Lower Density Rate To Aid Electrification

Customer density per mile in the province's program of rural electrification has been lowered to two from three, Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter announced yesterday.

Mr. Rossiter said the extension of electric power to rural areas where there are as few as two customers per mile will mean that construction of electric power lines will now reach into practically every corner of the province. He predicted that eventually all homes in the province will have the electric power on matter what the population density per mile is.

According to Mr. Rossiter, the new program of providing power

that the Secret Army planned to destroy all banks and post office buildings to halt normal financial operations.

Phillips, when her vehicle started to act up.

Detecting major trouble, Mrs. Fraser moved the vehicle at a snail's pace and on arrival at a Summerside service station it was found that the vehicle had a broken frame. She was given a car for the return journey to Tignish.

ON A FAST, SAFE START FOR CALVES
