From Good Friday until the end of March the following is the itinerary of Miss Mary C. Maddegen who is making the 1959 Pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

Good Friday, March 27, Liturgical services were attended on the Mount of Calvary. The way of the Cross—Pilgrimage along the Via Dolorosa were also on the plan.

Saturday, March 28, included a drive to Nabulus in Samaria to Jacob's well where Christ talked to the woman of Samaria, saw the old Roman Road along which St. Paul was taken to Caesarea for trial. Saw Mt. Ebel, Mt. Gerazim and visited the Samaritan Quarter. Returned to Jerusalem.

Easter Sunday, March 29, attended Postical High Mass at the Tomb of Our Lord. In the afternoon a drive to Emmaus, the home of Simon and Cleophas to whom Christ appeared after the Resurrection.

Monday, March 30, Crossed the border early through the "Mendelbaum Gate" into Israel. At Christ's Mother lived after the Ascension.
