WINNIPEG, Aug. 9.—Superintendent Stickney, of the C. P. R., has ordered for the road 1,000 flat cars, 359 box cars, 200 stock cars, 80 cabooses, 15 first-class cars, 14 second-class, 14 baggage, 40 locomotives, 2 tool cars, 1 pile driver, 3 sleepers, and 2 derricks.

Another European War Cloud.

THE DIFFICULTY BETWEEN FRANCE AND SPAIN STILL FAR FROM SETTLED—THE REPUBLIC SURROUNDED WITH HOSTILE, SUSPICIOUS NEIGHBORS.

The French and Spanish papers for some time back have been sparing no efforts to magnify the difficulties which have arisen between France and Spain.
