

Belleville Wins Cup, Hopes To Go To World Tournament

KELOWNA, B.C. (CP) — With the Allan Cup in their luggage, Belleville McFarlands prepared Friday night for the long journey home and a quest for the supreme honor of Canadian amateur hockey — recognition as Canada's representative in the world hockey championships.

The Macs spent Friday saying goodbye to the many friends they have made in this sunny orchard valley during the two weeks it took them to beat Kelowna Packers in the Canadian senior hockey championships.

They came from behind to take the best-of-seven series 4-3 Thursday night with an 8-5 victory.

Team manager Drury Denyes said a Belleville delegation will be present at the May 15-17 meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in Toronto to ask that the Macs represent Canada in the 1959 world tournament.

"I think these boys are worthy to represent Canada," Denyes said. "Besides, this is the first time in 12 years the cup has been won away from home."

He said Mayor Gerald B. Hyde likely will lead the Belleville deputation to Toronto.

PACKERS' PRAISE

There was hearty endorsement for the Belleville request among the Kelowna team. Packers' president Bob McKinstry had high praise for the new champions.

"It would be impossible to take it away from those Belleville boys. They were a terrific passing and shooting club and they just never seemed to know when they were licked — maybe that's why they weren't," McKinstry said.

Referee Charles Deziel of Montreal added his support to the Belleville cause.

He said the Macs seemed a better team than Whitby Dunlops did before they were strengthened for this year's world tournament. He said if the Belleville team was given replacements of the same calibre as the Dunlops were "they will be hard to beat."

The MacFarlands were to leave early today for the big welcome awaiting them back home.

Montreal Royals are performing at a fast clip in the International League.

The Royals made a successful home opening on Wednesday but they had to stage a thrilling finish to edge the victors.

After 15 games had been played, the Montrealers were leading the loop with 12 big victories, good for a cool .800 percentage. Billy (Dorchester, N. B.) Harris was responsible for exactly 25% of those triumphs.

Billy was given the honour of hurling the opening game in Montreal but he didn't figure in the decision. Royals needed a three-run ninth inning to pull out a 4-3 verdict over Miami Marlins and Billy wasn't around at that time. He pitched most creditable ball but Royals weren't hitting and he was lifted for a pinch hitter in the seventh. He did however save his undefeated record and his next time out he'll be going for a 40 mark.

Harris' work is followed with keen interest by every ball fan in the Maritimes. Los Angeles Dodgers could surely use Billy now, if he was to use the same magic in the National League that he is dishing out in the International.

He'll be back up there.

Wasn't it the Chicago White Sox who so gamely fought New York Yankees last year in the American League?

Yes, the same White Sox that are now flourishing in the second division feuding with Boston's faltering Red Sox for sole possession of the league basement.

Sure the season is young and many things can happen before September 29, but you can't just go spotting teams like the Yankees 5 or 6 games in April alone and expect to get home in front.

Both Boston and Chicago will improve. That's for certain, because there's no other way to go. But their rise, we think, will be far short of what is needed to bring a pennant flying in Fenway Park or Comiskey Park. We don't think either of them will land the runner-up spot, much less grab the bunting.

What do you think?

Somebody better put a halt to those impudent Chicago Cubs. It's bad enough to be leading the National League but they got there by turning out — of all teams — the world champion Milwaukee Braves. On Wednesday they handed one of the Braves' top hurlers a loss as they handed the Milwaukee gang an 8-2 trouncing. Thursday they were even more the part of upstarts. They faced the great Lew Burdette who was almost a one-man show in the 1957 World Series and they refused to be awed. They got a two-run jump on Lew before he was lifted in the seventh and fought off a Brave rally that seemed certain to put the game out of the fire. The Cubs broke up a 2-2 ball game with a run in the last of the ninth.

Joe Drabowsky got the win in relief and Burdette got off the hook, with Bob Trowbridge taking the loss. The Milwaukee power was silenced but the Cubs clouted a pair of four base knocks. Walls and Gorry were the 'culprits'.

At that the Chicago club made three miscues but it wasn't enough to give the victory to Fred Haney's men.

