MONDAY

Festive week proceedings had a festive morning as the services combined to hold a large church parade... The fine weather permitted a large number of citizens to witness it as the parade went from the Armouries via Kent and Prince streets to Trinity United Church where the Protestant party under the command of Lieut. Col. J. K. L. Irwin attended services.

Gerald Garfield MacDonald, 8 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert MacDonald of Pleasant Grove was the victim of a drowning accident in Winter River at about 3 p. m. on Saturday with his brothers Ray, 13, and George, 11, went bathing early in the afternoon and the surviving brothers did not notice anything unusual until the drowning boy shouted he was too far out. The oldest brother, Raymond, was able to reach his hand but the struggling boy shook off his grasp.

Dr. Temple Hooper, who was in the vicinity attempted resuscitation but without success, the boy having been in the water for about one hour. One of this city's oldest and most respected businessmen, Mr. George Morton Moore, president of yesterday and Mr. Leonard M. Moore, died yesterday morning in the Prince Edward Island Hospital after a brief illness. He was 94 years of age.

TUESDAY

A new water-borne freight service between Charlottetown, Cornerbrook, Nfld., and Montreal will be inaugurated on or about July 13 by Gerald F. Murphy and Sons Ltd., Montreal, according to information released by the Department of Industry and Natural Resources here yesterday. Negotiations for several months were concluded yesterday by Mr. Denis N. Murphy, representing the company, and Departmental representatives whereby the M. V. Charles E. MacLean, a 450 ton diesel powered ship will begin the service and continue to make a round trip every two weeks while navigation up the Gulf remains open.

commodation of livestock on deck. The freight charge on all commodities will be standard for shipments by water. Staff Sgt. L. A. (Larry) McInnis, City Police, one of the best known traffic officers in the Maritime Provinces died suddenly late last night at his home shortly after coming off duty. He had been attending to traffic duties at Victoria Park during the evening.

S/Sgt. McInnis joined the Police Force in 1934 and through his personality and natural friendliness made a host of friends all over the North American continent as countless tourists came to know and admire him for his never-failing courtesy and helpfulness. A great many of them took the trouble to write to the Police Department after they returned to their homes expressing their appreciation of the kindly help he had given them.

On learning of his death late last night Police Chief Charles MacArthur immediately dressed and went to his home. The Police Chief, shocked by the suddenness of the death, paid a fine tribute to his traffic sergeant when he stated that it would be almost impossible to replace him. "He was one of the finest officers I ever had with me and we never once had a 'crow' word." The Chief spoke of how Sgt. McInnis always personally directed traffic arrangements for big events and attended countless funerals to make certain things went smoothly. "One of the most conscientious officers anybody could have on a force."

Hon. Dr. Cyrus J. Macmillan, Privy Councillor, former Member of Parliament for Queen's and a public educator, died suddenly yesterday morning at his summer home in Fortune. He was in his 71st year. During his political life he had been Federal Minister of Fisheries and several years later assistant Minister of Air. His ability had been widely recognized prior to that, however, as he was named a member of the Royal Commission to study Maritime Claims in 1925. For the following two years he served on the Royal Commission to report on the Atlantic Fisheries and then was named chairman of the Royal Commission on Education in Prince Edward Island. While representing Queen's in the House of Commons he was chairman of the committee which framed the Yeoman's Land Act.

He obtained wide recognition as one of the outstanding educationists of his time and became Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences and Professor of English at McGill. He obtained his early education at Prince of Wales College before winning his degrees of B.A. and M.A. at McGill. He then attended Harvard University where he obtained another M.A. and his Ph.D. At the latter college he studied under the late George Lyman Kittredge, long considered one of the great authorities on the English language. In later years he was honored with the degree of Doctor of Laws from McGill.

Employment in Charlottetown and in King's and Queen's Counties is not as plentiful as it was one year ago. The National Employment Office in Charlottetown ascribes the falling off in work, to the lack of large construction jobs; the termination of ship repair work at Bruce Stewart and Co.; and the closing of a number of lobster factories following the great storm at the end of May. Nevertheless, a large number of people are working, and more and more people are being gradually absorbed in the working force every day. Within the last two weeks, more than 700 men were recruited for employment in Labrador and at other northern points. At the present time, no further recruitment is being planned.

We have achieved a sense of unity." He added that we recognize that our existence as a distinctive Canadian nation depends not only in holding common ideas but also in respecting and protecting those things in which we differ from one another.
