# Light Blue Lobster Is Landed

## Estimated at \$69,000

**MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
 A total of \$69,591.51 was voted by the ratepayers of the Montague Elementary School District No. 3 last evening to cover the estimated expenditures for the 1964-65 school term. This amount includes the assessment by the ratepayers of \$13,694.04. Teachers' salaries will be approximately \$37,970.00 less the government grant of \$27,504.20. The chairman of the board, Gilbert Clements, said that the ratepayers, stated that when the trustees had first made their budget they had a surplus, but that on three different occasions following the change in the school board from the department of education and he expressed the opinion that instead of a surplus that these changes could mean an increase up to 10 per cent in taxes.

He felt that such changes should be made earlier and firm so that it would be easier for the school board to estimate their expenditures. He pointed out that the board had done a good job and that the teaching staff was excellent.

During the business part of the meeting, Mr. E. Deane, secretary of the Eastern Fishing Co. Co. were reappointed auditors and the retiring board trustee G. Garnet MacIntyre was re-elected for a three-year term.

**Restored Rumors Of Hotel Sale Meet Denials**

Renewed and emphatic denials last night greeted rumors which were revived yesterday that the Charlottetown Hotel has been purchased by Canadian National Railways to Franklin and Hirschorn, hotel operators with headquarters in Halifax.

The existence of such rumors, including one that the hotel was being purchased by the Hilton hotel interests, was reported originally in The Guardian several weeks ago. A spokesman for all groups mentioned in connection with these rumors have repeatedly denied that any sale has materialized.

This again was the case as the CNR and Franklin and Hirschorn were consulted late Tuesday. Both sides adamantly denied the rumors which had been reached on a sale to be completed on Sept. 1, at a price of \$10 million, with some \$250,000 being raised in P.E.I.

Charles N. Craig, a colorful islander of 10 years standing, died in Charlottetown, P.E.I., Monday, June 1, 1964. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland was his home until he came to the Island in 1954 to live with his two daughters, Dorothy (Mrs. Dennis Webster) and Margaret (Mrs. Gordon Dignan) after his wife died.

When he first came to Charlottetown, Mr. Craig worked for the Guardian in both the city and Summerside offices. Later he joined the Corps of Communications.

Serving in the First War as a sergeant, in the Black Watch, Mr. Craig was wounded in the Second War he was on duty as a special constable.

In civilian life he was a sales representative. Highly interested in politics of the Old Country, he was often called upon to speak at national and local campaigns.

Besides his two daughters, Mr. Craig is survived by two sons, Sidney, who lives in England, and Charles, who emigrated to Australia. Another son, John, was killed during World War II while serving with the RCAF.

The funeral will be held this afternoon from the MacLaren Funeral Home.
