RCMP Continues Check On Speed

In the continued drive by the RCMP against excessive speed on Island highways, five out of six speeders who appeared before Magistrate James B. CARDIGAN — The annual convention of the Three Rivers District of Women's Institutes was held on Wednesday afternoon in the Pictou Hall, Cardigan, with Mrs. Martin Myers presiding.

Sixty-nine members, representing the seven institutes in the district, responded to roll call, and there were 11 visitors present.

The address of welcome was extended by Mrs. R. J. MacDonald, Cardigan, and Mrs. Austin Ross, Lower Montague, responded.

The minutes of the last annual convention were read by Mrs. Alison Brothers. A most interesting and comprehensive resume of the activities of the branches was read by Mrs. Lee Allen, Cardigan.

One community project was the sponsoring and supervising of a welfare class at the Kings County Centre, which had been made to all worthy causes, sewing and knitting had been undertaken, for the Red Cross and various items, including books for the school libraries.

A beautiful display of handicraft from India and Brazil, as well as numerous quilts, were distributed to needy families during the winter months.

A brief "Fun and Nonsense" program was presented by the Montague group, led by Mrs. R. W. Beck. The program featured songs and skits.
