Editorial Notes.

Sir Charles Dilke, president of the Local Government Board, in presenting in the House of Commons recently the Government bill providing for the centralization of hospital management in the event of the out-break of cholera in London, said the general health of the country was very satisfactory, although there was a large mortality among children in London from diarrhoea.

The mining resources of the Northwest are only being found out. A few days ago immense fields of coal was discovered in that region, and it is now said a valuable discovery of silver has been made on the Kammissiquia river, Thunder Bay. The vein has been proved by stripping a distance of seventy-five feet, and is about forty feet in width, with well defined walls of trap and slate, and is without doubt a true fissure.

Considerable agitation is now going on in England in order to have the death penalty extended to other crimes than murder. An eminent English jurist favors this view of dealing with crime, and says that a small number of executions of professional receivers of stolen goods, habitual cheats and ingenious forgers, after a full exposure of their career and its consequences, would do more to check crime than twenty times as many sentences of penal servitude.

The prospectus of a new association known as The Canada Sanitary Association, has recently been published. On its roll are the names of a number of physicians of Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Halifax, St. John and Charlottetown. Initiative steps towards the forming of such a necessary association were taken in December last when the Health Conference was held at Ottawa.

- 1. For the promotion of sanitary education and diffusion of sanitary information throughout the whole of the Provinces.
2. For using the influence of its members to obtain joint legislation between the Federal and Provincial Governments, so as to enable more effectual steps to be taken when necessary to check the spread of infectious diseases.
3. To publish in its Sanitary Journal, for the use of schools, lectures on the laws of physics, hydrostatics, chemistry of sewage, disinfectants and deodorizers; water pollution and analysis; proper methods of laying drains and plumbing; ventilation of dwellings and public buildings, etc., illustrated by object lessons; designs of plumbing appliances and apparatus, etc.
4. For mutual co-operation with Provincial and Municipal Boards of Health, in order to assist them, by its influence and the personal exertions of its members, in all matters relating to the public health.

Such an association cannot fail to accomplish a vast amount of good. In this Province at least where the very simplest laws of hygiene are being continually violated, through the ignorance of its importance or vitality, the association will have a good field to work in. We wish it success.

The performance was highly successful. A large, and it may be added, an appreciative audience, assembled in the dining room which for the time had been converted into an impromptu theatre, with suitable stage effects, decorated with flowers, brilliantly lighted, and had a pleasing effect. Altogether the occasion was a very enjoyable one, the frequent encores testifying to the hearty good will with which the audience appreciated the performance.

P. E. Island and the Exhibition.

Dr. Jenkins, of the Advisory Board, arrived in St. John on the 5th. Being interviewed by a St. John Sun reporter, he stated the principal objections that that body had to the revised prize list. The principal question is the classification of horses and cattle. In the former there should, according to his view, be prizes for Clydesdales, English Percherons and Suffolks. In the first two classes there are from twelve to fifteen animals that would, in his opinion, be exhibited from the Island alone; but as far as the Percherons and Suffolks are concerned, the intending exhibitors do not care much for any alterations but to perfect the list it ought to be made. Dr. Jenkins says that great dissatisfaction is felt at the entry of "Mare and Foal or evidence of having bred within two years." The prevailing opinion on the Island is that this should be, "evidence of having bred within one year," because the impression is that the entry has been made to favor some particular intending exhibitor in the Provinces. In class 5, for saddle beasts there ought to be an additional prize at the least for the best hurdle horse. In grade cattle, there should be particular prizes for grade Ayrshire and short horns. To give these additional prizes would not, according to Dr. Jenkins' opinion, entail an expenditure of \$500, and he feels quite sure that the prospects of the success of the Exhibition would be greatly enhanced thereby. If the Commission refuse to make any alterations to meet the views of P. E. Island, Dr. Jenkins says there is little doubt but that the intending exhibitors on the Island will decline to take part in the exhibition. His view is that if the concessions are made it will promote good feeling between the Island and the mainland, leading to the agricultural interests reaping great benefits,

as both parties will have an opportunity of seeing what cattle the other possess, etc. At the last Exhibition at Halifax Dr. Jenkins states that the prize list contained the additions suggested by him.
