### The Present Creed of Mr. Davies

(St. John Sun.)

Mr. L. H. Davies in an interview with the Boston Herald is represented to have given this account of the policy of his party:

We are willing to accept the offer that Mr. Blaine made to President Harrison. This proposition was submitted to the Canadian delegates and was presented to the senate by the president. The offer embraced reciprocity in all natural products, and such a fair list of manufactured goods as may be agreed upon after consultation between representatives of both countries.

If Mr. Davies will examine the correspondence he will observe that Mr. Blaine's offer as quoted above was accepted by the present government. But when the time came to agree on the "fair list of goods" manufactured, Mr. Blaine took the position that the list should include all manufactured articles. He also took the ground that Canada should impose a tariff on British manufactured goods equal to that imposed by the United States. This fact is established by the report of each day's discussion as drawn up day by day, signed by the Canadian ministers, and concurred in by Sir Julian Pauncefote, British minister at Washington. It may be good policy for Mr. Davies to assert that the liberals agree with the position then taken by the Canadian government, but Mr. Davies knows that he and his party were violent advocates of Mr. Wiman's policy of commercial union. They may be ashamed of it but they cannot blot out the record.

### Canada's Experience With Protection

(New York Press.)

Free traders are fond of holding Canada up as a terrible example of the evils of protection. They ascribe all the ills of the Dominion to its tariff system, studiously ignoring the well-known fact that they are due to conditions over which its commercial policy has no control. That the Canadian tariff has done all that could in reason be expected of it is conclusively shown by the statistics of the last Canadian census. Thus, for example, the number of manufacturing industries increased during the census period from 1881 to 1891 from 13,674 to 22,761, a gain of 66.5 per cent. The capital invested in them grew even more rapidly, from \$114,000,000 to \$234,000,000, or 105.5 per cent. The number of hands employed increased 47 per cent., or from 141,911 to 207,596. The value of products advanced from \$202,000,000 to \$319,000,000, or 58 per cent. This showing ought to silence the most captious critic of Canada's tariff system. The evils which the Dominion suffers are not attributable to that system, but to the fact that Providence never designed that country for an industrial career independent of the United States. The latter overladows Canada and entices her people across the border by means of the splendid opportunities which our protective system has here opened up for them. These are misfortunes which Canada's wise tariff has served to mitigate.

### Professor Wiggins' Discovery

HE CLAIMS TO HAVE DONE SOME WONDERFUL THINGS.

Professor Wiggins, the Canadian astronomer and weather prophet, has come before the public again. In an interview a few days ago he said that after a quarter of a century's hard work he had solved one of the problems pronounced as impossible by Euclid's elements. These problems are the squaring of the circle, the duplication of the cube, the insertion of two geometrical means between two given straight lines, and the trisection of a given rectilinear angle.

The solution of the last-named, Professor Wiggins said, was more eagerly sought than any of the others for it would enable mathematicians to increase the number of regular polygons inscribable in a given circle. The equilateral triangle, the square, the regular pentagon and such regular polygons as can be derived from them, have been the only regular figures inscribable in a circle by elementary geometry. There is, for instance, no regular nonagon given in our school books on geometry, because no one, not even Euclid or Newton, could divide the angle of an equilateral triangle into three equal parts; in other words, find the ninth of four right angles. This is the problem Professor Wiggins has solved and has brought within the third book of Euclid. The construction is simple, but that for the demonstration and the demonstration itself are, not not by any means easy. He says the solution of the problem will cause universal joy among mathematicians, and it is his intention to publish the solution in a few days.

### Pension Frauds

The pension department at Washington believes it has unearthed stupendous pension frauds. An attorney at Norfolk, Va., named W. R. Drewry, now under arrest, is charged with securing fraudulent pension claims by the wholesale, using as his instruments in many cases colored women or men who could not read or write. The extent of the frauds could be understood when it is stated that one hundred and sixty-six cases were granted and that every one of them carried arrears. Drewry was arrested about one year ago on the charge of securing pension money for a woman named Mrs. L. L. Laxness on the part of the local authorities, escaped punishment. The amount will not be known until the special examiners make their report, but as the arrears in considerable sums have been paid on many of the 166 fraudulent cases, the steals will probably aggregate \$100,000.
