The amount of counterfeit money captured by the United States Secret Service during the last fiscal year was \$8,830,000.

REV. A. OSBORNE, who is about leaving this city for the North West, may be expected to speak in Y. M. C. A. Hall to-morrow, at 4 o'clock meeting.

A CLAIM for \$1,000,000 is about to be preferred against the United States from Quebec Province, for wrongfully charging 20 per cent. duty on hay imported there, when the proper duty was only 10 per cent.

WE are glad to see that the directors are having the Citizen's Skating Rink repaired and fitted up in good order. This first-class place of amusement will, weather permitting, open in about three weeks.

By the will of the late Miss Margaret Hierlihy, of Halifax, the Old Ladies' Home, Halifax, receives \$800; the Orphans, Richmond, \$800. There is also a conditional legacy of \$600 to the Deaf and Dumb Asylum, and \$400 to the poor of St. George's parish.

QUICKEST TRIP.—The schooner "Frank," Capt. Miller, left Chatham on Wednesday last week, at noon, and proceeding to Tisbury, P. E. I., discharged a cargo of lumber; then, taking in a cargo of oats, she returned to Chatham, arriving at nine o'clock Sunday evening.—Chatham Advertiser.

ON Monday afternoon a deputation, headed by Thomas White, M. P., asked the Montreal Finance Committee to guarantee a sum of money to the reception of the Royal Society, which is to visit Canada in 1884. He announced that the Government would vote \$20,000 or \$40,000, said the Canada Pacific had offered an excursion to the Rocky Mountains, and the Grand Trunk had also offered the use of their lines.

BRACKLEY POINT SABBATH SCHOOL.—The closing exercises were held last Sabbath. The scholars' service was held first. Recitations of Scripture, and Hymns and singing took up the time. Afterwards, Rev. George Steel preached a sermon to the young people. Mr. Joseph Provas is the Superintendent. Great credit is due to him and to Miss Cox for training the scholars so that they acquitted themselves so well.

REMOVAL OF SNOW FENCE.—A good deal of money is being spent on the Railway in grading and upon the fences. The snow fence near Little York has been removed twenty feet further back, the land having been purchased from Mr. Thomas Vessey for the purpose. The fence is 650 feet long and about thirteen feet high. It is strong and has been built in a servicable way by Mr. Eddie Vessey. Last winter the fence simply served the purpose of lodging the snow on the track. Many think that it will do the same this winter; others think that it may do some good.

ON DEB, that the Empress of Austria will not hunt the wily fox or swift stag in either Ireland or England next season. No particular reason is assigned for this change in her Majesty's arrangements, but perhaps the sense of being "mobbed" has much to do with this desertion. Perhaps the best way for the Kaiserine to avoid this "mobbing" would be to separate her stud, to hunt occasionally with several packs, and never let her intention be known save to a chosen few. With London for headquarters, and a couple of small hunting boxes in the shires, this could be managed pretty easily.

BOY MISSING.—The St. John Telegraph says: "About a year ago a boy named William H. Mahoney, about fifteen years of age, left his mother who resides in Charlottetown, P. E. I., and came to St. John. She last heard of him about a month afterwards, when he wrote that he was working in a hotel here. Since then no word of him has been received, and his mother, who is a widow, advanced in years, is in sore distress, he being an only son. Any one who can give any information concerning the boy's whereabouts will confer a favor by communicating with this office."

HANDSOME.—A Methodist gentleman of Toronto has printed, at his own expense, an edition of the "Life of Dr. Alexander Duff," the great Indian Missionary, in two neatly bound volumes; and a copy is being sent to every Methodist Minister in the Dominion on the receipt of twenty-five cents, for postage and packing. The books are well printed, in clear, readable type, by the Methodist Publishing House, in Toronto, which is now the largest publishing house in the Dominion. The gentleman who has acted so generously is desirous that the Ministers should be stirred up to greater missionary activity.

PROFESSOR EASTY'S SECOND ENTERTAINMENT.—The programme was much longer than that of the first evening; and the selections as a whole, were not quite so popular. It is safe to say that there are few living readers, who, reading the same pieces, could have held the audience so well in hand from eight o'clock to twenty minutes past ten. Professor Easty's powers were well displayed, especially in the rendition of "Clarance's Dream." "Oh my, and the doctor and the pick," the celebrated trial of "Bardell vs. Pickwick" and "The Raven." He has evidently made a very careful study of the powerful masterpieces of Edgar Allan Poe; for he reads them as well as they can be read. On Monday evening Professor Easty gives his farewell entertainment. The programme promised comprises several of the most brilliant gems of English literature, with a good variety of those and amusing selections. No doubt, the Hall will be well filled.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

There is some prospect of a settlement between the crofters on the Isle of Skye and their landlord. The latter has consented to submit the dispute to arbitration. The county police have received a promise of a reinforcement of eighty constables. Many of the crofters are acquainted with the details of the Irish agitation. The authorities are of the opinion that only soldiery can arrest the offenders.

