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Veterans Will Get An Increase.

OTTAWA (CP) — Increases in war veterans allowances and in the number receiving them were forecast Monday in the speech from the throne.
 The speech said at one point: "You will also be asked to increase the scale of war veterans allowances and to enlarge the groups to whom they are paid. Changes will also be proposed in several sections of the Pension Act."
 Informants said the Progressive Conservative government plans to extend war veterans allowances to First World War veterans who served in the United Kingdom. The allowances now are only for men who served on the European continent.
 TO RAISE CEILINGS
 It was also understood that the government will raise the ceilings on income a needy veteran may earn and still receive the allowances.
 These ceilings now are pegged at \$950 a year for single veterans and \$1,620 a year for married men.
 It is understood the government will raise these ceilings to \$1,200 and \$2,000, respectively, as requested by the Canadian Legion.

Maximum rate of allowances for recipients of war veterans allowances now is \$120 a month for married men and \$60 a month for single men.
 The rate for married men is unlikely to be altered but the rate for single men may be increased to \$80 a month.

A.L. CLUBS
 The Artificial Breeding Clubs in Prince Edward Island, starting today, are shut down for a period of two weeks. All Clubs will commence operation again on November 1st. This annual shut down period is to provide a break for the inseminators. Each club through their Board of Directors set the dates as from October 16 to 31 inclusive. The main reason for the selection of this period is because there are less cattle bred at this time of year.
TEN THOUSAND
 Ten thousand eight hundred cows have been bred artificially in Prince Edward Island this year. Each month has shown a steady increase over the previous year. The months of June, July and August are the big ones. The month of July saw 3395 cows bred.
 All livestock breeders in the Province have available the services of Artificial Insemination. Nine different breeds with approximately fifty different bulls. The breeds available daily are

Holstein, Ayrshire, Jersey Guernsey, Dual Purpose Shorthorn, Beef Shorthorn, Hereford, Aberdeen Angus and Red Poll.
WOMEN'S WORK
 One of the feature attractions at the coming Maritime Winter Fair will undoubtedly be the new division for Women's Work and Domestic Handicrafts.
 For some time, Maritime Winter Fair officials have realized the lack of interest in the Fair for women. This was expressed a year ago by President F. George McLeod during a newspaper interview, when he stated that much thought was being given to the possibility of establishing a Women's Work Division.
 The thought has evidently crystallized into action, since classes for fancy-work of all kinds appear in the 1957 Prize List. These classes will include all types of fancy work and handicrafts, from quilts and handkerchiefs to leather work, weaving and jewelry.
 The Women's Work Division will be under the charge of a committee, formed of the Home Economics Directors of the three Provinces — Miss Jean 'uro, Nova Scotia; Miss Rita Underhill, New Brunswick; and Miss Theresa MacLeod, Prince Edward Island.
 Competition between the provinces will undoubtedly be keen, since the above-named Directors have been busy all summer, selecting the most outstanding articles in their class from the various Exhibitions in each province. These selected articles will represent the best from each province, so that the items displayed at the Maritime Winter Fair will be "the cream of the crop."
 Special display facilities for the Women's Work are nearing completion, and the department will be open to the public every day of the 1957 Fair.