Yes, it's really true. The Cubs are playing .643 ball after 14 ball games.

We heard and saw ball games in the corner lot of somebody's back yard broken up because the youngster that owned the only bat or ball available got 'sore' at the gang and went on home. Those events will continue to happen as long as kids are kids.

But this ball game broke up for another reason.

In Concord, Mass., a 22-year-old burglar on the Concord Reformatory baseball team, played deep for a slugger the other night. When a long fly came at him he chased it into the woods bordering the diamond and kept on going.

The escape broke up the evening ball game in the recreation area of the prison farm, a half mile from the walled reformatory. The fleet-footed outfielder was serving five years.

The faltering Boston Red Sox have worked out a trade with the surprising Washington Senators. The Sox got catcher Lou Berberet for infielder Ken Aspromonte. No cash was involved.

The Boston club needed bolstering for their catching corps which was weakened by removal of a ruptured spinal disk before the regular season got underway.

Aspromonte won the Pacific Coast League batting title with a .334 average with the San Francisco farm club last year before being recalled by Boston. He hit .269 in 24 games with the Red Sox.

San Francisco has been called a youth movement club but there's a 39 year old 'youngster' who is really cutting capers.

It's Hank Sauer, the comeback kid of 1957. Hank has seven home runs to his credit, has a .389 batting average and has driven in 14 runs. Hank feels he can play in all 77 home games.

Sauer was the National League's most valuable player in 1952 but slipped until picked up by the Giants as a free agent last year. He missed the opening day game this year but has been in there most of the time since then.

He's a handy guy to have around.

And still there's not a sound of that softball or baseball meeting. What the delay is we do not know but we to know that time is flying by and no action whatever has been taken for the coming season.

Down in King's County they've had a get-together and are laying plans for the summer months. That's as it should be.

Marshall On All-Star Team

NEW YORK (AP) — Two members of the champion Hershey Bears and two of the runner-up Cleveland Barons have been named to the American Hockey League all-star team by press, radio and television representatives covering the league.

The other two places went to Providence and Springfield players.

Netminder Johnny Bower and Steve Kraftcheck are the Cleveland players honored, each getting 30 points, the maximum. Dunc Fisher and Willie Marshall are the Hershey representatives. Fisher piling up 30 points on a 5-1 basis, and Marshall 23.

Ivan Irwin of Providence landed a defence spot with 26 points and Gerry Ehman of Springfield was named left wing on the team with a 30-point tally.

Willie Pep Is Refused Licence

NEW YORK (AP) — Willie Pep's bid to obtain a licence to fight in New York was turned down Friday.

The New York State Athletic Commission, acting on medical information, announced it is continuing the retirement of the former featherweight champion, which first went into effect in this state four years ago.

The medical advisory board, informed the commission that in its opinion a boxer with a recurrent dislocated shoulder should not be allowed to box.

The commission Friday also accepted a challenge on the part of Harold Johnson of Philadelphia for a title match with light heavyweight champion Archie Moore. Johnson's manager, Pat Olivieri, posted a \$2,500 check with the commission. Moore has not defended his title in seven months.

Regina Pats Even Series

OTTAWA (CP) — Bill Saunders goal after 2:12 of the overtime period gave Regina Pats a 4-3 victory over Ottawa-Hull Junior Canadiens to square the Memorial Cup hockey final at two games apiece.

Tommy Bolt Wins Tourney

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Tommy Bolt sloshed over a waterlogged course for a par 70 Friday to push into first place in the \$25,000 colonial country club golf tournament.

His 138 for 36 holes gave him a two-stroke lead over Stan Leonard of Vancouver, while Arnold Palmer, who topped the field in the first round with a great 65, despaired with a seven-over-par 77 that dropped him well down the list.

Leonard, winner of the \$40,000 Tournament of Champions at Las Vegas last weekend, had a 72 to make his total 140.

Palmer thought the round should have been called when steady rain set in. He said he played poorly because of surface water on the course.

"I kept thinking they would call it," he said.

BALDING SHOOTS 145

Toronto's Al Balding was bunched with eight other players at 145. He had a 72 to go with his opening-round 73.

