

# Parkdale Smears Montague 12-1 In Island League Tilt

Parkdale's high flying Flyers strengthened their grip on first place in the Island Senior Hockey League last night by manhandling Montague's hapless Primroses 12-1 at the Sports Arena.

The Primroses didn't look much like the team that ended Summer-side Acres winning streak at seven straight games on Monday night and even though playing at full strength they were no match whatever for the smooth working Parkdale crew.

Allie Carver's Flyers held only a 2-1 lead after actively was completed in the first 20 minutes of play but would have had a bigger lead than that had it not been for the sensational work of Sheldon Jordan in the Montague cage.

**RUNAWAY IN SECOND**

The Flyers began the runaway with three unanswered goals in the second period and completed the humiliating rout with seven in a row in the final.

Parkdale could possibly have had as many more goals on the night's play had Jordan been a strike before the Montague goal. He made a one man stand against Parkdale for most of the game as he kicked out 50 shots, many of them on breakaways as the Parkdale players found plenty of holes in a porous Montague defense.

Once again high scoring centre-man Orin Carver showed the Flyers the way with a three goal and two assist effort. Willie Dunn and Allie Carver each salted away two and singles went to Skip Carver, Junior MacLeod, Jim MacLeod, Bob Hurry, and Gerald Cruys got his first of the current campaign.

Coach Bob Dowling notched Mon-

tague's lonely goal in the first period.

Allie Carver had five points on the night's play and Willie Dunn, Bob Hurry and Jim MacLeod each had three.

Joe Revell and Leith Jay called to penalties, six to Montague and all minors.

**START LANDSLIDE**

Junior MacLeod and Orin Carver started the Parkdale landslide in the first period when they scored goals a little more than three minutes apart for a 2-0 lead. Bob Dowling cut the lead in half before the period ended with Phil MacGee in the penalty box but that was as close as the Primroses were to come for the remainder of the game.

Allie Carver scored a beautiful goal at 5:47 of the second and Jim MacLeod ran the count to 4-1 at 10:33. With the two teams playing first a side Orin Carver gave the Flyers a 5-1 lead at 16:00.

Three goals in a minute and 17 seconds in the third period sent many of the faithful fans, who braved stormy weather to sit on the game, home early. Willie Dunn got the first at 3:40 and two more goals followed quickly from the sticks of Hurry and Orin Carver. Skip Carver, Willie Dunn on a solo effort, Allie Carver and Gerald Cruys rounded out the scoring. Allie Carver's marker came while the Primroses had two men in the box and before the second offender returned Cruys scored the last goal of the night.

In this book we have here spades look very much like spades and we would like to inform all and sundry about the fact that spades will be called spades on each and every occasion.

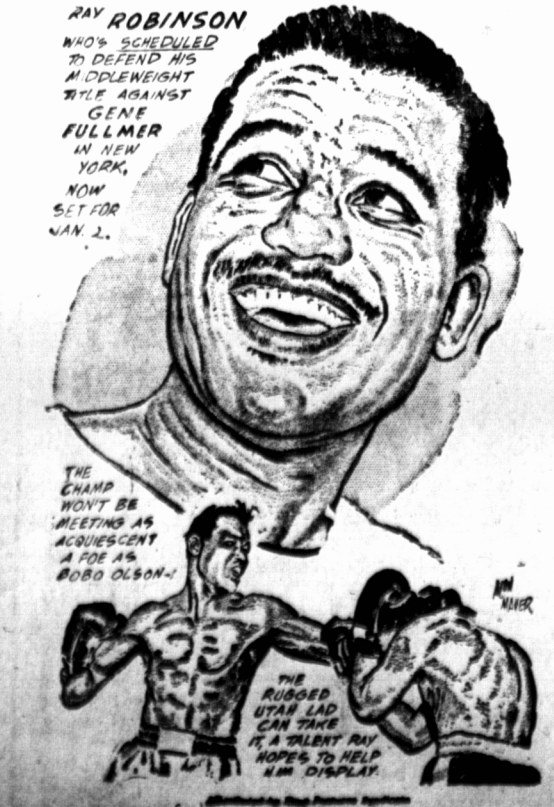
Jack Ready was telling us last night that Roy Buck Whitlock will be donning the uniform of the Basileia Youth Club in the Island

## Lady Hockey Fan Sues Larry Zeidel

CALGARY (CP) — Jean Greel has filed a claim of \$4,719 against Larry Zeidel, former defenceman with Edmonton Flyers of the Western Hockey League, and the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede Ltd., alleging Zeidel hit her with a hockey stick in a game last December.

The claim says the incident occurred during a Calgary Stampeder - Edmonton Flyers game here. It says Zeidel, in the penalty box, "assaulted and beat the plaintiff by striking her on the right arm with a hockey stick."

The claim asks \$2,000 for loss of income, \$219 for medical expenses and \$2,500 general damages.

## Athlete Refugee Leaves To Join Fiancee In Sweden

MILAN (AP) — Anton Moldrichs, one of the three Hungarian Olympic athletes, who chose to remain in the West after arriving here, left by plane for Stockholm Monday to join his fiancee and begin a new life.

The girl, Maria Klujber, 17, escaped to Sweden as a refugee. Moldrichs was one of 127 Hungarians who arrived from Melbourne last week.

Of the two other Hungarians who stayed here, Gymnast Alice Kertesz, 21, will join her brother, a physician in Haifa, Israel.

The third athlete, Sandor Rosznoi, world steeplechase record holder, has been granted political asylum in the United States.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Brownell Tuesday authorized admission to the United States of 40 Olympic athletes from Iron Curtain countries who defected after this year's games in Australia and asked for political asylum here.

The group, which remained in Melbourne after the Olympics, include 35 Hungarians, four Romanians and one Czech athlete.

All have expressed their dissatisfaction with the Communist regimes in their homelands and their unwillingness to return.

## Says Pro Football Rough, Not Dirty

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Fullback Rick Casares, former University of Florida star who led Chicago Bears to their first western division title in 10 years, said Tuesday pro football is "hard and rough but not dirty."

Casares ripped off 190 yards in the Bears' 38-21 clinching victory Sunday over the Detroit Lions, Chicago will meet New York Giants for the National Football League title in New York Dec. 30.

In a telephone interview with the Tampa Times Casares denied Detroit charges that end Ed Meadows deliberately put Detroit quarterback Bobby Layne out of action in the Sunday game.

"It was just a hard tackle," he said. Casares, who plays offensive ball only, was on the bench during the controversial play and said he had a good view of it.

VANCOUVER (CP) — The chances of British Columbia Lions signing Notre Dame quarterback Paul Hornung for the 1957 Western Interprovincial Football Union season are pretty slim, officials said Tuesday.

Hornung is the No. 1 draft choice of the National Football League's Green Bay Packers.

Phil Webb, retiring general manager of the Lions, said "The fact that Hornung was voted the outstanding college player in the U.S. last season has brought tremendous pressure to bear on him to remain in the U.S."
