## MR. McCREADY'S LECTURE.

Thos. D'Arcy McGee was the subject of Mr. McCready's lecture in the hall of the Y. M. C. A. last night. Dr. Taylor presided. There was an appreciative audience. The lecturer reviewed the life of McGee from his birth at Carlingford, County Louth, Ireland, on the 13th day of April, 1825, till his assassination at Ottawa on the 7th day of April, 1868. His father was an upright, religious man, and his mother was a woman of great intellectual power and a real lover of her country, its music and its songs. At his mother's knee he drank in the music and poetry that came down to the people from a glorious past, and from the same mother he received that deep religious feeling which runs through the poetry and prose of his later years. His youthful manhood and matured life were graphically described. The miserable failure of the revolutionary movement of the year 1848, his flight from Ireland one year after his marriage, his landing in America, his speech in Boston on the 4th of July, 1842, his connection with the press in the different cities of the United States, his residence in Canada and the part performed by him in the confederation of the provinces of North America, were thrown upon the canvas with great pictorial power. The change in McGee's mind from extreme radicalism to a calm conservatism was brought about by the deepening of his religious thought and by his wider knowledge of men and nations. The lecturer had the undivided attention of the audience. At the close a vote of thanks was moved by Mr. James Byrne, and seconded by Mr. J. Landrigan, Principal of Queen Square School.

**A SNOG VOTE.**—The ratepayers of Truro have voted \$12,000 for fire protection and waterworks extension and repairs. The amount has been voted because of a threatened raise in the rates of insurance.

**WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.**—The monthly meeting of St. Peter's branch of "the Women's Auxiliary" will meet in the Guild Room, on Saturday, March 4th, at 3 p. m. A full attendance is earnestly requested.

**THE DEAF AND DUMB.**—The annual report of the Halifax institution for the deaf and dumb has been received. The report shows the attendance during the past year to have been 102, of whom 65 were boys and 37 girls. Of these 88 belong to Nova Scotia, 9 to Newfoundland and 5 to P. E. Island. The institution is evidently being well managed, and the health of the pupils has been excellent during the year.

**SABBATH SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.**—Executive of the Provincial Sabbath School Association held a meeting yesterday in the study of Rev. G. M. Campbell. It was agreed that the annual meeting to be held on the 4th and 5th of October next. A committee consisting of the President, Rev. Mr. Raymond, R. v. Mr. Kirby and Messrs W. C. Turcotte and D. Schurman, was appointed to make all arrangements for city organization. Mr. Golding Howard, of Cornwall, was elected vice-president for Queen's County to fill the place of Rev. Mr. Mansfield, who has left the Province.

**MERCHANTS BANK OF HALIFAX.**—The annual statement of the Merchants Bank of Halifax for the year ending Dec. 31st last, has been forwarded THE EXAMINER. The assets of the bank are \$12,737,664.09. The capital stock paid up is \$1,500,000. The rest account amounts to \$1,250,000. The balance at credit of profit and loss is \$2,980,808.96. The notes in circulation amount to \$1,387,104.92, the deposits at call to \$1,932,188.49, and the deposits subject to notice \$6,243,804.98. There is due to other banks \$188,342.91. The interest received on deposits and relate on discounts is \$155,413.83.

**CONCERT AT LONG CREEK.**—The hall at Long Creek was packed last night by an enthusiastic and, judging from applause, well pleased audience. The occasion was the concert given by members of the choir of Charlottetown Baptist Church, assisted by a few friends. Perhaps especially worthy of mention was the duet by Miss Amy Earle and Mr. Charles Earle. Recitations were given by such well-known favorites as Miss S. Clifford and Miss Flo McKenzie. At the close of the programme a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the performer, and closed on a happy speech by Prof. or Earle. The audience included quite a number from Charlottetown. We understand a very tidy sum was realized.
