CRICKET MATCH.—A closely contested match was played at Victoria Park, on Saturday, between the officers of H. M. S. Comus and the Park Cricket Club. The former won with a score of 45 to 33. INJURED.—A sprained ankle was, on Saturday night, the result of a twist made in one of the ruts in the platform at the south side of the market house. Are the civic authorities waiting for something more serious? They may be accommodated. A GOOD PAIR.—The Sackville Post says: J. Walter Allison who spent a few days in town during the week, purchased while on the Island a fine pair of carriage horses from Mr. Main, of Kensington. They are half brothers, one by Royal Harry and the other by Allright. They were forwarded to Halifax on Monday. CUTTING AFFRAY.—The Amherst Press says: On Wednesday evening Miss Laura Walker was standing at the door of her mother's residence in Cat Alley talking to her young man. Her mother, Lucy Walker, interfered and ordered her in the house. The daughter answered "McGinty," whereupon the mother threw a case knife at her, striking her on the face and inflicting a bad looking cut. AT THE BUTTS.—A number of sailors from H. M. S. Comus and some of our local men had a friendly practice on Kensington Range on Saturday afternoon. On Wednesday next there will be a match between a picked team from the Comus and a team of local shots. The regular annual prize meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association is in progress at Kensington to-day, and will be continued to-morrow. A NARROW ESCAPE.—What was very near a drowning accident occurred at Connolly's Wharf this afternoon, at one o'clock. The little 12 year old daughter of Colin McMillan, while playing about the wharf with some other children, took it into her head to cool her feet by hanging on to the edge of the platform surrounding Connolly's bathing house, allowing her feet to rest in the water. She was not long in this position, however, when she lost her hold and sank to the bottom. A truckman named Alex. Campbell, and John McKenna, who has charge of the wharf, happened to be near by when she fell in. Campbell immediately upon seeing what occurred, jumped in, but missed the little girl. In the meantime McKenna had got out to where she was and dove for her, bringing her up and placing her on the platform. Two officers of H. M. S. Comus, who were passing at the time and seeing the child, set to work, assisted by Ernest Ings, to bring about respiration, by working her arms backwards and forwards. After an anxious fifteen minutes had passed the child showed signs of returning consciousness, and in a few more minutes was able to be removed to Mr. F. T. Newbery's residence, where every thing that could be done for her. Shortly afterwards she was almost over what might have been a fatal accident. Too much credit cannot be given to McKenna and Campbell for their promptness in doing what they did to save her. Neither can we praise too much the officers who by their presence of mind brought her to consciousness, where there was almost no hope.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING.—On Friday last, whilst A. C. McLeod, Chas. Mills and Neil Baker were returning from the fishing ground off New London, they were overtaken by an on shore squall. Unable to make the landing at Bonness & Anderson's factory, they ran for the harbor. Whilst on the bar, they were swamped in the breakers. About an hour they held to the boat, every breaker going clear over them, and the current carrying them out to sea. The schr. Lady of the Lake, from Prospect, N. S., passing over the bar just before them, and seeing their position, immediately launched a boat, manned by Capt. Richard Christian, with Michael and Thomas Christian, who, at the very peril of their lives, made over the bar, through three-quarters of a mile of breakers, to rescue McLeod and his companions. They succeeded in taking them up just as one of the number was exhausted, and in a few moments all would have perished. In the memory of the oldest inhabitants here, there is nothing to equal the heroism of Capt. Christian and companions. A few years ago, A. C. McLeod's brother received a blow from glass from the Dominion Government for rescuing parties from the ship Marco Polo, off Cavendish, and if anyone ever deserved a reward for risking their lives to save others, the case of Captain Christian and brothers is eminent.—Com.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 19. Adam Brown, M. P. for Hamilton, has been appointed Honorary Commissioner to represent Canada at the Jamaica Exhibition which opens in January next. The Commissioner of Customs states that no publication of the tariff is authorized or official except the one issued by the department, which is now in the printers hands. The annual complaint of whiskey smuggling from St. Pierre, Miquelon, has reached the Customs Department. Tenders are invited for supplying coal to all the public buildings throughout the Dominion. The name of Thomas Munro is mentioned in connection with the chief engineering of the Dominion canals.

Baseball Wrangle.