Sir Stafford Northcote, in a letter to the Exeter Conservative Association, says: "I am not seriously ill at present, but unless I get some real rest I shall be quite unfit for work at the next session of Parliament, which, I anticipate, will be a very critical one for the Conservatives. If they work with energy and prudence, I have no fear as to the result."

LONDON, Nov. 23.

The Times Berlin correspondent says the wish of Russia to show Europe that her relations with Germany now are just as cordial as they were before the advent of Gen. Ignatieff to power is, doubtless, intensified by the knowledge of the moral support tendered England by Germany throughout the latter phases of the Egyptian question.

BERLIN, Nov. 23.

The debate on the budget was commenced in the Diet yesterday. Bichter, the most distinguished opponent of the budget, was absent on account of illness. The clerical leader, Schorlemer, invited the Conservatives to go hand in hand with the ultramontanes on all questions.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

The Times Berlin correspondent says that in recognition of his meritorious services in Egypt the Emperor of Germany has presented the Duke of Connaught with the order of Frederick the Great. This has a political significance which the advocates of a closer union between England and Germany will heartily hail.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

The Daily News Constantinople correspondent says the Porte is trying to ascertain the views of Germany on the Egyptian and Tunisian questions. At a recent interview of the Turkish ambassador at Berlin with Bismarck, the latter advised the Porte to remain quiet as the time was inopportune for raising the question of supporting the claims of Turkey. The Porte agreed to several changes in the organization of the army, recommended by German officers. Hitherto this advice has not been acted upon.

DUBLIN, Nov. 23.

Mr. Malley, counsel for the Maamtrasna murderers, has forwarded a memorial, praying for the commutation of the sentence in the cases of the five prisoners who yesterday pleaded guilty.

Three persons charged with the murder of the Hudleys at Lough Mask, were yesterday removed from Galway to the city.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

The Standard's Madrid correspondent has reason to believe that the Government will liberate the Cuban refugees early in December in response to the appeal of England. The refugees will probably be required to promise that they will not return to Cuba.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

A captain of a steamer arrived from Sunderland, reports that off the coast of Norfolk his vessel passed a large raft to which three or four corpses were lashed. It is stated that the Prince of Wales has written a letter expressing the hope that the sentence of Wm. Brockham to ten years penal servitude for sending a threatening letter to His Royal Highness, may be reduced.

In the Commons, this afternoon, Gladstone, in reply to Bartlett and Parnell, denied that the Arrears Rent Act had proved a failure. Full benefits of its provisions, he said, had not yet been ascertained. The Government did not intend to introduce a bill to extend the period for payment of rent of 1881.

In consequence of Gladstone's answer to Parnell, who was supported by over one hundred members, moved an adjournment of the House. He contended that, in consequence of the provision introduced into the Arrears Rent Act as a concession to tenants and that it was impossible for any tenant to know how much rent he had to pay in order to secure its advantages. After desultory discussion, Trevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, said there were still five weeks for the tenants to take advantage of the Act. The Land Commission had prophesied that the bulk of the applications would come in at the last moment. It was most important, he said, that people should know the time originally mentioned in the Arrears Act would be strictly adhered to.

After some further discussion, Parnell withdrew his motion for adjournment. He said the Government were fully warned of the state of things that might supervene in Ireland through distress during the winter.

LONDON, Nov. 24.

The consideration of the procedure rules was resumed in the House to-night. The tenth rule was carried by a vote of 82 to 26. The rule provides that if the Speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole House shall be of opinion that the motion for adjournment of debate, or of the House during any debate, or that chairman report progress, or to leave chair, is made for the purpose of obstruction, he may forthwith put the question thereupon from the chair put the question thereupon from the chair put the question thereupon from the chair.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

Polling for a member of the Commons for Cambridge University, which will continue for five days, opened to-day. At the close of the day's polling, H. C. Raikes, Conservative, had received 527 votes and Professor Stuart, Liberal, 436 votes.

At the election at Preston, to-day, for a successor to Mr. Raikes, Mr. Tomlinson, independent-Conservative, was elected.

DUBLIN, Nov. 29.

The United Ireland says Mr. Dillon will go to America shortly to make a lengthened sojourn with his brother. He insists upon resigning his seat in the Commons before his departure.

ROME, Nov. 23.

Signor Parini has been re-elected President of the Chamber of Deputies. Signors Maffi Ferrari and Menotti Garibaldi and other radical members of the Chamber took the oath of allegiance at commencement of the sitting.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.

The International wrestling match for
