Kennedy Gives Accounting Of 23 Months In Office

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy said Monday night he thinks "it is going to be some time before it is possible for us to come to any real understanding" with Soviet Premier Khrushchev.

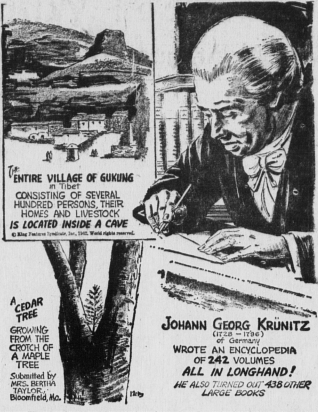
In an unprecedented television radio accounting of his 23 months in the White House, Kennedy said he believes Khrushchev's recent utterances show "that he realizes how dangerous a world we live in."

The one-hour filmed broadcast, in which Kennedy faced three TV-radio network reporters and a host of pressmen, the president has dealt since his inauguration Jan. 20, 1961.

At the outset, Kennedy said he found "the problems are more difficult than I had imagined they were."

He added that solution of many world problems does not lie with the United States alone. He mentioned, in this connection, the persistent internal troubles in the Congo and the current Western efforts to erase the dividing U.S. relations with the Soviet Union, the president said there is no reason why "enough people separated by thousands of miles, should not be able to live in peace."

British Stander In ECM Is Considered Unchanged

PARIS (Reuters)—The chances of Britain negotiating full membership in the European Common Market remained unchanged after weekend talks between British Prime Minister Macmillan and President de Gaulle, officials circled here.

The difficulty of adjusting the British agricultural subsidy system to the European system was the main focus of the talks.

According to the French government, the adjustment between the two systems is not a political question, and cannot be solved by a political decision—that is to say, by some compromise between de Gaulle and Macmillan.

France's agriculture minister Edgar Pisani, said Monday night Britain could not be "both inside and outside the European Common Market."

He said France will maintain its position that Britain should join the community first, and later be granted "special adaptable clauses."

Opening lead—nine of clubs. Good dummy play is nothing more than a logical process by which the declarer obtains the tricks he is entitled to. A fine declarer makes use of every possible clue, whether gained from the bidding or play, to attain his objective.

Look at this hand, for example, where declarer must function perfectly if he is to make the contract. West leads the nine of clubs.