St. JOHN, N. B., July 20. The first wrangle of the season occurred between the St. Johns and Shamrocks on Saturday afternoon. In the vicinity of 1500 people assembled on the Shamrock grounds to witness the league games between these two clubs. The St. Johns insisted that the umpires should take turn about on the completed innings, and this the Shamrocks refused to concede. After considerable talk, umpire Connolly stepped to the plate and called "play ball," whereupon Donovan stepped to the bat, but the St. Johns did not take the field. After five minutes, umpire Connolly declared the game forfeited to the Shamrocks—9 to 0.

Beating the Record.

NEW YORK, July 19. Col. Wm. L. Scott's three-year-old Banquet ran a mile at Monmouth Park yesterday, in unprecedented time, putting up a new record for the distance, 2.03 1/2, which is a second and a quarter faster than the previous record, 2.05, made by Salvator in the famous race with Tenny.

Machine Works Burned.

PATTERSON, N. J., July 20. The extensive machine works of J. C. Todd were burned early this morning. The loss is about \$150,000. The fire is believed to be the work of an incendiary. It was the principal establishment in the United States for making hemp and rope. The machinery insurance was \$750,000.

Sir Ambrose Shea in Halifax.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 20. Sir Ambrose Shea, Governor of the Bahamas, was entertained at dinner at the Halifax Club last night. A number of Halifax capitalists are embarking in the sisal industry, which Sir Ambrose created and is enthusiastically fostering at the Bahamas.

Great Political Meeting.

QUEBEC, July 20. There was a great political meeting to-day in the parish of Laval, Montmorency. Hon. Mr. Laurier and Mr. McIntyre of Ottawa spoke for the Liberals, and Sir Adolphe Caron for Mr. Desjardine, whose election is considered pretty safe.

BOAT RACE.—Quite a number of spectators witnessed the four-oared race on Saturday evening, between the two junior crews of the Hillsborough Boating Club. The names and positions were: No. 1—P. Whitty, bow; J. McKinnon, f. m.; J. Callaghan, a. m.; and Patk. Prunty, stroke. No. 2—E. Carroll, bow; P. Dogherty, f. m.; F. Byrne, a. m., and Jas. Murray, stroke. At 7.15 the signal was given, both crews getting away well together. Prunty's crew having the outside position. The crews kept together for about 150 yards, when both began to splash a little. They soon however, got down to a good, steady stroke. Carroll, of No. 2 boat steering an almost perfect course. About half way to the buoy, No. 1 began to work ahead and as the buoy was about two lengths in the lead. No. 1 boat made a good turn, but No. 2 was not so fortunate. The latter struck the buoy as also did the stroke oar, causing the rowlock to spread. Before No. 2 got clear of the buoy, No. 1 had increased its lead by several lengths. The latter kept ahead until the finish coming in ahead by about ten lengths. Murray's oar was practically useless after turning the buoy, slipping out several times on the way home. The time given is 20 min. 30 sec.

Personal.

Theodore Tilton, of Brooklyn, has been installed as master of an English masonic lodge, the first time a foreigner has ever been placed over the head of a lodge on English soil. Col. George, United States Consul at this port, visited H. M. S. Comus this afternoon. The first section of the Raymond excursion party, in charge of Mr. Fred. E. Ayer, left in the steamer for Pictou this morning, en route to Bras D'or Lakes. Collingwood Schrieber, General Manager Government Railway, and P. S. Archibald, Chief Engineer, arrived here on Saturday evening. They went East this morning, on a tour of inspection, in company with Superintendent Unsworth, Mr. Huggan, Mr. McPherson, Mr. Crosskill and others. Dr. Chas. S. Davies, son of the late George Davies, Esq., late of Carnforth, Lancashire, is visiting the city. The New York and Brooklyn papers contain touching obituary notices descriptive of the labors and literary efforts of the late Angus P. McIntyre, editor of the Long Island Tribune, a native of Charlottetown, whose death in New York recently has already been noticed by THE EXAMINER. Mr. McIntyre was, undoubtedly, the most widely known editor on Long Island. A year ago his health gave way, and he travelled extensively in the hope of recuperating. He returned from the Southern States only recently, and recommenced his literary work, but on Thursday, 12th inst., he was compelled to give up. On the following Saturday, he was removed to the Flushing Hospital for skillful medical attendance. He died suddenly several hours afterwards.