The second round started late when the rain that has fallen on the 7,021-yard Colonial Country Club course for seven days let up and the sun tried to break through. But in an hour it was raining steadily and this kept up for three hours.

The tournament committee met frequently to decide what to do. While most of the players thought the round should have been postponed, the committee decided to go ahead.

Two Homers By Moryn Help Cubs Upset Braves

Chicago's Cubs' Walt Moryn boomed his second homer of the game — with none on in the ninth — to break a 7-7 deadlock and edge Milwaukee Braves 8-7 at Chicago Friday.

The Cubs, who have belted 28 homers in 15 games, thus improved their first-place position in the National League baseball race.

Three other games scheduled in the league were played at night. Cincinnati at St. Louis, Pittsburgh at Los Angeles and Philadelphia at San Francisco.

In the American League, Bob Turley cooled off the upstart Kansas City Athletics on a four-hitter Friday to give New York Yankees an 8-1 win, and a tighter grasp on the league top spot.

TIGERS BLANKED

Boston Red Sox' righthander Dave Sisler scattered seven hits for his third win of the season as the Sox blanked Detroit Tigers 6-0 in Fenway Park.

Two night games were scheduled in the American League, Chicago at Washington and Cleveland at Baltimore.

At Chicago, the Cubs had to rally for six runs in the seventh to tie the game 7-7. Pinch-hitter Jim Bolger's three-run homer started the rally.

Boston's Sisler, hampered with shoulder trouble most of last season, had pinpoint control. He didn't give a walk to the Tigers and struck out four.

Pete Runnels lead the Sox batters with a double and a pair of singles.

At Yankee Stadium, an expected Bob Cerv, continued his tremendous spring surge with a second-inning homer off Turley. It was his eighth of the campaign. Cerv leads the league in homers and RBIs with 24.

Tony Kubek played his first game of the year, in place of injured Mickey Mantle who was out resting his right ankle.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — George Crowe drove in six runs in leading Cincinnati Redlegs to a 7-3 victory Friday night over the stumbling St. Louis Cardinals. He brought the Redlegs from behind with a two-run single in the seventh and then blasted a three-run homer in the ninth.

It was the fourth straight defeat for the 1st-place Cardinals, who have yet to win a home game this season.

Stan Musial managed a ninth-inning single in four trips, extending his hitting streak to 14

Ted Williams Awarded Trophy

BOSTON (AP) — Boston Red Sox slugger Ted Williams Friday was presented with a trophy for his selection as male athlete of the year in 1957 in the annual Associated Press poll.

Williams received the Fredrick C. Miller memorial from Judge C. Cannon of Milwaukee in a brief ceremony before the start of the Boston-Detroit game.

He was far ahead of Milwaukee pitcher Lew Burdette and the middleweight boxing champion Carmen Basilio in the AP poll.

Moore Awarded Split Decision

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Ring-wise Archie Moore rallied in the late rounds for a 10-round split decision over tough Will Besmanoff of New York Friday night. Moore weighed 196½, Besmanoff 191.

Moore, in chalking up his 11th straight victory, found the eighth-ranking Besmanoff a tough opponent. But he dropped Will as the bell sounded in the third round. There was no count.

Judge Walter Beck gave the light heavyweight champion the decision by a margin of 49 points to 45. Judge Tom Nuckles saw it 47-43 for Moore. Referee Dan Leslie had his score card marked for Besmanoff, 45-44. The AP had Moore winning 47-43.

Besmanoff, who beat Pat McMurry in his last outing, took the play away from Moore in the first two rounds and was leading in the third until the final seconds when Archie let loose with a powerful right. The blow sent Besmanoff to the ropes. Archie then caught his opponent with a combination and sent him to his knees as the bell sounded.

STAGES COMEBACK

The partial knockdown seemed to take some of the steam out of Besmanoff's right but he pulled himself together in the seventh round and rocked Archie with a left and a right near the end of the session.

Moore, whose left eye was puffed midway in the fight, came strong in the last three rounds, beating his 25-year-old rival to the punch time and again.

In racking up his 22nd victory in his last 23 outings, Moore put in another bid for a shot at Floyd Patterson's heavyweight crown.
