Hardworking Race Secretary Gets Lots Of "Beefs" But Few Bouquets

"They should send that guy to the Salt Mines of Siberia - he has no more brains than a dehydrated potato." These and other remarks well garnished with off color language, are not infrequently heard around the Exhibition Stables these exciting days of the Fair. You can lay a bet of almost two to one without much fear of losing, that the gentleman who is being laid out in lavender is absentia, is the track secretary, Mr. Frank Acorn. But don't be alarmed, it is all part of the game and the angry man who is expressing his beef, is a horse owner or driver who believes his horse is in a little bit over his head, and that the said Mr. Acorn is responsible.

Nine chances out of ten the hard working race secretary is no more to blame than the Soviet, Mr. Molotov. But it is a case of being in wrong, even when you are right. The wisdom of Solomon would be taxed to please all the drivers and owners, and to convince them that each was getting a fine deal.

Consider a typical problem, which with variations is handled by Mr. Acorn, every day of the big week: He receives sixteen entries for the 220 class races. These horses are eligible for the class on the basis of the amount of money they have earned while racing. Mr. Acorn has nothing whatever to do with their eligibility, except to check on the amount of money each has earned.

Of the sixteen horses three are a second or two faster than the rest. Only eight horses can start in each race so that the 220 class must be split into two divisions. Mr. Acorn must decide the horses which will race in the first division, and also

the horses which will start in the second division.

A Thankless Job
To be as far as possible, he must put the three fastest horses together, but he must also elect five horses from the remaining thirteen to make up an eight horse race.

The owners of each one of the five horses selected will probably make a vigorous kick because they must compete against the fastest three horses in the event. The remaining eight horse owners are probably satisfied because their horses are fairly evenly matched.

HAMPSHIRE BREEDER LEADS IN CLYDESDALE CLASSES AT FAIR

Cecil J. Stewart of Hampshire was top man in the Clydesdale class as the judging of the horses was concluded yesterday morning. His stallion Civic Chief Junior was champion and went on to win the grand championship of this breed. His mare Lady Favorite Ann was junior female champion and grand champion.

Preston Bryenton of Rollo Bay took the reserve championship with his mare "Ruby Fried" and reserve grand champion with "Miss Joyce Falconwood." Harrison Green won a senior championship with his mare "Barbara Anne" and took the reserve senior championship for mares with "Favorite Janette".

Percherons had only one exhibitor with three entries. Lorne Ferguson from Crapaud took the grand championship for stallions with "Major Lame!" and his mares "Lily Belle" and "Lily May" took the grand and reserve grand championships for juniors under three years of age.

The draft class saw a larger number of exhibitors and the competition in this class was much fiercer than in the Clydesdale and Percherons which honors fairly evenly divided. S. C. Stewart and Son of

Marshfield took first in the filly or gelding born in 1953 and for the filly or gelding born in 1951. Even if Crosby of Bonshaw took first in the filly or gelding born in 1952. Lorne Ferguson and Sons of Crapaud topped first position in the draft mare or gelding for three year olds or over.

Stanley Thompson of Cornwall took first position from Harold Donahue of the same place in a two entry class for mare or gelding three years and over 1500 lbs. Harrison Green of Clyde River had the best team of draft horses in the show. If he had any disappointment it was because of the small number of exhibitors. In making reference to Preston Bryenton's foal, "Miss Joyce Falconwood" he said, "It was the nicest foal I have seen in some time and added 'it is fit for any company in any show'."

Find Body of Man From Missing Tug

QUEBEC (CP)—The body of Joseph Collin, one of two men aboard the tug Florence W, missing in the lower St. Lawrence river since July 17, was found Tuesday near the south shore village of Ste. Felicie, Que., 375 miles east of here, it was learned Thursday.

Colin, 62, of St. Narcisse, Que., and Capt. Raoul Castonguay of Matane, Que., were on the 13-ton vessel when it was last seen leaving Rimouski, Que., on a 120-mile trip down river to Mont Louis.

Air and sea searchers, hampered by heavy river fog, failed to locate the missing ship.

Federal department of transport officials here, who co-operated in the search, said they have not yet been notified of the finding of Collin's body.

A corner's inquest identified the body as that of Collin.

To Reward Eskimos For Rescuing Son

TORONTO, (CP)—Toronto mining executive Douglas Banks says he intends to reward vigilant Eskimos who aided in the rescue of his 18-year-old son John, marooned for six days in the stoney wastes of a Hudson Bay island.

Twenty of the Eskimos will get new rifles and pipes for their part in the search, which brought the boy back safely after he had wandered more than 100 miles, subsisting on blueberries and lake water.

John was found Tuesday night after an unnamed Eskimo tracked spotted his heel-print in the tundra. Since Eskimos wear no heels he was certain he had picked up the boy's trail.

None the worse for his ordeal the youth ended his jaunt in a condition his family doctor described as "remarkable." With no northland experience he subsisted without matches, compass or food for five days.

Mr. Banks said the Eskimos in the search started at 3 a.m. each day and went on until darkness without rest. For the white men in their party they caught brook trout with their hands and speared salmon with pocket knives.
