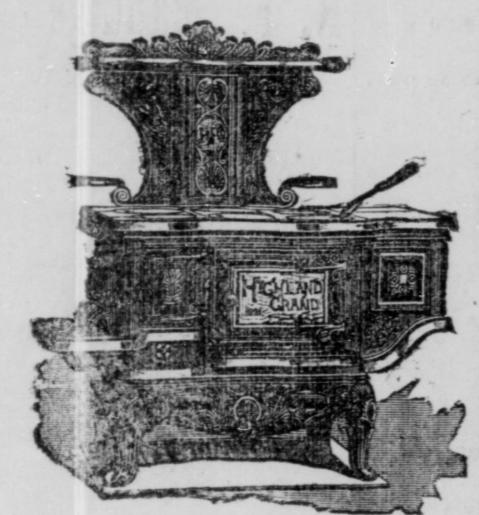

A GROWING TIME.

Grit speakers and writers are fond of speaking of what they call the "growing time" which covers the years that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been in power. Well, some things have grown, it is true.

In the first place, the public expenditure has grown from \$41,702,383, in the last year of the Conservative administration, to \$53,659,600—this being Mr. Fielding's estimate for the year 1899-1900. It must be admitted that is a startling growth.

Then, the debt grew from 1896 to 1899, or in three years, by the amount of \$7,716,014. That is another very marked instance of growth.

Other things have also grown, such as prices of the necessities of life: coal, cotton, woolens, coal oil, etc., have grown to the extent of from 25 to 50 per cent.

There has, however, been a marked lack of growth in some things in which the people of this Island are interested. The price of our staples, such as oats and potatoes, have shown no growth whatever. The price of labor has not grown. The only growth there has been in anything which is really advantageous to the people of Prince Edward Island is the marvelous increase both in the price and output of our cheese factories and creameries. For this growth every particle of credit is due to the late Conservative Administration.

The friends of the Laurier Government would be wise if they refrained from referring to the growing time. Every allusion to the subject suggests Grit extravagance and mismanagement, and the carefulness and foresight of the Conservatives.

—Benjamin Gallant, of Bloomfield, who figured in the trial of Meddie, as one of those who carried whiskey, is the returning officer for West Prince. Surely the temperance Liberals there and elsewhere will be happy.

—An Ottawa telegram to The Patriot says that "the Conservatives conceded a majority to the Government in Ontario." We heard this report here nearly a week ago. The Patriot ought not to publish chestnuts as telegraphic news.

A COMEDY OF ERRORS.

The Laurier Government blundered in their present British tariff.

When they started tariff making in 1897 they proposed a reciprocal arrangement which would be open to any country which would make its tariff as low as ours.

Sir Charles Tupper told them plainly that they could not do so, as German and Belgian treaties and the most favored nation clauses in British treaties would not allow it.

Sir Louis Davies, with his usual tendency to jump before he comes to the fence, declared that not even a "flodgling lawyer" would agree with Sir Charles Tupper.

It turned out, however, that, as usual, Sir Charles Tupper was right, and Sir Louis Davies was wrong. The law lords of England decided that the Belgian and German treaties had to be respected, and Mr. Chamberlain declared that the most favored nation clauses in British treaties prevented the extension of the reduced tariff to countries beyond the Empire.

Kicked from pillar to post, the Laurier Government did, in the end, what Sir Charles Tupper told them they should have done at the outset,—whereupon the party, with one accord, called upon the public to admit the accuracy and wisdom of Laurier's statesmanship. The absurdity of this claim reminds us of the heading to one of the chapters in the Pickwick Papers, in which Dickens tells the story of how Mr. Winkle, instead of shooting at the crow and killing the pigeon, shot at the pigeon and wounded the crow. Even Dickens' sense of humour did not cause him to make Mr. Winkle claim the applause of the bystanders on account of the accuracy of his aim. But that is just what the Laurier Government have done.

They fired at a crow on a tree in the lawn and killed a duck in the back yard;—and now they ask the people of Canada to applaud their marksmanship!

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Mutual Preferential Trade would make the country rich, said Laurier in 1896.

—Three weeks of work and activity to ensure the fall of the incumbent and corrupt men who now govern us!

—If farmers wish to have Mutual Preferential Trade, they must elect a government of action, not a government of mere boasters!

—The Journal of Montreal, declares truly that the right to vote invests each citizen with the responsibility of a judge; and it says, finely, "to renounce the right is cowardice, to sell it is infamy."

—A correspondent in West Prince reports that every twig along the railway track has a man to attend to it and every wharf and mud-hole its gang at work there—just before the election!

—We learn that Dr D. J. McLeod has decided to resign the office of Superintendent of Education and to remove to Sydney about the first of December next. By the removal of Dr McLeod and Mrs McLeod and family Charlottetown will lose, and Sydney will gain, excellent citizens.

—One of the Patriot's Ottawa telegrams states that "money has been put up" in that city that not more than twenty-five seats will be carried by the Opposition in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. Here the Liberal betters bet on a majority in Ontario. No doubt the money bet comes directly or indirectly out of the people's exchequer.

—We have been accustomed to think of Mr. B. H. Cook as a very wealthy Liberal who has been bled freely for the good of his party. The offer to him of a Senatorship accompanied by a demand for \$10,000 towards the Liberal party's election shows that the gentlemen now in office thought that Mr. Cook might be led again. It is creditable to Mr. Cook that he declined to accept the corrupt proposal, and that he is assisting to "turn the rascals out."
