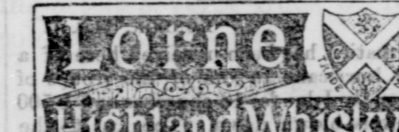

## Cetewayo's Return.

The Natal correspondent of the London  
News has had an interview with a South  
African notability concerning the restoration  
of the Zulu King. "There are," he  
said, "several rocks which must be avoided  
if mischief is not to result from Cetewayo's  
return. There is John Dunn. There is  
the other kinglets. There is the serious  
question of Cetewayo's private property.  
John Dunn has a deep personal interest in  
maintaining his position in Zululand, and  
in Zululand he cannot stay if Cetewayo  
goes back. He has made money there  
already, and, therefore, will wish to stop to  
make more, and, though I believe he would  
find himself entirely deserted as soon as  
Cetewayo entered the country, he may have  
the power, if he is not carefully dealt with,  
of creating awkward and undesirable dis-  
turbances. He is, in fact, an enemy for  
whom a bridge may be built with advan-  
tage. As regards the other kinglets, they  
held their places by a species of constitu-  
tion conferred on the country by a conquer-  
ing power, and they cannot be deprived of  
their position except by some voluntary  
agreement. If they could be induced to  
appear in the light of welcome  
of the exiled monarch I should have  
little fear for the future. Though it  
must be borne in mind that those who have  
once been chiefs will always be in danger  
of being suspected of wishing to be chiefs  
once more, and that though Cetewayo him-  
self may be magnanimous enough not to  
take notice of such suspicions, his relatives  
may be less well disposed. As regards the  
King's property, this is the matter which  
must be most carefully attended to. The  
royal cattle have passed into the hands of  
all sorts of persons, and it must be seen  
that there is no room left for such persons  
to suffer. Then there is the question as to  
how the restoration is to be brought about.  
Cetewayo cannot be suffered to enter the  
country alone or in a way that will leave it  
open to his subjects to entertain doubts as  
to his position. There must be a British  
force to accompany him and show that he  
has the moral support of the British gov-  
ernment—say a force of two or three  
squadrons of cavalry, such as accompanied  
Sir Evelyn Wood into Zululand in August  
last. If these conditions are observed,  
then, although there may still be risk,  
Cetewayo's restoration will take place under  
the best chances."

## Sunflower (Helianthus annuus)

It is satisfactory to find attention at last  
directed to this very valuable plant. Our  
agriculturists are slow to leave the ancestral  
groove, and to give strange crops, no matter  
how intrinsically good, a fair trial. It is  
odd, however, that the sunflower, wor-  
shipped as it is by the Chinese—a people  
whose energies have been exerted for  
thousands of years in forcing the soil to  
yield its products to the support of a re-  
dundant population—should still be con-  
fined to our gardens. No plant that I  
know of can lay claim to possessing so  
many valuable properties, and, in fact,  
is "all us."

From the seeds is expressed a clear and  
flavorless oil, which is extensively used for  
adulterating salad oil. As a lubricant, it  
ranks equal with castor for machinery  
running at a high velocity; and from it is  
manufactured a soap which, for softening  
the skin, has no equal. It burns longer than  
any vegetable oil. On an average, about  
fifteen per cent. of oil may be obtained by  
expression; and by careful cultivation on  
light liberally-treated soil, this yield can be  
materially increased.

The feeding properties of the cake are  
said to be superior to those of linseed. In  
Russia, where both plants are largely  
grown, it is preferred to the Linum, and  
stock are very fond of it. The yield of  
cake is eighty per cent. Fed as seed its  
effect is most satisfactory; every descrip-  
tion of stock fatten rapidly on it, and its  
effect on the plumage of poultry and  
pheasants is remarkable. The flour makes  
a very toothsome bread or tea-cake. As  
bee-fed the flower has no superior, pro-  
ducing excellent honey and wax. The  
leaves make vastly better tobacco than  
many of the spurious articles which enter  
into the internal structure of several  
brands of our home manufactured weeds.  
The dried leaves powdered and mixed with  
bran are said to be very good for milk  
cows, and I know for certain that the seeds  
vastly increase the laying propensities of  
poultry.

