## Tonight's Game In Toronto Is Considered Key Contest

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs, back among friends after two Stanley Cup final whippings in Chicago, did not whimper Wednesday despite the possible loss of their regular goaltender.

Assistant coach King Clancy, usually ebullient and cheerful, was tightlipped and determined: "We gotta win tomorrow night, that's all."

And the way Chicago Black Hawks mauled Leafs in the Windy City Sunday night and Tuesday night, most observers were inclined to agree with him. Hawks took 3-0 and 4-1 victories to square the best-of-seven series at two games apiece.

Johnny Bower suffered a groin injury in the first period Tuesday night and the exact status of the veteran goaltender for tonight's fifth game was uncertain.

**CHAVEZ RAVINE HAS PLENTY BEER BUT NO WATER**  
LOS ANGELES (AP)—The new Los Angeles Dodgers baseball stadium has one thing the Dodgers' old stand, Memorial Coliseum, doesn't have: beer.

But the Coliseum offered something to baseball followers that the \$18 million Chavez Ravine emporium doesn't have: water.

City councilman Edward R. Roybal has demanded an investigation of the lack of drinking fountains in the new park.

"At first," Roybal said, "I was told that the only two drinking fountains in the entire stadium seating 56,000 persons are in the players' dugouts."

"Later I found out there is a third—in Mr. O'Malley's private office." (Walter O'Malley is the president of the Dodgers.)

Roybal said Tuesday he was being deluged with complaints of citizens, most of whom looked upon the drought conditions as a pointed invitation to buy beer.

In the Coliseum, where Dodgers previously played, there are 150 drinking fountains. But alcoholic beverages are forbidden by law because the huge stadium is a municipal operation.

But to save the sport, he says, TV viewing of boxing must be eliminated completely, and return bout clauses must be done away with.

## Hawks Arrive Hale, Hearty; Plan No Changes

TORONTO (CP)—Chicago Black Hawks arrived here Wednesday night for the fifth game of the Stanley Cup final, hale and hearty after tying the best-of-seven series with two straight wins at home.

Coach Rudy Pilous was brimming with enthusiasm over Hawks' performance and their prospects of winning their second straight cup. And, he indicated, no strategy changes are planned.

"Well, what's wrong with what we are doing now?" he asked. "We can adjust ourselves, we can play it clean, we can play it rough, we've got a 'holier' club—great spirit—and we're younger than those other guys."

"Those other guys" are Toronto Maple Leafs, who returned home Tuesday night after a 4-1 loss. With that defeat and a 3-0 shutout Sunday night, they blew a 2-0 lead in games they picked up in the first two games, both in Toronto. Pilous said all his players are in good shape.

## Orioles Blank Yankees 1-0

BALTIMORE (AP)—Milt Pappas pitched the first six innings of a 1-0 victory over New York Yankees Wednesday night and hit the game-winning homer for Baltimore Orioles.

Pappas, who underwent an emergency appendectomy operation in Florida March 12, was removed from the game when his arm stiffened in his first start assignment.

The 23-year-old right-hander gave up two singles and a walk through the first six innings in a brilliant duel with New York's Bill Stafford.

## Ortiz Planning Aggressive Fight Against Brown

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Challenger Carlos Ortiz of New York apparently is planning a boxing, aggressive attack in his battle plan to relieve Joe Brown of his world lightweight title.

The two square off Saturday night for 15 rounds or less.

The 25-year-old Ortiz concluded boxing workouts Wednesday and the pattern of his attack thus far has emphasized offense, with defense secondary.

This was also true when Ortiz was preparing for the original date of the fight Feb. 24. His shot at the 35-year-old Houston, Tex., champion was delayed when Brown developed a severe case of tonsillitis.

Brown has shown no lasting effects of the ailment since returning to Las Vegas and his training, Bill Gore, said the champion will be in peak form.

## A Big One Tonight

FASTEN those seat belts because it's likely to be rough tonight.

We're referring, of course, to tonight's Stanley Cup classic between Toronto Maple Leafs and Chicago Black Hawks at Maple Leaf Gardens.

This is the fifth game in the finals and the teams are all square at two games each. Something has to give tonight and the winner will become heavy favorite to clinch the coveted old mug this season.

We have the feeling—and just about everybody agrees—that tonight's encounter will be the most bitter one in this best-of-seven set. The first four have been bruisers but tonight's action gives promise of making the first four look like tea parties.

BOTH Maple Leafs and Black Hawks have adopted the identical pattern they showed in the semi-finals against New York Rangers and Montreal Canadiens.

Leafs beat Rangers in the first two at Toronto and then proceeded to lose the next two in Bigtown. Black Hawks dropped the first two to Montreal on Forum ice but bounced back to square matters in games three and four at Chicago.

But the pattern must change for one team tonight. Both Hawks and Leafs won their fifth game in the semi-finals. Only one of them can accomplish a triumph tonight. Neither Leafs or Black Hawks lost on home ice this season in Stanley Cup play. The only team to win away from home in the semi-finals and finals was Chicago in that fifth game in Montreal.

LOSSES are costly at any time but they will be doubly so from here on as the two squads go at each other in these remaining games.

Naturally, Chicago and their supporters are thinking in terms of a victory tonight and closing out the series Sunday night on home ice. Black Hawks supporters around these parts are confident things "are in the bag" and that Hawks have lost their last game of the season.

