DEAR G.S.: Your version of Sara's troubles simple doesn't make sense. That is, if we are supposed to take for granted that Sara herself is in her right mind.

Might it be that Sara isn't telling the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, as she knows it, about the situation that is hating her nerves? My mind refuses absolutely to believe that a youthful bride would insist upon living with the bridegroom's mother, who didn't want her in the house and refused to acknowledge her as the son's wife, much less receive her as a daughter.

The proposition becomes even more unbelievable when the bridegroom himself, well able to finance an independent domicile, is said to be fervently opposed to housing the marriage under his mother's roof.

NOW THAT SARA has unburdened herself to you, harried by fear of breakdown, and you yearn (properly) to help without being a meddler, I think the safe and sound thing to do is steer her into consultation with a first-rate analyst, or psychologist, or accredited professional family relations counsellor.

If not in the town from which you write, then in some of the surrounding big cities, first-rate services of the sort may be found. And I should think your family doctor could direct you to the right people, if you ask him to.

Now, going back to the beginning, if I were required to take your story at face value, and make deductions and recommendations purely on the basis of your reportage, I would say that Sara and the mother were sick - sick - sick - possibly in different ways for different reasons, but glued together by neurotic affinity (or translating living into a nightmare experience).

In which case, my suggestions outlined above still would afford the most prudent attack on the problem.

### Home-Made Coffee Cake Takes A Baking Powder

A warm, luscious, quick-raised coffee cake is an easily made treat for brunch, lunch, or informal dessert at dinner, or even a mid-evening snack with coffee, tea, or fruit juice.

Yeast-raised coffee cakes take much longer to prepare, so many homemakers prefer to buy them from the baker or supermarket.

**FITS DESCRIPTION**  
But when baking power alone, or buttermilk with baking soda, is used as the leavening (raising) agent, the coffee cake may be truly described as "quick and easy."

Today, the Chef and I suggest the following crunchy-topped coffee cake from the Midwest.

**Measurements level**  
recipes for 6

**APPLETUP KUCHEN**  
1 1/2 c. sifted flour  
1/2 c. sugar  
2 tsp. double-acting baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon  
1/2 c. chopped walnut meats  
1 large peeled apple, shredded (or 1 c.)  
1 egg, beaten light  
1/2 c. milk  
3 tsp. melted shortening or cooking oil  
1/2 c. dairy sour cream  
1/2 c. sugar (additional)

Sift together flour, 1/2 c. sugar, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Reserve 2 tsp. of chopped nuts. Stir remaining chopped nuts and shredded apple into flour mixture.

Mix together egg, milk, melted shortening or oil. Stir into flour mixture until well mixed. Turn into oiled 9" round pan. Spoon sour cream over top of batter in spiral pattern, leave center uncovered. Dust over additional 1/2 c. sugar. Top with reserved nuts. Bake 30 to 35 min. in hot oven (400 degrees F.). Serve warm.

Secure neck-skin down on back with pick. Brown all over in hot oven (425 degrees F.); then reduce heat to 350 degrees F. and roast 1 1/2 hrs. Baste 4 times with 1/4 c. butter or margarine melted in 1/4 c. water.

**GREEK STYLE RICE STUFFING**  
(enough for 2 (2 1/2 to 3 lb.) broiler-fryers)

1 c. white rice  
1/2 lb. sliced bacon  
1 fine-chopped peeled onion  
1/4 tsp. garlic powder  
1 lb. chopped beef  
1/2 tsp. ground rosemary  
1/2 tsp. oregano  
1 tsp. wine vinegar  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper

Boil rice 14 min. then drain. Meantime, fry bacon until fat runs freely. Add onion and garlic powder. Continue to fry until bacon is almost crisp; remove it and chop fine.

Add chopped beef to bacon fat and onion. Mix with kitchen fork, simmer 10 min. Then stir in rice, chopped bacon and remaining ingredients. Cook. Stuff chickens only 1/4 full, as rice in stuffing will swell while roasting.

Add a few chopped pickled onions to the French Dressing when tossing romaine salad.
