Nfld. Declares Federal Aid Needed For Education

O'Leary and Vicinity

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 7—(CP)—A suggestion that the Federal Government provide financial assistance to improve Newfoundland's education system was advanced today as the Massey Commission opened sessions here. Opening the last of its public hearings, the Commission heard briefs from the Provincial Education Department, Memorial University, the Newfoundland Museum, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and Colonial Broadcasting System.

Education Minister S. J. Hefferton said in his brief that "under Provincial status... it appears doubtful if we can continue our present rate of expenditure." Federal financial assistance, he said, would "not be used as a reason for decreasing the Provincial expenditure, but rather as a supplement."

The university submission suggested that the CBC should be "made completely free of all commercial sponsorship." "The CBC explained technical difficulties in expanding services to Newfoundland following confederation but added "broadcasting has made the advances of a decade in one year."

Newfoundland representative William F. Galgaly said it was hoped that service to fishermen in remote areas of the Province could be improved in the near future. The university submission suggested that the CBC should be "made completely free of all commercial sponsorship."

IN MEMORIAM
MR. PERCY ALLEN
—Many friends and relatives in Middleton, Searlestown and surrounding districts were saddened when hearing of the sudden death of Mr. Percy Allen in the Prince County Hospital on June 23rd, 1950.

Residents of O'Leary were pleased to read where the five United Church of Canada missionaries were reported in Korea to have been successfully evacuated. Among them was Dr. Florence Murray M. D. M. of Halifax, who grew up in O'Leary and took her preliminary education here when her father Rev. Robert Murray was the Minister of the then O'Leary Presbyterian (now United) Church from 1911-21. Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Murray have been retired for many years and are living at Bedford near Halifax.

Another missionary of the United Church of Canada in Korea, is Rev. E. J. O'Fraser. He is very well known to the people of "The Island" especially around the Kensington and Margate districts. He served as a missionary in Korea during the dreadful days of the early part of the second World War and was for many months a prisoner of war of the Japanese. When released he came to Kensington, P. E. I. to reside and was the minister of Margate P. E. I. United Church. He was always a devoted and faithful minister and made many friends. He loved the Korean people and he left P. E. I. to return to Korea in the fall of 1945.

The lovely warm weather of Sunday July 2nd brought forth large congregations at the West Devon, Bloomfield, Brae and O'Leary United Churches, with the minister preaching the sermon at all places except Bloomfield where the guest speaker was Rev. Dr. Strothart of Moncton. At O'Leary a fine solo "The Lord's Prayer" was sung by Mr. Allie Turner. He is a senior student at Mount Allison University in Sackville, N. B., and his fine voice was listened to with rapt attention and deep appreciation.

Rev. Dr. H. S. B. Strothart of Moncton N. B. arrived in O'Leary on Saturday July 1st. He was appointed by the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada meeting in June in Sackville, N. B. as the Mount Allison University Campaign Organizer. 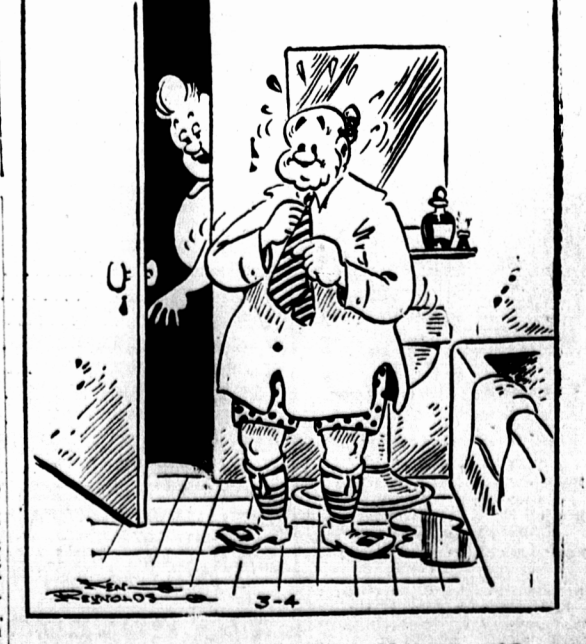
