The heavy pull of feudalism, which for so many centuries has been the habitual political raiment of the English, is now likely to be ruthlessly cast off. SURVEYING OPERATIONS AT THE FOOT OF THE ROCKIES—RICH SOIL, LUXURIANT GRASS, PLENTY OF TIMBER—THE COUNTRY IMPROBABLY SAID TO BE UNSUITED FOR AGRICULTURAL PURSUITS.

Early in May last a party of surveyors left Winnipeg for the Rocky Mountain region under the superintendence of Montague Aldous, D. L. S.

THE SEASON'S WORK. Last year Mr Aldous ran the 114th meridian. This year the party started operations by blocking townships between the 5th and 7th base lines, and west to the foot of the Rockies.

CLIMATE AND COUNTRY. The season is reported to have been an unusually dry one, although there was considerable rain further up in the plains.

TIMBER ABUNDANT. In considerable quantity in this region, and consists of pine, spruce, and poplar, which can easily be made subservient to economic uses.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—I was appointed a vendor under the provisions of the Canada Temperance Act. Immediately after my appointment I gave instructions to my employees to observe the law strictly, and to give liquor to no person whatsoever without a certificate from a medical man.

On the 24th Oct., William Flynn came to my store with the following prescription: "R. Spis. Froesenth, q. In Medicinal use only.—Mr. William Flynn."

The words, "Mr. William Flynn" were not on the prescription when presented, but my clerk, Mr. Hunter, inquired the name and then wrote it on the prescription in order to comply with the requirements of the Act, and to enable me to keep the necessary record.

The objection to this was that the name of the agent was not mentioned in the prescription. I contended that the very fact of the agent having the prescription in his possession, and presenting it to my clerk was prima facie evidence that he was the properly authorized agent of the person for whom the liquor was prescribed.

Another objection raised was that Dr. MacRae is not a properly qualified practitioner, and holds no diploma from any medical college. Of this, of course, I have no personal knowledge; but Dr. MacRae advertises in the public press; his sign appears in front of the office held by him in the rooms over the "Apothecaries Hall"; his prescriptions have been filled in every Drug Store in the city, and he is generally regarded as a medical man.

I think I can safely affirm that during a residence of thirty-eight years in Charlottetown I have strictly confirmed with the laws of the land, as a private citizen, and in whatever public position I may have been placed. For thirty-six years I have been a licensed dealer in spirituous liquors, and there never was a complaint made against me. You can scarcely wonder, then, that I feel indignant at being the victim of an over-strained judgment which I regard as unjust and illegal, but from which I have no power to appeal.
