The Markets.

With the opening of navigation comes a renewal of the desire for information concerning the foreign markets.
For oats the prices in Boston range from 35 to 36 cents per bushel. In Chicago (April 4) the highest price was a 25¢, the lowest 20¢ cents; in Toronto oats are quoted at 31¢ cents on track; here the price is 31 cents.
For potatoes—the best Rose are quoted at 55 to 60 cents per bushel in Boston; Hebrons at 43 to 45 cents; Dakota Reds at 33 to 35 cents. Chenangos are not quotable in Toronto, cars of potatoes on the track are offered at 32 to 33 cents, with 30 to 31 cents bid.
As to pork, the quotations in Chicago are \$10.22 to \$10.40 per bbl.; in Toronto the prices are, mess pork, United States, \$13 to \$14; do, Canadian (new) \$15; short cut, \$16 to \$16 50; bacon, long clear, per lb. 7 1/2 to 8¢; lard, Canada, tubs and pails, 10 to 10 1/2¢; compound do, 8 to 8 1/2¢. Smoked meats—Hams, per lb. (new) 10 1/2 to 11¢; bellies per lb. 9 1/2 to 10¢; rolls per lb. 8 1/2 to 8 3/4¢; backs, per lb. 10¢; dressed hogs, good packing weights, \$5.50 to \$6.10 per cw.; in Montreal Canada short cut mess is sold at \$15.50 to \$17. Chicago clear pork, \$15.50 to \$16; Chicago mess pork, \$14 to \$14 50; city cured hams 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 cents; bacon 9 to 10¢ cents; lard in pails, \$1 4 1/2 to \$1 50; here, 5 1/2 to 5 1/4 cents per pound by the carcass have been paid. There is none moving at present.
For eggs, in Boston, 13¢ cents per doz in was paid and up to 15 cents for nearby and fancy; in Toronto, 12 to 12 1/2 cents per doz was paid; eggs were sold in the Charlottetown market last Tuesday for 11 to 13.

A Denial.
An article from a correspondent appeared in the issue of THE DAILY EXAMINER of April 1st, in regard to a trotting held at Lytle River on Wednesday, 30th of March, in which the owner of one of the horses, Mr. Kitson is said to have issued the challenge and finally backed down after gathering a large crowd to see the sports. Mr. Kitson called at the office of THE EXAMINER on Tuesday and declared the article to be false in every particular. He said he never issued a challenge, but accepted the challenge sent to him. He was not notified according to promise, on the morning of the 28th March. As far as he was concerned he did not keep them waiting till five o'clock, and the only horseman from the city was Mr. Henry Horse former owner of Mason's Pilot. Another thing, the trot was to have been for mile heats, best three in five to eleven cuts; but the day of the race there was not a half mile of ice fit to have a race on. Mr. Kitson says that, on the ice that there was he made Mr. Leonard an offer to trot for five dollars, but the latter declined.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Charlottetown Driving Park.

LETTER NO. 2.
SIR,—In my last letter I took occasion to criticize the past management of the Charlottetown Driving Park from a breeder's standpoint, and as I promised to return to the subject, I will now attempt to show the shareholders and the public in general how popular has been the management—financially.
If we take the years 1890-91 as per the Secretary and Auditor's report—which, I presume is correct—we will find the following comparison or statement. Receipts for years—
1890 1891
Government grant.....\$2,000 00 \$2,000 00
Gate money, concerts, &c 4,390 68 2,889 57
Entries..... 760 84 965 10
Rent of grounds..... 300 00 100 00
Training tickets..... 220 00 180 00
Grand stand..... 452 25 478 54
Refreshment tender..... 125 00 149 00
Total..... \$8,249 77 \$8,662 51
From the above it will be seen that the revenue fell short last year as compared with 1890, \$1,586.26, while the ordinary expenditures (as per report) was greater by \$909.26, which makes the management for the year behind \$2,495.52. If the receipts are taken under the different headings, it will be noticed that the Government grant is about the only reliable revenue the shareholders can count upon, and unless breeders and the public are better accommodated in the future than in the past, it, too, may be uncertain.
There is nothing to hinder the Park (under proper management) bringing in yearly from one to two thousand dollars rental, but last year the report shows from this source the small sum of one hundred dollars. One would almost think the Directors would feel ashamed to publish it in their report. Is it any wonder that shareholders are dissatisfied and want to sell out their stock at about 50 per cent. discount? The Directors dare not say that they could not have rented the Park on several occasions during the past year for legitimate sport.
Why was that noble club, whose annual sports cause so much enthusiasm among thousands of our fellow citizens forced to Summerside to look for a place on which to show the manliness and physical ability of the "brave Scotch"? Why should breeders be refused permission to hold a match race whenever occasion may require? Because they—the Directors—(excuse me, I mean Director), believe that it lowers the dignity of the place to have games and races held on the grounds, but yet I find in the report where they paid an individual \$200.00 to make balloon ascensions—advertising Claymore whiskey. Consistency, thou art truly a jewel. More anon.

Three Rivers Dairy Association
Professor Robertson arrived at New Perth by Saturday evening's train and remained till Tuesday morning. On Monday he had an interview with the Association Committee, and made the final arrangements regarding his proposed dairy school. He also assisted in laying off the ground for the site of the buildings. In the forenoon he visited the district school, heard the pupils examined by their teacher in the elements of Agricultural Chemistry, expressed his satisfaction at the progress evinced by their answers to questions on that subject, and concluded a very interesting hour by giving some excellent advice to the young people under Mr. West's tuition.
On Tuesday morning he left for Charlottetown en route for home, intending to visit Halifax and Fredericton on his way.

Farmers Trading Association
As advertised, a second meeting of the farmers of Lower Montserrat and surrounding districts was held in the hall, which was attended by the Lower Montserrat farmers from a mass—and a good many representative farmers from neighboring districts, all seemingly alike interested in the success of the organization. G. Aitken, Esq., being called to the chair and Mr. Martin, teacher, appointed secretary, the chairman after a few appropriate remarks, and advocating the policy of the proposed Farmers' Association, read over the constitution and by-laws, and invited discussion thereon. The first to respond gave us a long dissertation on his experience in organizing farmers' clubs at different points and the results; he lost the thread of his discourse among statistics altogether foreign to the object of the meeting and had to be called to order by the chairman.
Messrs. Ross, McKinnon, Martin and Howlett, spoke on the rules both for and against.
Messrs. Geo. Poole and Collins (merchants) both advocated the formation of the association in a very decided and able manner. The meeting then proceeded to business by the farmers present signing the constitution and by-laws.
The association then appointed as officers and directors, W. Meggat, president; Chas. McNeill, vice-president; L. Poole, secretary; Jas. Poole, Capt. Howlett, S. Martin, G. Wright, Thos. Daley, and M. McKinnon, directors; S. Aitken and G. Crede, doorkeepers.
Before appointing the directors and officers a discussion arose as to the expediency of postponing the appointments as some of the districts not yet organized might wish to have a say in their appointment. But as a good many from neighboring districts were present they thought it best to organize at once, as there would be a chance at the annual meeting on the first Thursday of July to change the officers and half of the directors if wished. The committee appointed to draw out a constitution and by-laws were kindly supplied by Mr. Lewis with a copy of those he had drawn out for the Cardigan association. And after taking them into consideration did not see that they could improve on them.
Our esteemed chairman has taken a very active and interested part in getting a start

made with the organization, but would not allow his name to be proposed as a candidate for office on account of ill health. The utmost harmony prevailed throughout the meeting, and after a vote of thanks to the chairman dispersed, seemingly satisfied that they had taken a step in the right direction.
