Mothers Protected By Red Cross Transfusion Service

In an unsung department of the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Laboratories, the mothers of P. E. I. are given a protective examination that many of them have not even heard about. It is where the blood of the pregnant woman is tested for type, the RH factor and for antibodies caused by the RH factor. Records of each woman are kept for continual check not only during the current pregnancy, but later ones, too. Trained technicians do the testing job and like most Red Cross activities, it is a free service. The medical doctors throughout the Province send in blood samples from their maternity patients and, in return, receive an analysis of the patients' blood. Samples must come from the doctors for the Blood Transfusion Service does not take samples direct from the patient. After receiving a sample, the technician tests it for two answers: The group of blood and whether or not there are antibodies resulting from the RH factor. If antibodies are found, they too are tested for type. While the RH factor itself is a complicated thing that the layman does not understand, it has proved that in some cases, an infant with an RH positive father and an RH negative mother, will develop jaundice, anaemia, etc. In extreme cases, the infant may be given a replacement transfusion shortly after birth. Several of these have been successfully transfused in P. E. I. since the inauguration here of this Red Cross Service 2 1/2 years ago.

Blood Transfusion Service technicians and doctors emphasize, however, that there have been too many "scare" stories written about children born of RH positive fathers and RH negative mothers. Of the 1273 samples tested here since Dec. 1949 only 27 showed the presence of antibodies.

It is interesting to note that precautions can be taken even where antibodies, resulting from the RH factor, are found in a pregnant woman's blood. Successive tests will show whether or not the strength of the antibody is increasing; and the Blood Transfusion Service itself, tries to maintain a stockpile of blood and plasma, so that it can be ready to stand by in cases of emergency such as this. This is just one of the phases of the Blood Transfusion Service which makes it necessary for a 100% response when Clinics are held in any locality, and all the more reason why Prince Edward Islanders should do all in their power to make next week's clinics in the Province the most successful ever held.

know. For you know that when you were young you were just as fun-loving and restless and craved excitement just as much as the youngsters of today.

Perhaps if you would remember your own youth, you would be more sympathetic toward your daughters who are only following the course of nature in wanting to have boy friends and go places and do things while they are young. It is just what you did when you were young and, although your father prospected that you would come to no good end with your gadding, you turned out pretty well after all, didn't you?

My advice to you is to go back home and make peace with your wife and girls and be more lenient with them. All of you must be miserable with this break-up of the family and with each side cherishing a feeling of resentment. So kiss and make up. You need your family and the girls need you for protection, and they will be a lot more willing to take your advice if you don't make it so drastic and arbitrary.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I am in my early teens and have liked a boy eight years my senior for some time. He is in the Army and is going overseas. He wants to become engaged, secretly, so that he will be sure I am waiting when he comes home. He says I could go out with other boys if I wished to. My parents wouldn't allow me to become engaged so young, I know. I wouldn't want to become engaged publicly, anyway, because then people would talk if I went out with other boys and I certainly don't want to sit home. Do you think the secret engagement is a good idea?

ANSWER: I think it is a very foolish idea, indeed. You're too young to think of engagements at all, and the fact that you want to keep on going with other boys while your would-be fiance is overseas should be indication enough that he's not of first importance in your young life. You can keep up a friendly correspondence with this boy, sending him all the news of the gang and home town happenings, but keep it on a friendship basis—nothing more serious. It is a deplorable thing when young boys and girls rush into engagements and marriages because the lad is going into foreign (or even domestic) military service. There are many complex, emotional reasons for this situation, but on the other hand such involvements are often spontaneous gestures—just a lark, as it were. In either event, they are more often regretted than not, and the sensible parting, especially among youthful teen-agers, is the friendly one.

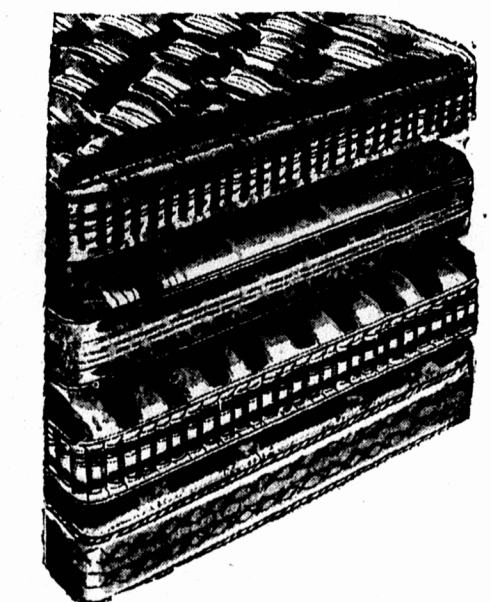
