was telling the correspondent something not previously divulged. He said that in 1946 he sent an ultimatum to Stalin to get out of Iran. The Russians got out because the U. S. was in a position then to meet a situation of that kind, the President said.
This ultimatum, he said at another point, was a message from him to Stalin and told the Russian leader that unless he did get out of Iran by a certain date the U. S. would put some people in there. The U. S. Truman noted had ships in the Persian Gulf then, and had plenty of troops in the neighborhood.
Roger Tubby, assistant presidential press secretary, issued the subsequent "clarification." He told reporters:
"The President was using the term ultimatum in a non-technical, laymen sense. He was referring to United States leadership in the United Nations and particularly in the Security Council, and through diplomatic channels in the spring of 1946, which was a major factor in bringing about withdrawal from Iran."
The note demanded that the Russians live up to their treaty obligations to protect the sovereignty of Iran.
Truman said also at the press conference that shortly after the Iranian development, Yugoslavia decided to take over Trieste. He said he called in General Eisenhower and other military leaders, ordered the Mediterranean fleet into the Adriatic Sea, and told Eisenhower to send three divisions to North Italy. There was, Truman added crisply, no march on Trieste.
Here again the White House later issued a clarification.
Tubby said the Trieste manoeuvre was in 1945-while the Yugoslav crisis-when the Yugoslavs occupied Trieste for 40 days. In May, 1945, Tubby said, Britain and the United States told Yugoslavia it must get out, and American troops were put on the alert to move in if necessary. Yugoslavia got out.

have an opportunity to study the effect of manure and fertilizers on the production of pasture grasses and clovers at annual Illustration Field Days, said Mr. Black.
This project has been active at Illustration Stations located at Montserrat, O'Leary and Rose Valley during the past three years and farmers have had an excellent opportunity to see at first hand the beneficial effects of manure and fertilizer in increasing pasture production.
In order to study the adaptation of different mixtures of grasses and clovers to P. E. I. conditions and to determine their economic value in a regular hay and pasture mixture, experiments were established at all Illustration Stations for the second time in 1951.

dow-fescue, Reed Canary grass, Ladino Clover and Birds-foot Trefoil have been seeded along with regular grass seed mixtures and their behavior will be studied during the coming season from the standpoint of adaptability and productivity.
Bone grass has already shown considerable promise and may serve to replace part of the timothy seed in the regular grass seed mixture now commonly used on Island farms, stated Mr. Black.
Soil Fertility experiments of a continuous nature will again be active at all Stations throughout the Province, it was stated.
The object of these experiments is to determine the most effective and economical place to apply plant food in the form of farm manure and chemical fertilizer in a hood crop, grain, hay and pasture rotation.

Blueberry Areas

In co-operation with the Division of Horticulture, Experimental Station in Charlottetown, an experiment involving the rotational burning of blueberry areas is being established at the Alliston Station this year.
This project is to supplement blueberry production studies which have been active at this point for a number of years, concluded Mr. Black.

Orchard Work

Mr. Gordon Warren, Horticulturist, stated that his division is planning on conducting several new experiments in the orchard and on fruits, vegetables and potatoes.
"We are planning on dividing the orchard into two parts to study the effects of some of the new fungicides and miticides in the control of fungus diseases and Red Mite," he stated. "Crag, one of the newer fungicides, is said to control Red Mite very effectively, and this material is being tried along with the others."
A new planting of dwarf fruit is being planned for this year and will include varieties of pears, apples, plums, cherries and peaches. It is felt that these dwarf trees may have a special place in a non-commercial place such as P. E. I., he stated.

Cranberry Studies

The studies of cranberries at Blooming Point are being continued and it is proposed to carry on weed control experiments as well as demonstrate the control of cranberry insects. Varsol, common cleaning fluid, has been found very effective for the control of grass and weeds in this crop.
The local Station in co-operation with eight other colleges and stations throughout Canada is carrying on vegetable merit trials. It is planned to use some of the newer weedicides in an effort to control weeds and shrubbery.

Beepackaging Experiment

Mr. Warren Burns, Weather Observer and Bee-keeper, stated that he was setting up a bee experiment at Upton Farm in connection with the packaging of bees. The purpose of the experiment is to discover the most economical way of handling packages.
In view of the change in policy from keeping bees during the winter time to the purchasing of packages in the spring, this experiment is of great interest to those in the bee-keeping business. Mr. Burns will use 60 two-pound packages of bees in the experiment.
Mr. Burns will continue to conduct the bee extension work in the province in co-operation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture. An over-winter apary is conducted at the Experimental Station.

crasse in the number of packages imported, he stated.
Approximately 740 or half the total number of packages for the Island are ordered for the area surrounding Charlottetown. The express charges of about \$1.15 a package is paid by the Provincial Government.
Mr. James Nicholson, Technical Officer, Animal Husbandry, stated that new experiments will be commenced and others continued throughout this year.
One experiment to be commenced this year will be the comparison of grass silage with other succulent feeds.

Artificial Insemination

The artificial insemination work will be continued, he reported. This project was started in 1949 with 14 herds being employed. During the first year 74 cattle were inseminated. In 1950, 95 cattle were inseminated and last year 178. The Station is now working with nearly 30 herds and so far eight bulls have been used.
An experiment comparing the feeding of potatoes and turnips to dairy cattle was completed this past winter after it had been conducted for three years. Results, which were not yet available for publication, indicate that one can replace the other without any noticeable effects.
Two grass mixtures at Upton Farm are being compared for pastures, stated Mr. Nicholson. Used in the experiment are a check plot with a brown top sod which has been down for over 50 years, a farmers mixture and a special pasture mixture.
The farmers mixture is commonly grown in this province by hay followed by pasture. It consists of timothy red clover, alsike and alfalfa.