## Bismarck Hath no Music in His Soul.

good Italian hand-organ, or an accordion,  
but as for orchestras, pianos, the opera,  
prima donne—bah! he had no time to  
waste over such nonsense; and as for  
tenor singers, over whom so many went  
into ecstasies, he could not endure  
them.

## Insurance in Winnipeg.

Insurance companies doing business in  
Winnipeg have combined to keep up the  
rates. The consequence is that a rise  
which is taken at fifty cents in Toronto  
is not taken under \$1 12 in the millio-  
aires paradise. There is some justice,  
it would seem, in charging a higher rate  
in Winnipeg than in Toronto, because  
the risk in the former place, owing to  
the large number of frame buildings and  
the small area covered by the fire limits,  
is greater. Still Winnipeg insurers are  
dissatisfied, and they are endeavoring to  
induce some of the American companies  
not yet doing business in Canada to go  
over and help them. These companies,  
it is alleged, will not have to make the  
\$50,000 deposit with the Dominion  
Government, as they will not establish  
agencies in Canada. The Canadian  
insurer will simply step across the line  
and insure there, risking the recovery of  
his money in case his building is con-  
sumed by fire.

## A Nicaraguan Revolution.

The American schooner Transit, re-  
ported as seized by pirates at Cupe Gra-  
cias a Dios, Nicaragua, really seems to  
have been captured by some revolution-  
ists, who hoped that by gaining posses-  
sion of her they could capture San Juan  
del Norte, generally called Greytown.  
A man named Emiliano Herrera seized  
the little town and declared himself  
"chief of the provisional government of  
the Atlantic coast," and commenced to  
issue orders and decrees, and under his  
orders the schooner Transit was seized.  
She was subsequently recaptured by  
Captain Thomson and his men, and the  
pirates or rebels carried to Bluefields,  
Nicaragua, and delivered into the cus-  
tody of the United States Consul at that  
port. After the Transit left Gracias a  
Dios the populace rose against the rebels,  
seized them, executed the two leaders—  
Emiliano Herrera and Miguel Greira—  
and thus peace was at once restored.  
The Consul took the prisoners, who were  
delivered to him by Captain Thomson,  
to Georgetown and turned them over to  
the Nicaraguan Governor of that port,  
who in turn sent them to Granada,  
where they are now in prison awaiting  
trial.

## Umbrellas for Horses.

A Swiss technical paper gives an ac-  
count of a new invention which would  
have interested Lemuel Gulliver. Herr  
Theodor Buhlmann, an engineer in  
Frauenfeld, has registered a patent for  
umbrellas for horses. His "Pierdepar-  
apluie" is to take the place of the pre-  
sent horse-cloth, so far as the latter is a  
protection against rain; but it has the  
further advantage of serving as a sun-  
shade as well as an umbrella, and pro-  
tecting the animal against heat. The  
horse umbrella is provided with two, or  
with four handles, as the case may be,  
so as to fit different sorts of vehicles,  
and extends a grateful shadow over the head  
and body of the horse. It is easily man-  
aged if we can trust the description, and  
can be closed or opened at will by the  
driver by means of a spring. In the  
intense midday heat of a Swiss valley  
or open plain, where an occasional tree  
affords the only shadow for a long stretch  
of miles, the horses frequently suffer ter-  
ribly from the heat. When they are  
bathed in sweat, ascending some steep  
mountain road, they are often surprised  
by sudden rains; the tender skin is wet-  
ted through in a moment, and the in-  
stantaneous chill ensues in which the  
Kutschers attributes the disease and the  
mortality of the horses. How far Herr  
Buhlmann's quaint and humane inven-  
tion is likely to be adopted, or whether  
it will serve the purposes which he at-  
tributes to it, whether it will serve the  
purposes which he attributes to it, we  
cannot tell. It certainly fails to meet  
one of the needs provided for by the old  
horse-cloth; it is of no use as a warm  
cloak. We may add that it is more than  
probable that the first coachman who  
drives along a public road with this  
singular article suspended over his shafts  
will have to endure at least as much ban-  
ter as fell to the lot of the daring Jonas  
Hainway when he marched through the  
rain beneath the father of English um-  
brellas.
