

Thousands Attend The Gathering Of The Clans

Clansmen from all over the Province and a good many from outside its borders gathered at Eldon yesterday in a crowd that many veterans clansmen considered to be a record at least in recent years. It was estimated at four thousand people.

There was a large entry list in the dancing and piping competitions and the track and field sports program was termed one of the best in recent years. Highlighting the sports program was the sensational performance of young Alfred Good of Summerside who soared to a new Maritime (native) record in the Pole Vault when he cleared the bar at twelve feet, nine and seven-eighths inches. Thus he broke the Maritime record he established two weeks ago at Summerside at the Maritime Track and Field Championship meet there.

Alfred was the highest scoring athlete at the meet and won the leather brief case presented to the man who emerged as the highest point winner. The case was donated by Ernie MacInnis, Village Restaurant.

CLAN CHIEF PRESENT
Special and honored guests at the gathering were Lt.-Col. Donald Hamish Cameron, of Lochiel, and Mrs. Cameron, Invernesshire, Scotland.

Speaking briefly he referred to the wonderful Highland hospitality which he was meeting wherever he went on his visit to this country. I find that spirit very much in evidence here today and I want to express my appreciation he assured the large number of people gathered in front of him as he spoke.

Referring to the early history of his clan he said they were a fierce and a warlike clan but time has changed that he assured smilingly.

Col. Cameron was introduced by J.O.C. Campbell, chief of the Caledonia Club who noted that the distinguished visitor is a charter accountant, a director of the Royal Bank of Scotland and a part time member of the British Transport Commission. He was born September 12, 1910 and is a son of Colonel Sir Donald Walter Cameron.

NEIGHBOURS
Recalling that Lord Lovatt, chief of the Fraser Clan, was here four years ago Mr. Campbell noted that Lovatt and Cameron of Lochiel were brought up within sixty miles of each other. It was noted that Col. Cameron joined the Lovatt Scouts—they were organized in the First Great War by the

present Lord Lovatt's father—in 1929, became Major in 1940 and Lieutenant Colonel in 1945. He is presently commandant of the territorial battalion of the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders.

Others who spoke at the opening ceremonies were Lieutenant-Governor T.W.L. Prowse, Premier A.W. Matheson and Rev. Donald Nicholson, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Belfast. W.E. Agnew, president of the Caledonian C.C., presided.

COMPETING PIPE BANDS
There was an unusually colorful performance by the competing Scottish pipe bands. The MacDougall girls pipe band took the nod of the judges.

Judges of the piping were Pipe Major Donald MacLeod, Glen William, Seumas MacNeill, joint principal of The College of Piping at Glasgow, Scotland and Pipe Major Duncan McIntyre of Amherst.

George Fraser took the Hon. Dougald MacKinnon trophy, the feature piping trophy of the day, for winning the adult open class. He also placed first in the class for solo piping 14-16 years.

A highlight of the afternoon was the exhibition of highland dancing given by a Scottish and world champion. He was James L. MacKenzie from Edinburgh, Scotland who judged the highland dancing at the gathering.

The sports program was run off through the kind co-operation of Brigadier W.W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness who furnished the equipment and conducted the meet.

Fire Department Team Makes Fine Showing At Tournament

The Charlottetown Fire Department's athletic team came home last night after making one of their best showings in years in a Maritime Firemen's Tournament. The meet was held yesterday at Truro.

The local firefighters took first place in the Hose Reel race, the feature event of any tournament. They took first and second in the 100 yard dash, placed third in the ladder race and third in the hose replacement event.

It was the first time since 1953 that a Charlottetown team had won the Hose Reel event. The time was 54 and one-fifth seconds for the 300 yard distance. The ladder race was in 13 and one-fifth seconds and the hose replacement event in 18 and three-fifths seconds.

Dulles And Zorin Confer For First Time In London

LONDON (Reuters)—An American spokesman announced Wednesday the United States, Canada, Britain and France have agreed on a policy of aerial inspection of East-West territory as part of a disarmament plan.

The spokesman did not say what area of inspection was envisaged. There have been reports here and in Paris that U.S. Secretary of State Dulles, who arrived here Monday for the disarmament talks Monday night from Canada, will propose to open the skies of all the United States and Atlantic Pact countries in return for a similar concession from Russia and her satellites.

The West will have a chance to present proposals officially Thursday to the next formal meeting of the five-nation disarmament subcommittee.

Wednesday, Dulles maintained a whirlwind round of conferences aimed at giving new impetus to the talks. Among those he saw was Soviet delegate Valerian Zorin.

Wednesday's session was postponed to enable Dulles to continue private meetings with Western delegates. It was conceded by an American spokesman there are differing views on other aspects of disarmament.

PINEAU TO ATTEND
French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau will fly here from Paris Thursday to confer with Dulles.

Thursday's luncheon with Zorin and the Western representatives lasted two hours.

It was Dulles' first meeting with Zorin. American officials gave the impression that it was purely a social function.

Another topic for discussion was the problem of suspending nuclear tests. The United States recently suggested stopping them for 10 months. Britain and France are said to favor an 18-month period. Russia recently proposed an unconditional end to tests for two to three years and is thought unlikely to accept a shorter period.

Dulles met at the foreign office with Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd. They met again at dinner with Prime Minister Macmillan.

New Weapon Against Fires

FREDERICTON (CP)—A new weapon in the war against forest fires will be demonstrated at a national conference of industry and government forestry experts at Charlottetown, near Dalhousie, N.B., Aug. 12 and 13.

The conference, sponsored by the woodlands section of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, will be held at the Forest Protection Limited headquarters for budworm spraying operations.

The program, dealing exclusively with forest fire control, will feature an elaborate demonstration of a chemical fire extinguisher. The chemical, calcium sodium borate, will be dropped by aircraft and sprayed by ground crews up on a controlled brush fire. A budworm spray plane will be used in the experiment.

The delegates will also witness displays of the most up to date fire fighting equipment, organized by the Pulp and Paper Association.

Scouts Arrive For Jamboree

SUTTON PARK, England (Reuters)—A Junior United Nations of 35,000 boys scouts from 80 nations took root Wednesday night on the eve of the 12-day world scout golden jubilee jamboree.

Hundreds of scouts of just about every known race, creed and nationality gathered around campfires to swap scout badges or hammer the last pegs into this vast canvas city in central England.

Nearly 75 tons of American camping equipment unloaded from the liner Fairsea which carried the scouts from Quebec arrived at the camp Wednesday night.

One scout from Illinois laughingly recalled a shipboard incident in which a pigeon suddenly fluttered from a closed closet. "It had evidently been there ever since the ship left Quebec," said senior scout Hugh Kirk of MeHenry, Ill.

The jamboree gets under way today when it is officially opened by the Duke of Gloucester, Queen Elizabeth's uncle, president of the Boy Scouts Organization.

The jamboree this year celebrates a double event—the centenary of the birth of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the world scout movement, and the golden jubilee of the first scout camp.

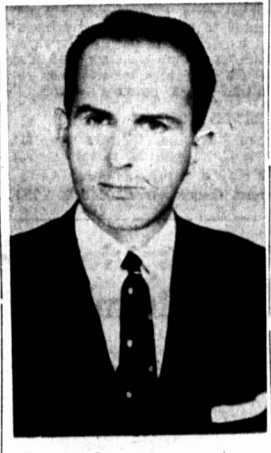
