## Canadian Is Globetrotter, Every County Is His Home

J. D. Castonguay, well-known in the city of Moncton, has accumulated some 40 albums of photographs and picture post cards during seven globe-girdling air trips. Mr. Castonguay, with in sight of fulfilling a lifetime ambition to "see the world" has now set his foot in almost all countries.

Wearing a specially-designed windbreaker, emblazoned with a gold maple leaf of Canada, he started his world travels in 1954 with a tour of Canada, United States and the Caribbean (from Bermuda to Trinidad). He followed it up in 1955 with separate trips to all countries of Europe and Central and South America.

In 1956 he made a circling tour of the globe which took him to Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Fiji, and Hawaiian Islands. While in Melbourne he attended the Olympic games from beginning to end.

In 1957 Mr. Castonguay visited all countries of Africa and this took him in particular to the disturbed countries of North Africa. To the famous mines in the Belgium Congo, down deep in the gold mines of South Africa. He came face to face with some wild lions in the game park of Nairobi (Kenya Colony), he visited Madagascar, the Pyramids, and the Luxor with the ancient temples and tombs of the Pharaohs in Egypt in Holy Land he attended the midnight mass in Bethlehem.

In his most recent trip he visited Newfoundland, Iceland with its numerous hot water geysers and marks of volcano eruption, he visited the Lapland at the top of Europe, he flew over the North Pole just at the point where all directions point to the south, to Anchorage, Alaska, which brings a change in the solar time of eleven hours, then he visited the Yukon, the Canadian Northwest Territories and Hudson Bay.

Within the next year he hopes to complete the conquest of the world by his travels with a trip to Russia and the Satellite countries, China, Japan, India, Pakistan and other far eastern countries. Mr. Castonguay now speaks three languages fluently, French, English and Spanish, and he can manage German quite well.

Among his prized possessions are few "special flights" air line certificates (which he has framed) and many other testimonies of importance. He estimates to have travelled about 150,000 miles, the equivalent of six times around the planet.

SUMMERSIDE — Discussion of a proposed regional high school to serve the South Shore areas between Searletown and New Haven will be the purpose of a meeting scheduled for Victoria Hall on Friday evening.

An announcement of the meeting has been sent to school trustees in the various districts, and considerable interest has already been evidenced among parents throughout the area.

Special speaker at the meeting will be Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education, who is expected to outline the requirements and responsibilities of both the department of education and the districts that would be associated in the proposed school.

Two of the immediate projects expected to receive the attention of the new organization are playgrounds for the children, and a speed limit of perhaps 15 miles per hour for the area.

## S'side Druggist Passes Suddenly

SUMMERSIDE — The death occurred suddenly on Tuesday morning of Edward Lloyd Gallant, Summerside. He had been suffering from a heart condition for the past 14 years and the attacks became more frequent and of greater severity in recent months.

A son of the late John Edward Gallant and Gertrude Doyle, he was born in Tignish in 1904, moving to Summerside with his parents in 1915. After attending St. Dunstan's University he took up the study of law in Summerside. Following the death of his father, he took over the management of the Gallant Drug Co. along with his sister.

He later attended Dalhousie University at Halifax where he took a course in pharmacy. He enlisted in the Army Medical Corps serving in Canada and overseas and shortly after his discharge from the army in 1945 his health failed and he had been practically an invalid since.

The late Mr. Gallant was of a quiet and cultured nature and made many friends who will mourn his passing.

He was a member of many years standing of the Summerside Council of the Knights of Columbus and an active worker in this fraternal order in his younger years.

He leaves to mourn his sorrowing wife (nee Hester Cushing) and his sister (Ruth) Mrs. Ralph Noonan.

The body will rest at the home of his sister until Thursday morning at 8.45 when the funeral will take place to St. Paul's Church for Requiem Mass at 9 o'clock.
