BUSINESS BOOMING.—Fifty-eight freight cars left here yesterday over the New Brunswick railway, 274 of which were loaded with potatoes. H. E. Island, King's, and Queen's counties exported during October potatoes valued at \$57,459. About 176,000 bushels were shipped west from points on the I. C. R. and N. B. railways during October, being about 20,000 bushels more than was exported during October last year.—St. John Telegraph.

SALMON SPOILING.—Last week a complaint was laid before J. Hunter Duvar, Esq., Inspector of Fisheries, that two persons residing in Freetown had been seen on Dunk River spearing salmon—contrary to law. The parties were promptly brought before the Inspector and fined—the one to the sum of \$100, and the other \$50—which fines, with costs, were, we understand, paid. It is to be hoped that this will have a deterring effect on others who may meditate poaching on the river. The prompt and determined action of the Inspector in enforcing the law is to be highly commended.—Pioneer.

STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT.—The Court was in session until almost six o'clock, yesterday afternoon. There were three Scott Act convictions instead of two as previously stated, and five postponements. The two young ladies, Owen Smith and James Dunn, were sent up for trial in the Supreme Court for stealing the money from Blake Bros. office in the Market building. Of the five boys arraigned for stealing sheep pelts from the premises of Blake Bros., on King St., two were sentenced to imprisonment and three discharged as stated yesterday. The three boys discharged, however, have a sentence of imprisonment hanging over their heads, if they do not, as promised, go to school and be better boys in future. This morning there was one Scott Act conviction of the offender being sentenced to two months imprisonment.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A Dynamic Outrage.

ORANGEVILLE, Ont., Nov. 15. To-night the house of Inspector Anderson was again blown up by dynamite. A charge was placed on the verandah at the front of the house, and two front rooms were badly shattered. The verandah is a complete wreck, and Mrs. Anderson, who was alone in the house and was sitting beside the stove in the dining room, was badly shocked. The Inspector had just left the house, and was only about 10 yards away when the explosion occurred. A note was found tacked to the fence warning him to desist from his efforts in favor of the Prohibition law now in force there, and stating that he might congratulate himself that he had not been blown to "Kingdom Come." The perpetrators are unknown.

The Big Raft Launched.

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 15. The great raft was successfully launched at Two Rivers at noon to-day and now lies at anchor in the bay, awaiting the arrival from Halifax of the steamship Miranda, which has been chartered to tow the monster to New York. The raft is 585 feet long, 62 feet wide, and 37 feet deep, and weighs 9000 tons. There were four ways 1,200 feet long, and the raft went slowly at first, but gathering speed ran a thousand feet until she floated. She made the run in thirty-four seconds without the slightest strain. She did not part a single chain nor spring the vast structure an inch. She was taken in tow by the Neptune, and the cradle removed at once. The raft draws 19 1/2 feet, or six feet less than was expected.

The Pictou Branch.

PICTOU, Nov. 15. The Pictou Branch Railway will be in running order by Monday next, the day the winter time table goes into effect, and will be formally opened for travel. At a meeting this evening it was decided to celebrate the occasion by getting up a big banquet, and inviting the members of Parliament, County Councillors and other leading men.

Still Hopeful.

OTTAWA, Nov. 15. The St. John deputation left Ottawa today. Before going Mr. McLeod said they were hopeful of getting the Government to subsidize a line of steamers to the West Indies.

Receiving the Czar.

BERLIN, Nov. 15. Prince William will meet the Czar at Wittenberg, upon arrival of the Czar at Berlin. The Russian Guards will line the route to be taken by him, along the Alsenstrasse, from Leiherti Station.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 15. At a special meeting of Plymouth Church and Society, this evening, it was decided, with but one dissenting vote to call Rev. Charles A. Berry, of Wolverhampton.

Sir John to Act.

OTTAWA, Nov. 15. Sir John Macdonald will be acting Minister of Justice during the absence of Hon. Mr. Thompson.

OTTAWA, Nov. 15. The Labor Commission had a preliminary meeting to-day.

Supreme Court.

WEDNESDAY, Nov. 16. The Court met to-day and delivered judgment in two cases.

Davis vs. Mahoney.—This was an application to set aside the arrest of the defendant, who is a citizen of the United States. The facts were that he came here temporarily for the purpose of buying produce for the American market, and chartered a schooner for trading up and down the river to obtain cargoes. It was claimed by plaintiff that the charter had been broken, and he issued a bailable writ against defendant for damages. The law relating to arrest forbids any bailable writ being issued except in cases where the defendant is about to quit the Island with the intent of defrauding the plaintiff. The plaintiff issued the writ, alleging that the defendant, being only here as a mere temporary trader, and being about to go home to Boston, was of necessity going away to defraud him, which would be the result of his going away, as his remedy would then be gone. The defendant's counsel argued that no intent to defraud could be inferred from the mere fact that he was going home, as he only came here for a temporary purpose, and his going home was in pursuance of his original intention, which existed before he came here and before the alleged breach of contract. The Court (Mr. Justice Peters dissenting) held the defendant's point to be well taken, and set aside the writ and discharged the defendant from arrest.

Mr. Arthur Peters appeared for the plaintiff, Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., for the defendant. Re application of William Larter for certiorari to remove a conviction under the Scott Act. The points taken in this case were: 1st. If after two or more first convictions under the Scott Act, can there be a conviction for a second offence and then for a third. The Court (Palmer C. J. and Hensley J.) held that there could. 2nd. Since the Revised Statutes came in force, could a conviction for a second offence

be supported by giving in evidence a conviction for a first offence obtained under The Canada Temperance Act, 1878, (the old Act.)

The Court (Palmer C. J. and Hensley J.) held that it could. Mr. Justice Peters did not concur in the conclusion arrived at by the majority of the court. He had not thoroughly looked into the case, as he did not expect that judgment would have been delivered to-day. His impression, however, on the argument had been against the judgment just delivered.

Mr. Frook, Peters appeared for Larter and Mr. W. S. Stewart in support of the conviction.

The Court then adjourned until next Hilary Term when judgments will be delivered in Trainor v. Black Diamond Co. Melzac v. Bradley and Andrew Doyle's Certiorari application.

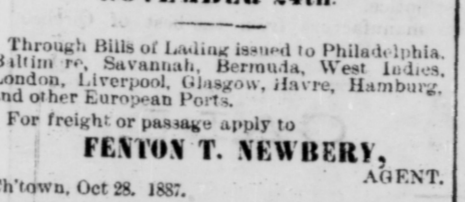
