shows that 15 second ballots were held, resulting in the election of 11 Conservative and 4 Republicans. The Chamber now stands 320 Republicans and 210 Conservatives.
