Colony's Sugar Output Lower

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Aug. 6.—(CP)—Trinidad's total sugar production for the season just ended was fixed at 128,400 tons compared with 133,551 tons in the previous season.

Officials of the Sugar Manufacturers' Association attributed the drop mainly to a decrease in fall deliveries. Farmers were unable to make the deliveries because poor methods of cultivation were unable to cope with different weather conditions and excessive rains. The colony fell 7,000 tons short of its export quota but prospects this year point to the next season as a favorable one.

Antiques Found As Home Razed

HALIFAX, Aug. 6.—(CP)—Demolition of a century-old Halifax home to make way for improving a hotel site has brought to light many articles of historic interest. The home, built in 1816, was a model of the city's famous Public Gardens.

One of the articles taken from it and placed in the Provincial Museum is an old cast iron bake oven. The oven stood in the open fire-place of the home. The house was similar to many of those built early in the west century when Halifax families grew wealthy in the West Indies trade. It was called Brookside because a creek, now filled in, ran by it.

After it had passed through the hands of two owners, it housed the convent of the Sacred Heart in 1869. Fifteen years later it again passed into private hands, being bought by a merchant family who filled it with Victorian furniture. About 10 years ago a big hole was built on the spacious grounds. The house was cut up into apartments.
