OPEN LETTER NO. X.

To the Hon. Donald Farquharson— The "Unsound Premier."

SIR,—It is clearly made plain that you have committed the Government of this poor and unfortunate Province to the payment of \$12,000 a year on account of the Hillsboro Bridge, whether the Dominion Government spends the money or not. There is no specific time for them to build it, and they may take 10 or more years to construct it spending only a fraction of the amount required each year. Still this little province will have from the start to turn down \$12,000 each year as long as grass grows and water runs. You may pretend in the public meetings which you attend that you are only to pay the pro rata interest on the amount expended each year. The language of Blair and Davies is against you, for they said in Parliament "that the Local Government was willing to contribute \$12,000 (per year) and had arranged to do so." Did you contemplate that more than the interest of the money actually expended was to be paid till the bridge was completed? If you did you have clearly made a poor bargain, because the ferries will have to be maintained till the bridge is opened for traffic thus making the depleted revenue arising from the taxes laid upon the farmers of this Province do double duty. This is not a matter for speculation. The exact terms of the compact which you have made with the Federal Government should now be published so that the electors might know the truth.

Indeed it is imperative now that a full and explicit statement of the public accounts be made, together with the outstanding contracts that futurity has to pay. You need not shield yourself now that the accounts cannot be published till the Governor's speech is replied to. Mr. Peters on the hustings in 1891 promised that one of the first acts he would pass would be a law to authorize the publication of the accounts whether the Legislature met or not. To his credit be it said he passed the law; but it is not to his credit that he has never acted upon it, and neither he nor his successors paid any attention to it. It is now like the plebiscite vote and many other liberal promises—a dead letter. Listen to the law, 55 "Vict, cap 3. Assented to 15th July, 1891:

"Whereas it was hitherto been the practice not to publish the public accounts of the Province until after the Lieut. Governor's speech has been answered, and such practice is inconvenient.

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieut. Governor, Council and Assembly as follows:

"It shall hereafter be lawful for the Lieut. Governor in Council to authorize the publication of the public accounts of the Province at any time after the same are ready for publication, notwithstanding that the Legislature may not have met for the despatch of business."

For eight long years that statute or authority has remained on the statute book a dead letter; its passage was a blind act alone for the promises made at the partial election in 1891. You were cognizant of this, and you must have known that law was passed. Why don't you now advise the Governor to assent to an immediate publication of the indebtedness of the Province, at least up to the 1st of July last? What excuse have you to offer to the country in this matter? Will you also publish the agreement respecting the Hillsboro Bridge—while the Province still has to maintain the ferries in full blast. Where was that apostle of integrity and "dashaway" fame, Mr. Sinclair, who sat penitently reconciled and satisfied to see the resources of the country frittered away when these laws were passed. Perhaps he was absent or made it convenient to be absent, like the vote on the Temperance license law for Charlottetown? At all events it appears that your usefulness as a leader or representative is gone for you have not the interests of the taxpayers of this Province at heart. Mr. Haggart's language in Parliament ought to sink deep into the hearts of the electors of this province; "In spite of all the charges of heresy, I have never got that out of my head. Yet Prince Edward Island has received nothing in the shape of subsidies to railways at any time. It is entitled to its share, and if the people have set their hearts on these lines of railways they should have them," and "it would be only fair play and just to Prince Edward Island under the terms of Confederation." Now you see who are the friends of this Province. Where has Mr. Davies spoken on behalf of a railway or other public work for West Queen's?

The Hillsboro Bridge is a public work that should be built; but if Mr Davies had worked in opposition as well as Mr Martin and Mr McDonald do now we would not only have the railway but the bridge also. If he had even worked after he obtained a seat in the Government he might have something to his credit now. A petition with 500 electors names was presented to him for a railway to Stanley Bridge and he never submitted it to the Government. Truly such a representative must consider himself above the people, but a day of reckoning is fast approaching a man 18 years in Parliament who has nothing to his credit in the way of advocacy of public measures for his riding, must imagine the people are fools and that a toy is a very nice thing to have as a representative. The bauble of Knighthood, to which you may have some faint hope in your aspiration, has blinded Sir Louis's eyes to the needs of his constituents. Once a Government attains power if there is such a thing as Governmental justice, the rights of the people irrespective of party is entitled to ample consideration and respect. The unfortunate thing is that you yourself represent Conservatives as well as Liberals. Did it never enter into your head that their rights have an equal weight and consideration with that of your partisans, and that when you were

elevated to a position which nature never intended you for you, should have only one idea paramount and that is equal justice and fair play as the "wise man" who would despise to do a mean or disgraceful act.

Your prehensile proboscide will shortly receive a pull from the yeoman electors of Queen's that will cause you to shudder. No more playing with words! No more false promises. No more arbitration for additional subsidy! The bare fact of additional taxation is the only thing left for us now. Yet there are claims of over two millions of dollars to which we are justly entitled from the Dominion Parliament. Will any man be so insane as to say that the Hillsborough bridge should not be built by the Dominion in the face of that claim? You have sacrificed our prospects of getting any more now and should meet with a rebuke on every hustings which you appear on. Vote you down is the only thing left for us to bring you to your knees, and from there to flat on your back is but a short distance; but the concession will be so great that you will sleep your eternal sleep as a politician.
