HIGHWAY TENDER - The lowest tender for the paving of ten miles of the Trans-Canada Highway, starting at Wood Islands and ending at St. John's, is \$1,415 per cwt. with barley a little less than that figure.

Ainsworth, Manager of the Maritime Electric Company, said that he had not heard from Mr. W. A. Gordon, owner of the western plant, as to when the contract would now be signed.

Many Visitors During November

In this Province November is not normally thought of as a tourist month, but last month saw many visitors calling here and a great many of them took time to see the historic Confederation Chamber.

There were visitors from every Province in Canada excepting Manitoba. United States visitors were naturally far fewer than in the peak months of the season, but those who did come were from widely scattered sections of their country. Those from south of the border were from New Hampshire and Oklahoma, Massachusetts and Texas.

In addition visitors signed the guest book from such countries as Scotland, England, Wales, Germany, India and Colombia, South America. Occupations of the visitors were as varied as their homelands and included a Gospel Minister, temperance organizer, B.B.C. commentator and C.B.C. engineer. With them were the ordinary citizens such as housewives, students, farmers and mechanics.

Urges Use Of Domestic Feeds

Farmers of Prince Edward Island who are short of grain should use domestic supplies which are in surplus, Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, urged yesterday.

Alarm was expressed by Mr. Shaw at the high cost of feeds which seem to be almost constantly strengthening. Western ground oats are now selling for \$4.15 per cwt. with barley a little less than that figure.

The result is that farmers are beginning to question the curtailment of swine and poultry production, Mr. Shaw said. "It appears to me that these strong prices of Western feed grains will be maintained until the opening of the navigation season next spring, as this year's crop, unharvested and under snow, is still unthreshed."

Mr. Shaw observed that not so many years ago, bran sold for 90 cents a bag, but today it costs \$3.50 a bag. Some of these feeds, particularly in the protein brackets, are being priced out of the market, and there's not much we can do about it, for the export demand for flax and milk feeds is very keen. OTTAWA, Nov. 30 - (CP) - Canadian army officers posted for duty with the United Nations Military Observer Group at Kashmir, are to be insured for \$15,000 against death or injury, army headquarters announced today.

The insurance policies are being provided by the United Nations.

Canada has five officers serving as military observers for the U.N. in Kashmir. They are: Maj. C. D. Ives, Charlottetown; Col. H. M. Cathcart, Montreal and Ottawa; Maj. John Prayner, Sault Ste. Marie; Maj. J. C. Chartres, Vancouver, and Lt.-Col. M. E. P. Garneau, Montreal.

Beer Prices At Zero In Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Nov. 30 - (AP) - A merchant's war drove the price of beer down to zero in Alaska. One dealer even delivered it free.

Streets were jammed with residents who squeezed and pushed into retail establishments after the price dropped from \$6 a case to nothing. I started when one dealer slashed his prices from \$6 to \$3.76 a case last week. A competitor cut to \$3.25, scarcely what it costs to ship the beverage to Alaska plus taxes.

Last night the Southside Liquor Market started giving it away. The proprietor, noting that many couldn't get in, started delivering it to downtown points. Police were called in to break up a traffic jam. But beer was still free. One

Mental Examination For Bank Robber

SMITHS FALLS, Ont. Nov. 30 - (CP) - Garnet William Burke, 30-year-old seaman from Minudie, Cumberland County, N. S., who pleaded guilty Monday to a bank robbery charge, today was remanded for mental examination.

Burke pleaded guilty to robbing the Smiths Falls branch of the Bank of Montreal at gunpoint of \$960 on Nov. 21. He was arrested in neighboring Perth an hour after the holdup.

Burke is to be examined in Perth by mental specialists on Monday and will appear in court for sentence Tuesday.

Queen's Mary Carpet Earns \$119,651

LONDON, Nov. 30 - (AP) - Queen Mary's hand-made carpet earned almost 120,000 scarce dollars for Britain. A cheque for \$119,651.86 was sent to Prime Minister Churchill to be turned into the British Treasury.

The money was earned by exhibiting the carpet in Canada and the United States and by its sale to the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire in Canada, who gave it to the National Museum in Ottawa. Its formal presentation to the museum was made by Princess Elizabeth on her recent Canadian tour.

Trout Fisheries Expert To Speak In Charlottetown

On Tuesday evening, December 4, at the Vocational School Island lovers of trout fishing will have the opportunity of hearing Dr. J. W. Saunders of The Fisheries Research Board. Dr. Saunders' headquarters are at St. Andrews and during the past summer he devoted a great deal of time to the trout studies being carried on at The Biological Station, Ellerslie, P. E. I. About two months ago Dr. Saunders gave a short address at the Fish and Game meeting held at Borden. Those who were privileged to hear him were so interested in his talk that he was asked to come to Charlottetown to speak to the Fish and Game Association and all others interested in the development of trout fishing within this Province.

During the past year a very great deal of information has been discovered and many experiments carried out very successfully. In connection with this address several new fishing films will be shown which we understand have been especially secured for this meeting through the efforts of The National Film Board at Charlottetown. Some of the information Dr. Saunders gave at Borden was quite startling but highly favorable to trout development in Prince Edward Island.

It is expected Dr. Saunders will also speak at a meeting of The King's County Association at Montague on Dec. 6.

Critical Of Smelt Season Extension

The extension of the smelt fishing season, which has resulted in the glutting of the New York and Boston markets, was criticized at the quarterly meeting of the Fisheries Federation of P.E.I., held in Summerside on Wednesday.

President Lorne Noonan of Charlottetown presided at the meeting, and he reported on his attendance at a recent meeting of the Fisheries Council of Canada in Ottawa, and referred to the East Coast Fisheries Conference to be held in St. John's, Newfoundland, on January 20 and 21st.

Fishermen attending pointed out that the extension of the smelt fishing season was more detrimental to the industry than it was beneficial. Mr. Frank Cameron, Summerside, maintained that the extension came too late for the fishermen to sell the quantity caught. This excess had to be carried over to the fall, with a consequent lowering of quality and price.
