 In remarks to the large assembly of parents and interested friends who filled the auditorium, the school principal, Sister St. Mary Eugenia, said that 325 students had been enrolled in the Miscouche school this past term, with 124 of this number in attendance at the new high school completed since last year. She reported that most of the class of 1958 have continued their studies, and of this year's graduates, 13 plan to take teachers training which she said was the biggest and best profession in the state.
