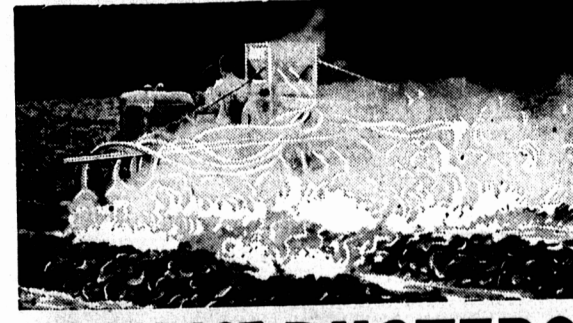

More than one thousand people crowded Borden rink last evening to hear Rev. Charles B. Templeton who is conducting a five-day evangelistic campaign in Bedeque and Borden under interdenominational auspices.

Mr. Templeton is Canadian born and began his career as a sports writer with the Toronto paper. After his conversion to the Christian faith he decided to give his full time to Evangelism. To this end he enrolled as a student in the Princeton Theological Seminary where he has just completed the second year of his course.

Assisting him in the current series of services is his gifted wife, Mrs. Templeton has won the California "Local Hour" contest and many other awards, and has sung in almost every State of the Union, and in many Canadian cities.

Mr. Templeton brought to his congregation a message of such depth of conviction and radiant faith that they have been challenged to accept Christ's way of life as never before. He stated that he believed "We are on the verge of a great spiritual awakening" and that "Christ is the answer to every human need and problem. In a saving relationship with God through Jesus Christ is our only hope for peace, happiness, lives of power and general usefulness, and relationship between men which is truly Christian."

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN N. PROFITT

The passing of Mrs. John N. Profit on June 9th at Lower Freetown, P. E. I., removed from the community and from the circle of Christian workers there an indefatigable worker, and a moving spirit in every good work, as well as one whose opposition to all wrong and injustice was outspoken and telling.

Out of a strong faith, and a deep love for her Lord and Saviour, for more than three score years her chief interest outside of her home was the work of the church, of which she became a member in her thirteenth year. On many occasions she filled important offices in the organizations of the church, including the Woman's Missionary Society and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. She was a life member of both these Societies.

As a Sunday School worker she endeared herself to the children who grew up in her church. Hers was a devout and faithful Christian spirit, making her truly a "Mother in Israel" to whom her friends and neighbours instinctively turned in times of distress and sorrow. Her home, in a Province noted for the hospitality of its people, was ever a center of hospitality and cheer, with a welcome on her lips and in her heart for one and all.

Mary Maude (Bernard) Profit was born at Irishtown, P. E. I., on the 13th of March, 1874, daughter of Charles and Jane (Palmer) Bernard. On July 8th, 1898, she was married to John Nelson Profit, Freetown, and moved to Lower Freetown and established the homestead over which for the past thirty-five years the deceased presided with a hospitality that drew to her home, in ever-increasing numbers, friends and relatives far and near who never failed to return if, and as often as possible.

Mrs. Profit is survived by her husband, two sons: Rev. Samuel B. in Beaverton, Ont., and R. Allison on the homestead; and by one daughter, Mae (Mrs. Robert Dewar), Summerside, and by five grandsons and four granddaughters.

Besides the foregoing she leaves five brothers: Hugh, William and Joseph in the U. S. A.; Harvey, in Borden, P. E. I., and Daniel, in Ontario; and two sisters, Inez (Mrs. Frank Nesmith) in Londonderry, N. H., and Margaret (Mrs. William Gunn) in Stanley Bridge, P. E. I., to mourn their loss.

These all sorrow, "not as others without hope" for the departing of a loved one who made life, for all who came into close relationship with her, much sweeter and happier.

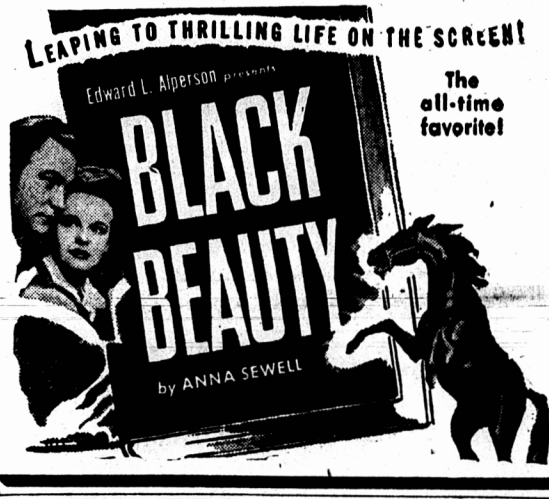
