### Latest Arrivals to the Stock Farm.

Is there not something beautiful in the broad fields, vast forests and hand-made flower gardens to make our weary wandering more or less attractive. Geo. Eliot wrote her many fine works from—as she said herself—the flowers, fields, dogs and donkeys. Emerson wrote his poetic effusions surrounded by nature and nature's God.

To the lover of nature and the animal kingdom, the world presents a scene and school not only pleasing, but to the taste so cultivated, lessons and monuments towering higher than the highest summit of the Alps are to be found in her glorious sunsets; illumined skies which even art fails to picture in all its grandeur, her autumnal changes of foliage, are pictures of the beautiful not easily described.

The animal kingdom is another world for thought; here you can get beauty of form, fine proportions, and it was from a love for these last two we found our way to the Stock Farm, hearing from so many of your latest imports bought by Mr. Longworth at Kingston, Ont.; and it not only does the purchaser credit, but shows that he has a keen eye and knows full well what a good animal is.

Several of the managers were present on our arrival, and with Mr. Gardiner we made a tour of inspection. In the first loose box we were shown as fine a type of a two-year-old Shorthorn Heifer as it has fallen to my lot to look upon for some time, having a good and pleasant head, fine neck, good shoulders and back, quarters well filled, and a perfect tail. Judging from color, she looks like "Bates or Kirklivingston blood." In the next stall, another of the same age and blood was brought to our notice, and you can rest assured you have in these two animals, many meritorious points of excellence. The heifer calf is a model of perfection, and a fine color as well. The Ayreshire bull calf is a good one, and has been carefully selected, a good color, well formed, and well skinned animal, and one that will have many admirers in the show yard. The first import of Oxford Sheep with such careful selection, will, no doubt, be a most remunerative speculation, as they have all the good qualities of the long wools, with wool of a finer texture, and worth more in the market. In Canada, these animals should do well. I will give you their many points as laid down by the American Oxford Down Association, Cincinnati, Ohio. The following is the scale of points adopted:—

- Head—Not too fine, moderately small and broad between the eyes and nostrils, but without a short, thick appearance; crown well covered with good wool.
- Face—Either brown or grey, but not speckled or white; with a white or grey spot on end of nose.
- Nostrils—Wide and expanded, and dark.
- Eyes—Prominent, but mild.
- Ears—Broad, moderately long, thin and covered with short, brownish hair.
- Collar—Fall from breast and shoulders, tapering gradually all the way to where the neck and head join; the neck short, thick and strong (with a masculine appearance in rams), indicating constitutional vigour, and free course of loose skin.
- Shoulders—Broad and full, and at the same time join so gradually to the collar forward, and the chine backwards, as not to leave the least hollow in either place.
- Forelegs—The mutton on the arm or fore-thigh should come quite to the knee; leg with heavy bone and upright, being clear from superfluous skin; dark brown or smoky in colour; should stand square and well apart.
- Breast—Broad and well forward, keeping legs well apart; girth or chest full and deep.
- Fore Flank—Quite full, not showing hollow behind shoulder.
- Back and Lion—Broad, flat and straight from which the ribs must spring with a fine circular arch.
- Belly—Straight on under line.
- Quarters—Long and full, with mutton quite down to the hock.
- Hock—Stand neither in nor out, but straight.
- Twist or Junction—Inside the thigh deep, wide and full, which, with a broad breast, will keep the legs open and upright.
- Fleeces—The whole body should be covered with wool of a close texture, a good length, and of fine quality.

Farmers will do well to take this standard to judge by for reference in case of purchasing. The remainder of the sheep are as fine specimens as generally falls to our lot to look at. I hope that your farmers will take the trouble, for no doubt some would call it such, to visit the Stock Farm and see some of the finest cattle ever brought to your Island, and I am satisfied they will go home wiser and better men, and the impression will be we have been feeding and breeding mongrels long enough, and what a waste of food, time and labor, when by a small outlay we can purchase a well-bred animal, have something to look at, costs the same to feed and raise, and instead of 5 per cent we have 15 per cent income; this is a matter worthy consideration. Farmers of P. E. Island assist those who are doing so much to further your interests, give them the much needed aid, your hearty support at the coming sale, buy good animals and you will ere long not only derive a profit, but a pleasure as well, when you look over your stock coming home in the evening. A fine animal is more attractive than a coarse ill-bred one at any time. Ver. sap sat.

Burke, of Bay Fortune, wishes to give publicity to the fact that he and two sons, when returning home from fishing on the night of Sept. 8th were brutally attacked and maltreated by five men who were dressing fish on the seashore. The substance of the altercation as condensed from Mr. Burke's letter, is as follows:—

He says: I believe I would have been murdered, had it not been for a certain man who showed himself in my defence. He further says that he will leave nothing undone to award the guilty parties their just deserts, and thereby have the ends of justice appeased.

The reason assigned by Mr. Burke for the assault is that certain parties, living contiguous to his farm, endeavored to run a spurious line on the boundary of his farm.

### The New York Election and the Erie Canal.

In the elections in New York State in November next the constitutional amendment making the Erie Canal a free water highway will be submitted to the people. The gubernatorial candidates favor the proposition, and a large vote, if not an actual majority, is expected to be recorded in its favor. Mr. Franklin Edison, the President of the Free Canal Union, states the situation in these terms:—"I feel sure that the canal has got to be made free or abandoned. It is not any contest between the railroads and the canal, but the issue has narrowed down to this. Can New York hold its commercial position against the free Mississippi River and the practically free St. Lawrence? It is one thing or the other. A vote against free canals is a vote in favor of permitting Canada to do the carrying trade of the Northwest. And then, besides that, it is not a contest between the people of New York as to free canals, but between the people of this State and the people of Canada on one side and the people of Pennsylvania and Maryland on the other side. If the State of New York abandons its canal, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Boston and Montreal will be enormously benefited, because we are then placed on an equal footing with them. I believe that the people of the Northwest are gainers by having New York handle the bulk of their products, because this is the best and most convenient of all routes.—Montreal Gazette.

### Household Hints.

To cleanse white fur, rub in white flour and hang out of doors for a half hour; repeat two or three times and it will look like new.

To make a crape veil look equal to new, and restore the stiffness and lustre, place it on the grass after the dew has fallen and let it remain about half an hour.

Thin slices of bread dipped in tomato sauce, and then fried in butter until they are brown, take the place of an omelet. This is a good way to utilize stale bread.

The rind of a lemon is recommended by a noted cook as giving a delicate flavor to tomato catsup. It should not be put in until the catsup is done and is cool. Cut it in small pieces.

Corn starch makes the best paste for scrap books. Dissolve a small quantity in cold water, then cook it thoroughly. Be careful not to get it too thick. When cold it should be thin enough to apply with a brush. It will not mould nor stain the paper.
