U. S. REPLY TO LI.

CHINESE GOVERNMENT MUST PERMIT COMMUNICATION WITH MINISTERS.

The State Department at Washington, has made public the following correspondence between Li Hung Chang and the department regarding the abandonment of the campaign in Pekin:—

Telegram sent to the United States Embassies in Berlin, London, Paris, Rome, and St. Petersburg, and to the United States Minister, Tokio:—
Department of State, Washington, Aug. 1, 1900:—

In reply to a suggestion of Li-Hung-Chang that the Ministers might be sent under safe escort to Tien-Tsin, provided the powers would engage not to march on Pekin, the Secretary of State replied, on the 30th of July:—

"This Government will not enter into any arrangement regarding disposition or treatment of Legations without first having free communication with Minister Corger. Responsibility for their protection rests upon Chinese Government. Power to deliver at Tien-Tsin presupposes power to protect and to open communication. This is insisted on."

This message was delivered by Mr. Goodnow on the 31st to Viceroy Li, who then enquired whether "if free communication were established between Ministers and their Government it could be arranged that the powers should not advance on Pekin pending negotiations."

To this enquiry the following reply was sent on the 1st of August:—

"Goodnow, Consul-General, Shanghai: "I do not think it expedient to submit the proposition of Earl Li to the other powers. Free communication with our representatives in Pekin is demanded as a matter of absolute right and not as a favour. Since the Chinese Government admits that it possesses the power to give communication, it puts itself in an unfriendly attitude by denying it. No negotiations seem advisable until the Chinese Government shall have put the diplomatic representatives of the powers in full and free communication with their respective Governments, and remove all danger to their lives and liberty. We would urge Earl Li earnestly to advise the Imperial authorities of China to place themselves in friendly communication and co-operation with the relief expedition. They are assuming a heavy responsibility in acting otherwise."

CIVILIZATION IN CHINA.

Mr. Monier tells this story about official life in China: "A short time ago the Emperor of China made up his mind that the street of the legations in Pekin should at last be paved. To insure the work being done, he himself provided the money—some \$16,000. This sum was handed to a

high official of the Public Roads and Highway Department. It entered into the mind of this dignitary that the work could be done for much less. He very soon found an enterprising contractor who undertook the task for \$5,000. No. 2 had, however, views similar to those of No. 1, and was equally successful in finding a No. 3, who, in his turn, considered \$2,500 an extravagant sum for so insignificant an undertaking. The street was eventually paved at the cost of \$16." And yet some say that the Chinese are not in an advanced condition of civilization.

The Tartar travels with his family and his followers. Wives and children in baskets are mounted on camel back, and only the actual leaders go afoot, with the long string of their charges following in single file, tied together in line. Warmly clad in heavy wadded underclothes, topped by enormous sheepskins, their heads covered with long eared fur caps, in addition to which they put on fur earbags, and on their legs "Mongol socks," that is, soft-high boots of sheepskin, under felt overshoes, thickly studded with iron nails, these people look to the life the Tartar of the children's book of types. Beyond Kalgan the plateau rises to an elevation of four thousand feet, and the icy blast that sweeps across it cuts into the skin and pierces through the stoutest cloth. The Tartar differs considerably from the Chinaman, or even from his kinsman, the Manchu, in the ruddy yellow of his face and the pleasant frankness of his glance. He seems to favor bright colors, and on the top of his fur hood he often sticks the gold-buttoned cap of Chinese official rank, while the women's jackets are of yellow and scarlet, as well of Chinese blue.

SENT TO THEIR HUSBANDS.

Another batch of Boer women and children were sent from Pretoria through the British lines to join their relatives. Three days' provisions were given them. They seemed grateful, and sang in the train. The exodus of Boer families from Pretoria has surprised and angered the enemy. The step was a wise one, however. The women, though living on our rations, were bitterly anti-British. Very few of them owned property, and many were living rent free in the houses here. Some of the cases were exceptional. One woman who had been drawing rations for six weeks was proved to be the owner of fourteen oxen, ten mules, and £500 in ready cash. She was compelled to join her fighting husband outside, and boasted that she had fooled the English.

A PECULIAR PRAYER.

A good story has reached a Cape paper showing how a Dutch Reformed Church minister compromised his prayers between the Queen and the Presidents. "O Lord," he cried, "do Thou bless the heads of the Republics in this country: and as for this Gracious Lady who wants more territory, but has ruled over us so well, please take her to Thyself, where she may live and reign for ever and ever."

A COLONIAL ADDITION.

They are singing an additional verse to the National Anthem in Pretoria. It runs as follows:

Long may her colonies
Waft from each shore her praise,
Happy and free;
Sons of the fatherland,
Brothers in heart and hand,
O, may our empire stand,
Upheld by Thee.

It is related in an English news paper that a seventy-two year old recruit had passed the doctor's examination for the Imperial Yeomanry. He had served twenty-eight years in the Black Watch, the Gordons and other Highland regiments, and has six sons serving in the army, four at the front in South Africa. While the old lion has such cubs there need be no fear that the sun will ever set on the British empire.

The economic aspect of the traction engines with the British army in South Africa is not without interest. Operating on the bare veldt, seven of these machines have performed an aggregate of 5,000 ton-miles per day of profitable haulage. At the current rate paid for bullock transportation, three shillings and three pence per ton-mile, a traction engine will pay for itself in ten days.

A new story is told of the visit in 1883 of the Boer deputation, Kruger, Du Toit and General N. J. Smit, to the continent, after going to England to get "better terms" than they received after Majuba. At a banquet given them in Berlin, Smit was entertained by the company with stories of how the burghers had shot down the English during the war of 1881, "when Bismarck, who had been listening to the conversation, said to the person whose General) if he knows what would have happened to himself and friends had Disraeli been in power." Smit answered "No," "Well," said Bismarck, "I tell you. You would have hanged the tallest tree in the Transvaal long ago."