On the other side of the fence are to be found those still loyal Maple Leaf supporters who insist their favorites can't be taken on home ice.

So far this series has really amazed us. A great many players on both sides looked mighty shabby on enemy ice but at home, before the loyal fans, they played like world beaters. If the same pattern would continue, then Toronto would emerge as world champions because they have the home ice advantage for the extra game.

## The Stage Is Set

THE Black Hawks played much better hockey in Montreal than they did in Toronto. They had the second game sewed up but Canadiens stole it from underneath their very noses. In Toronto, in the first two games of the finals Hawks looked poor and lost without one bit of doubt. Leafs went to Chicago for the third and fourth and looked every bit as bad.

If Chicago can retain the calibre of play they showed their home fans, then they'll beat the Maple Leafs tonight. If, however, the Leafs can get back to the style they used in games one and two to dispose of the Hawks, the Imlachmen will head into Chicago with a 3-2 margin.

We thought the Leafs, outplayed for most of the first two periods Tuesday night, did rally in the third. It's true they didn't beat Glenn Hall but he had to be really spectacular to hold them at bay. Neither team scored in that final 20 minutes but Simmons was tested only five times as compared to 14 on Hill.

The Leafs, too, did start throwing their weight around and Hawks' invaders felt it much more than they did in the game's early stages. It could have given the Leafs the push they need for tonight's battle.

## What About Bower?

WHEN we wrote this column, we didn't know whether Johnny Bower would be in the Toronto nets tonight. Our guess is that he will not but that Don Simmons will be given another big test.

If Simmons gets the nod, it could make Toronto play all the harder. Black Hawks' coach Rudy Pilous thinks so and he maintains this possible substitution has him worried. We don't think Simmons could be blamed in any way for Tuesday's loss. Leafs just lost it without any doubt whatsoever.

We still are alive in our prediction. We called it to be a "home" series and so far it has been just that. Hawks may change things tonight but until they do, we'll bet the other way.

At any rate, we expect a great struggle tonight as the teams fight their hearts out for this all-important fifth game.

Tonight's winner should go all the way. At least, that's what we think.

## Surging White Sox Hand Twins 4th Straight Loss

Surging Chicago White Sox sent Twins down to their fourth straight defeat at Minnesota Wednesday as Ray Herbert buried his first victory and capped the 3-2 win with a 370-foot homer.

Also in the American League, Detroit downed Senators 5-1 at Detroit. In the National, Cubs took a 3-2 win in 10 innings over Houston at Chicago; Milwaukee launched their home campaign by beating San Francisco 6-4; and unbeaten St. Louis pounded out 18 hits, including four homers, to crush Mets 15-5 at New York.

In the Minneapolis game Al Smith also cracked out a solo homer and Floyd Robinson had three singles, one of them run-producing. Herbert yielded nine hits including a homer to Bob Allison. The loser was starter Don Lee.

Don Mossi employed a puzzling curve to lead Washington. Al Kaline provided the punch for the win, including a first-inning homer and a 400-foot double off loser Joe McClain.

## Bucs Extend Win Streak

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Undeclared Pittsburgh Pirates extended their National League winning streak to seven games Wednesday by defeating Philadelphia Phillies 4-3. The league-leading Bucs also tied their 1938 club record for consecutive victories at the start of a campaign.

Bob Skinner's three-run homer—hit opposite field—swung the game to the Pirates in the fifth inning—provided by rates with their winning margin as righthander Earl Francis performed magnificently in relief.

Taking over for Wilmer Mizell in the third inning, Francis blanked Phillies with three singles the rest of the game which marked the first loss for Jack Hamilton, Phil's highly touted rookie righthander.

## Celtics Capture 4th NBA Crown

BOSTON (AP)—Incomparable Boston Celtics captured an unprecedented fourth consecutive National Basketball Association championship Wednesday night, vanquishing Los Angeles Lakers 110-107 on the heroics of Sam Jones and Bill Russell in an overtime battle.

Boston led most of the way in the game played before a sellout crowd of 13,909 in Boston Garden. But Celtics had to beat down tenacious Lakers in a five minute overtime session after Frank Selvy brought Los Angeles back from the brink of defeat in the final 40 seconds of regulation play.

Celtics were in dire trouble because personal fouls late in the game sent Tom Sanders, Jim Loscutt and Tom Heinsohn to the bench. With 74 seconds remaining Boston was leading 100-96.

Selvy made it 100-98 with 46 seconds and tied the count 20 seconds later. Selvy barely missed on what would have been the winner with three seconds to go.

Celtics made it look easy in the overtime period. Sam Jones scored five of Boston's 10 points in the extra semester and Russell added four. Bob Cousy getting the other point.

Los Angeles great Elgin Baylor had put Lakers in front 103-100 with a pair of free throws at the outset of the overtime but the visitors were shut off until Tom Hawkins netted a pair of baskets in the final minute.

Baylor led all scorers with 41 points. Jerry West, who with Baylor sparked Lakers' fourth period comeback, had 35.

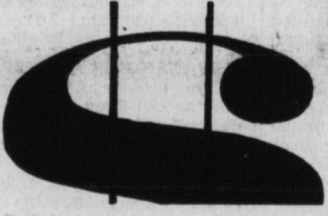
The 6'10" Russell hauled in 44 rebounds to tie a playoff record. He also scored 30 points.
