—"NO WAY OUT" NOW SHOWING AT THE CAPITOL

—Explosive in its force, powerful in its performance, challenging in its triumph, Darryl F. Zanuck's "No Way Out", at the Capitol, will be remembered as long as pictures are shown. It wins itself a special, proud place in the history of the screen. To see it is an experience, to miss it will be a failure. "No Way Out" is greatness itself.

"No Way Out" tells graphically and unflinchingly of what happens when a warped, criminal mind turns its blind hatred on an innocent man. Ray Biddle, a negro-hater and hoodlum, is wounded and captured with his brother in robbery. When his brother dies, Biddle lays the blame on Dr. Luther Brooks, negro interne on the case. Though the irrationality of this accusation can be proved to everyone else, the twisted, negrophobic mind of Biddle refuses to believe in the interne's innocence. From his hospital imprisonment, through the instrument of a low-down woman who was his brother's wife and his own sweetheart, Biddle foments a race riot. From Beaver Canal, slum side of the big American city where the action transpires, the gangs band together in a junk yard to wipe out the negro section of the city. They are in for some surprises.
