### Incorporation Act Amendments Sought

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Out of the province are councillors Elmer MacRae and W.R. MacNeill and City Engineer D.E. MacLennan, and Coun. Douglas MacDonnell, who was absent for the first part of the short meeting.

Resolutions were passed regarding several applications to be made to the Legislature during the current session.

One application will ask for an act to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act to provide for advance polls in civic elections and for closing the eastern ends of Sydney and Water Streets and the southern projection of Cumberland Street.

The Legislature will also be petitioned on behalf of the commissioners of sewage and water supply for authority to issue water debentures and sewer debentures to a total of \$304,000, and will be petitioned for an act to authorize issue of debentures to the amount of \$270,000 to refund expenditures for permanent works for 1964.

Nam in a Friday speech in New York.

He said he didn't mention the United Nations because, if there were negotiations, they might not be under the aegis of the UN any more than was the 1954 Geneva conference.

Asia and perhaps African nations, closer to the scene than Canada, could better bear responsibility for any peace force, he said.

Mr. Diefenbaker said the prime minister's peace force suggestion was "fantasy" unless he had in mind how large it should be.

Mr. Pearson said this was impossible to prescribe until it was determined what a political settlement might entail.

His ideas had been sent to other governments. So far, only the United States had expressed an opinion.

### PLUG FOR P.E.I.

Canada will receive an estimated 2½ billion dollar revenue from the fair, included in this estimate will be the mass influx of visitors who will travel across Canada and help to celebrate its 100th birthday. The Canadian government will spend 21 million dollars on the Exposition itself, and provincial governments will contribute another \$21 million. The Atlantic Provinces' exhibit will be approximately one-eighth the total cost of Ontario's exhibit.

"Expo 67" will be unique in the world because it will feature the largest number of exhibitors since the inception of World Fairs. It will be the first of its type in North America because it is completely sanctioned by the Bureau of International Exhibitions. The fair will be accompanied by a world festival of the performing arts and use culture as its theme, not trade fair.

Mr. Shaw closed by calling "Expo 67" the "largest single peacetime operation ever conducted in North America." He also commented on Prince Edward Island's Centennial Celebrations and said, "Prince Edward Island has shown us the way, now it's up to Canada to follow."

### HEAVY FIRE LOSS

Councillor MacDonnell, chairman of the fire committee, reported the fire department answered 11 calls in January and 23 in February, almost double the number received during February of 1964.

Most serious losses during the two months were in fires at the Queen Hotel, Michael Brothers warehouse and Cudmore's Business Equipment store and Adelia's Millinery. Estimated total fire loss was \$160,945.

The report of the bureau of fire prevention noted that building inspection had shown the rubbish situation had decreased considerably because of the new system of garbage collection. It was also stated that a complete automatic sprinkler system had been installed in the building known as Rochford Square School and St. Joseph's Convent.

The police department reported 75 arrests were made in the month of February, with 65 convictions. Investigated were 19 motor vehicle accidents involving over \$100 damage and 15 under \$100.

### ATLANTIC EXHIBIT

The slides of the future pavilions provided insight into the imagination of the exhibitors. The United States pavilion will feature a glass-encased dome roof with constant color changes. Ontario is constructing a roof of different glass configurations comparable to the local Confederation Centre.

Mr. Shaw also commented on the Atlantic Province's exhibit. It will be constructed at a cost of \$1 million dollars and will feature one of the most unusual and novel ideas ever presented in a World's Fair. The theme of his environment will be developed using the Atlantic Ocean and a complete yacht will be built before the visitors' eyes. "I have seen the plans for this exhibit, and I feel it will be one of the most popular of the fair... and I do not state this because I am in the Maritimes," Mr. Shaw said.

The "Expo" will also feature a thousand-foot memorial commemorating the 325th anniversary of Montreal. The telephone company will erect a "living screen" which will present images from all angles. Plans for the many private exhibits have not been released as yet, but Mr. Shaw commented on some of the unusual ideas already approved by the commission.

### MAY SCRAP LOAN PLAN

KARACHI (Reuters) — Pakistan Saturday said it will have to cancel a \$51,000,000 loan agreement with Canada for building a nuclear power plant here unless Canadian General Electric lowers the construction cost. The announcement came from the deputy chairman of Pakistan's planning commission said Hasan. He added if no agreement is possible the loan will be scrapped and some other country approached.

### Borden Council Hears Beefs On Condition Of Town Flags

BORDEN — A complaint regarding the poor condition of flags and flag poles at the entrance of the town was discussed at last night's monthly meeting of Borden Town Council.

Council members felt they should not be responsible for renewal if flags were supplied. Mayor Gilbert Bell presided over the meeting, and councillors Everett McKenna, Arthur Jay, William MacIvor, and Reginald MacAleer and Town Clerk Frank Westhaver were present.

It was decided that dwellings not connected to the sewerage on or before July 31 would be proclaimed uninhabitable under the town bylaws.

Councillor MacAleer gave the police report, which stated \$289.50 had been collected in fines during the month.

Several cases came up for consideration in the welfare report.

The assessment for 1965 was reviewed and passed.

### Sealers Keep City Airport In Busy State

More than a dozen light aircraft and a number of helicopters passed through the Charlottetown airport yesterday morning en route to the sealing grounds of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Some stopped to refuel and others to await the regular Eastern Provincial Airways flight from the Magdalen Islands bringing in skippers hired by the flying hunters.

The two principal companies passing through here on their way to the hunting grounds were Hicks and Lawrence Flights from Tilsonburg, Ontario, and the Northern Wing Company of Seven Islands.

The former company has three Super Cub aircraft and one helicopter, while the latter firm has an undetermined number of light aircraft along with helicopters.

The copters will be used to gather the scattered pelts onto a central large pan of ice and they will be transported to shore by the aircraft.

After taking on fuel and the skippers, the aircraft then headed out over the gulf to search for

### FAIR'S HIGHLIGHTS DESCRIBED

## P.E.I. Centennial Showed Way To Make Success Of 'Expo 67'

Robert F. Shaw, deputy commissioner-general of "Expo 67" addressed members of the P.E.I. Canadian Club in the Charlottetown Hotel last evening. Mr. Shaw has travelled across Canada and presented the outline of Expo 67 to many cities and towns in preparation for the official opening of the fair. The doors to Canada's "Expo" will officially open on April 28, 1967, and close six months later.

Mr. Shaw supplemented his talk with a series of colored slides depicting location, pavilions, and architecture of the fair. He described the fair as the "second" hundredth birthday of Canada.

The Exposition is located on a 985 acre site, and is composed of four distinct areas. MacKay Pier is designated the section for the performing arts, and buildings are already beginning to rise. St. Helene's Island will be the main section of the fair and will be the centre of a complex transit system.

The St. Lawrence Seaway is being widened to provide the third fair segment. This area will be called Isle Notre Dame and will provide the entrance to the subway which will run under the St. Lawrence River. The final area will be the amusement area, containing a marina, hall of stars, restaurants and amusement rides. This area will be called Le Ronde.
