CHRISTIAN LIFE DEMANDS
STRUGGLE, NOT SURRENDER
You are not the world. The
Communists have seen in this
statement a type of despair—a
despair of being able to achieve
the ends for which man should
naturally seek. They have seen
an other-worldly reward as a sort
of "pie in the sky," an imaginary
goal set up by Christians to re-
place solid material goals which
they are too timid, or feel unable
to reach.

Moreover, they claim that be-
liever in this imaginary goal has
been encouraged in the masses
by those who do have great ma-
terial possessions (the capital-
ists), so that the masses will be
content with their material in-
dignity. The doctrine of Our
Lord, then, is a doctrine for
slaves, who, because of its
assurances, feel themselves ex-
onerated from entering into the
struggles of life.

Such a conception of Christian
life could not be further from
the truth. At best, it is a caricature.
For us to live as Christ has
taught us to live, necessarily in-
volves a struggle, and often a
great one.

Of course, the struggle and en-
durance of suffering required of
us is not for its own sake. It is
based upon the only motive
worth justifying any activity—
namely, love. Love of God, and
love of neighbor for the sake of
God, are the fires which must
burn in the Christian heart; the
more intensely these fires burn,
the more ardent and energy will
pour into the Christian's activi-
ties.

Many of the ends with which
"the world" in its blindness is
satisfied, will not satisfy true
Christians. However, this does
not mean that his struggle on
behalf of God, and for the sake
of his neighbor will be any the
less strenuous.

BATTLE OF LIFE
It is the vocation of the ordi-
nary Christian to enter into the
battle of life, and to do his ut-
most, within the bounds of the
career which he has chosen, to
wage unrelenting war against
those elements which threaten
