AN AUDACIOUS LIE.—"Mr. Pope has abandoned the contest in Queen's, on finding that he had no chance of being elected, and is now doing his little best to injure Messrs. Yeo and Perry's prospects in the Fourth District." The above we clip from the last Summerside Journal. When the editor penned it he knew that he was circulating a malicious falsehood. Electors, show your disapproval of such contemptible warfare by to-morrow voting the square Conservative ticket.

At eleven o'clock on Sunday night a fire originated in the barn of Mr. John Seller, at North River. It spread rapidly, and the flames were communicated to the dwelling-house, thence to the warehouse, and thence to the store. The fire assumed very large proportions before it was discovered, and all efforts to extinguish it were useless. The buildings were all burned to the ground. Besides the four buildings, Mr. Seller lost a large quantity of grain, all his merchandize and farming implements, consisting of wagons, carts, mowing machines, etc. His loss is estimated at four thousand dollars; the amount of insurance being only eight hundred. The fire was evidently the work of an incendiary. A store belonging to Mr. Seller was consumed by fire in the same place in December last.

DANGEROUS MARITIME ADVENTURE OF THE QUEEN.—Apropos of Her Majesty's review of the ironclads at Spithead, it may be interesting to recall the fact that the Queen can look back upon at least one dangerous maritime adventure. Cruising off the Isle of Wight in the yacht Emerald, while she was yet Princess Victoria, the breeze freshened into a gale, and before the vessel could get into Cowes road the decks were swept fore and aft. The coming Queen, however, undauntedly remained a witness of the stirring scene; when a sudden squall took the Emerald aback, and crack went the topmast immediately above the cap. The pilot, Mr. Saunders, quick as thought, sprang to where the Princess was standing, lifted her in his arms to a more safe position farther aft, and the next moment crash came the topmast down where the Queen had originally stationed herself. But for the prompt action of Mr. Saunders the Queen would probably never have lived to witness the ponderous procession of ironclads last week. Indeed, Her Majesty long ago acknowledged that the escape was something to be thankful for, as the pilot, at her instance, was promoted to be a master; and when the Princess Victoria became Queen of England, he was early invited to Court. Moreover, at the death of Mr. Saunders, some few years after, Her Majesty made considerable provision for his wife and family.

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

A "Patriot" Lie Nailed.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

GEORGETOWN, Sept. 16. The Patriot's story about Sir John's cake is a downright lie. At Dundas, Sir John's brought six dollars and eighty-five cents—McKenzie's, five dollars. In Georgetown Sir John's brought twenty-seven—McKenzie's, fourteen.

HALIFAX, Sept. 13.

Thomas McAlpine, a brakeman on a special train, while shunting cars at Windsor Junction to day, fell from a car on to the rails. A number of cars passed over his body, killing him instantly. The deceased leaves a wife and one child.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

Volunteer nurses returning from Memphis state that a perfect reign of terror and demoralization exist in that city, and that many of the inhabitants are in a starving condition. There were 98 deaths there yesterday. 272 new cases and 78 deaths in New Orleans yesterday. At Vicksburg 73 deaths occurred in the past two days, but at other points in Mississippi a diminution in the death rate is reported.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

A Berlin dispatch says: "The Conservative's generals show great vexation at the result of the elections for officers to the Reichstag," which signally exposes their hopelessness. Their party elections demonstrated that the United Conservatives cannot carry the House against the United Liberals, except with the help of the Ultramontanes.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

A Pesth dispatch says - "There is much depression here in consequence of the determined resistance of Bosnia, as there is hardly a family in Pesth but has some member in the army, and the list of killed and wounded lengthens daily."

VIENNA, Sept. 13.

Bourse is much disturbed to-day by the news of the intended transfer of the headquarters of General Philipovitch from Serajevo to Brod.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.

According to the September returns to the Department of Agriculture, the condition of the cotton crop averages 90, against 95 in August, 1878, and 86 in September, 1876.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 13.

The Sturgeon Point regatta is postponed for a week on account of rough weather.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 13.

As soon as the Russians evacuate Tchekmedje, Chataldja and Derkos, Baker Pasha will complete the defensive works on those lines and commence the construction of another line of defence nearer Constantinople.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

Despatches report that a terrible tornado passed through North Carolina and Virginia. It struck Goldsboro, N. C., early yesterday, covering the width of a hundred yards, demolishing houses and killing several people.

The Methodist Conference.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.

The Methodist Conference met again this morning, the President in the chair.

Rev. Mr. Robertson took exception to the slow progress of business.

Rev. Mr. Shaw objected to so many lay members leaving.

The President said in the United States members were allowed to leave for imperative reasons.

The report on education was read and adopted.

The report on Finance was read and adopted.

The Montreal Theological College was instructed to negotiate with McGill University for instructing the students in arts.

The following nominations were made:—

General Treasurers Educational Society, W. E. Sanford, Esq., and Rev. S. D. Rice, D. D.; Secretary, Dr. Burwash. Adopted.

Motions passed to establish branch societies in every district to take up collections; deprecating the sending of Protestant children to Catholic schools; and adding Dr. Burwash to the Victoria College Board.

The Finance Committee reported the claims on the Conference for delegates' expenses at \$7,517.56, with \$2,700 on hand, showing a deficit of \$4,817.56. The Treasurer was authorized to negotiate a loan.
